The attorney general of the Harding administration, now spending his declining years oscillating between Florida and Columbus, O., has confided to Michael Desmond. Columbus Citizen reporter, that he is going to make public a lot of "sacred but important secrets" in the book on which he is now working.

A completely candid book on the Harding administration by an insider like Daugherty would be illuminating to those who lived through it, and a rich source for the historian. Exactly how candid Mr. Daugherty is going to be



WHY don't you give some old fashioned baking recipes using soda?" a reader asks.

Old Fashioned Black Chocolate Cake

(8x8 inch pan)

One and a quarter cups cake flour, I teaspoon baking soda, 1-4 teaspoon salt, 2 squares (2 ounces) unsweetened chocolate, 1-4 cup butter, I cup brown sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, I egg, 1-4 cup sour milk or buttermilk, I teasour milk or buttermi any sugar crystals which appear on the sides of the saucepan. Cook very slowly to 232 degrees F., or until a soft ball stage is reached. Add butter and vanilla. Cool to lukewarm or 110 degrees, F. Beat until thick enough to

sour milk or buttermilk, 1 tea-spoon vanilla.

Sift, then measure flour. Sift 3 times with baking soda and salt.

Cut the chocolate in fine pieces.

Put chocolate, butter and sugar in a bowl. Then pour the boil-ing water over these, stirring un-til smooth.

til smooth.

Add slightly beaten egg. Combine sour milk and vanilla. Add dry and liquid ingredients and beat until smooth.

If natural sour milk or buttermilk is not available, use vinegar and sweet milk. (Place 1 teaspoon vinegar in a measuring cup and fill to the 1-4 cup mark with sweet milk.)

Turn into a greased loaf pan.

Eight tablespoons cream, 11-2 cups sugar, 1 square (1 ounce) chocolate cut in pieces, 1 egg yolk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1-2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine cream, sugar, chocolate and egg yolk. Stir thoroughly to dissolve sugar.






