Make the Census Really Worth Something

Complicated plans are already under way for the 1940 census. It is probably the most important since the government took the first one, in 1790.

The taking of a census every 10 years is provided by the Constitution. The original purpose was simply to determine the number of representatives each state should have in Congress.

The Constitution, stating first the basis for representation, continues: "The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of 10 years, in such manner as they shall by law direct.' The first cansus was, as a matter of fact, taken only about one year after the first Congress assembled, and has been taken every 10 years since.

The actual field work of taking the 1940 census will not begin for about a year, but already careful plans are being made to make it yield not only population figures necessary to apportioning representation among the states, but a vast amount of further data which Congress believes | hold a six-state sectional meeting is necessary to any real understanding of our national prob-




