Lessons From New York Fascist Rally

Several things can be learned from the recent Fascist

rally in New York's Madison Square Garden.

They are things which the United States needs to learn, and to learn quickly.

1. The mask is off. The German-American Bund definitely seeks to do to America what Hitler's Nazi movement has done to Germany. Of all the sneaky, sleazy little Fascist movements in the country today, the Bund, flauntng its hyphenism, is easily first. Very well, now we know.

2. New York set a precedent in handling these things. For years, much-hated Communist and other radical movements have been given, generally speaking, their right to freedom of speech in the American tradition. Now the

Mayor La Guardia, whose contempt for the amateur Hitlers is exceeded by nobody's, nevertheless guaranteed them their right to meet and speak. That was the Ameri-

But LaGuardia made this perfectly clear: the police department of the city would keep order, and nobody else. Self-appointed "storm troopers" would be given no right to do any policing. And the mayor turned out enough police to make certain that the preservation of public order was solely in the hands of public authority.

That is another lesson nowhere, at no time, under no circumstances, must the American republic allow the function of keeping public order to be usurped by private or-






