Old Cemetery Is Transformed By V. V. Cooper, Sr.

V. V. Cooper, Sr., has just completed two weeks of supervision of work at the Old Ranger cemetery, which has transformed it from one of the city's worst eyesores into a well kept cemetery. The city commission has furnished the labor for the project. Arbor vitae for the project were furnished by O. R. Cooper, of Tyler, and were transported to Ranger by Charley Cooper. The 50 shrubs have been set out along the south wall, which is being built with NYA labor, and at intervals over a large portion of the cemetery. Another 50 shrubs can be obtained, Cooper said Saturday, as soon as work on the west wall has progressed enough to justify planting.

In addition to the shrubs four dozen roses have been set out, the entire grounds cleaned of weeds and grass, some of the mosquito trees cut and others pruned and all graves rounded up and put in first class shape.

Cross fences in the cemetery, which were added years ago as the cemetery grew, have been removed, placing the entire cemetery under one fence for the first time. Graves that had almost become lost, because there were no markers for them, have been remarked, though in most instances it was impossible to determine who was buried in them. Those who have relatives or friends buried in the cemetery, and whose graves have not been marked have been requested to get in touch with Mr. Cooper so they can be located and marked.
