Economy — Easy to Favor, Hard to Practice

Sometimes it takes an agency outside the government to tell the hard truth about government matters, just as sometimes it is necessary for someone outside the family to tell us the unpalatable truth about ourselves.

The Brookings Institute is an admirable organization and has given real service to the country by study of many problems from an unprejudiced position which no government agency can quite assume.

Latest is its study of the government economy, and the possibilities of really cutting down the federal budget.

The conclusions presented are so sensible, and so apparently true, that it is like a fresh breeze to have someone put them into words.

Briefly, they are that no "cheese-paring" economy wave is going to make so much as a dent in federal expenditures.

Old Washingtonians remember the "Coolidge economy wave" that ran through all the government establishments at one phase of his administration. There was a great flutter of writing on both sides of the paper, and not getting a new pencil until the stub of the old one had been turned in. The net result was a great deal of amused or annoyed comment from government workers, but no saving in the cost of government that was in any sense worth all the hullabaloo.

The Brookings report recognizes the futility of this. "Economy large enough to count in the Federal budget can come only from elimination and curtailment of certain types of activities, a step which involves large issues of public policy," it insists.

Does the Department of Agriculture cost too much? Then savings must come, not from making each employee use old report sheets for scratch-paper, but from eliminating entirely whole departments and services as either unnecessary or overlapping other services.

Does the Interior Department cost too much? Then savings must be made by discontinuing whole divisions, say the Division of Forests, or the Office of Education, or the Petroleum Conservation Commission, letting their whole functions go by the boards.

Even the most careful elimination of duplicated effort can not do much to reduce expenses. It should be done, but it will not solve the problem.

The central problem, as the Institution makes clear, "involves large issues of public policies." Only those who are prepared to face reduced service from the federal government can with a clear consistency advocate the pleasant theme of economy.

Highway Engineer Tells About Bridges In State System

AUSTIN, Tex.—State Highway Engineer Julian Montgomery today released some interesting data on structures on the 21,866 mile State Highway System. "As people drive over a bridge," Mr. Montgomery said, "few stop to think of the amount of planning necessary to design the structure, the time spent in building it or the cost of construction. Bridges are designed for attractive appearance as well as usefulness, but how many persons ever look at a bridge from the side or from beneath it?"

There are 7,768 bridges over 20 feet long on the State System, and they total 219 miles in length. Imagine one bridge 219 miles long, or, if laid end to end, enough bridges to extend from Austin in Dallas, or from Fort Worth to beyond Sweetwater. 5,441 bridges, are of concrete, the remainder being steel, timber, or combinations of concrete, steel and timber. "919 bridges are less than 18 feet wide," Mr. Montgomery said, "and these bridges are being replaced as quickly as possible. 612 are from 40 to 99 feet wide, and 5,237 from 18 to 39 feet." Narrow bridges have been adequately marked for the traveling public and reflector buttons placed in the road for guidance in night driving. The date of construction was not available on 658 bridges taken over when the department assumed maintenance in 1924, and 107 were built prior to the creation of the department in 1917, 16 of these being dated before 1900. In the past 10 years an average of 482 bridges have been built each year.

Bridges vary in height according to the flow of water they must carry for, and the Neches River bridge between Port Arthur and Orange, over the navigable river of the same name, is 176 feet from the floor of the bridge to the water. This height is necessary to allow ocean going vessels to pass under it. They vary in length from 20 feet to 10,305 feet, and a few of the longest are:

- State No. 35, Lavaca Bay Causeway, 10,305 feet; State No. 35, Copano Bay Causeway, 9,191 feet; U. S. No. 75, Galveston Causeway, 8,195 feet; U. S. No. 77, Corpus Christi Causeway, 8,166 feet; State No. 87, Neches River Bridge, 7,816 feet; State No. 28, Red River Bridge, 5,423 feet.

The cost of building bridges is high, and yet they are essential to traffic. Those of us who traveled by car only 12 years ago will recall the numerous dips and river fords that held up traffic for hours at a time. Today these hazards are a thing of the past.

Cheese Production In Texas Drops

AUSTIN, Tex.—Production of cheese in Texas dropped 32 per cent in comparison with February last year, reports to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research for last month indicate. Production lacked only 1.4 per cent of equalling January's output, however.

Other dairy products likewise slumped, but not as drastically. Creamery butter production fell 25.9 per cent from last February but increased 9 per cent over January, 1935; while ice cream was down 12.6 per cent from February, 1935, but 12.2 per cent above January.
