#### One Type of Peaceful War Preparedness

Most war preparation is economic lost motion.

It results in unproductive production-that is, the production of things which are of no value in themselves to men, and which are not productive of other valuable things. Guns, bombs, and bayonets are like that

But the Senate is now embarked on a preparedness program that is less on the unproductive side than almost any other. It is the buying up in advance of certain materials which might be hard or impossible to get in time of war. All are useful in peace as well as in war.

Not only a war in which the United States was involved, but any war, might make it dangerous or impossible to get the things in question. So the buying and stocking of quantities of them might well make it possible to stay out of another war in which the United States was not concerned. For it could then laugh at naval blockades, cornering of markets, or other steps that warring countries might take.

At the rate of \$25,000,000 a year, it is now proposed to buy \$100,000,000 worth of certain basic materials.

Most of these materials are not produced in the United States, or produced in quantities that do not fill potential war-time demands. They are in general non-perishable. They could be stocked against an emergency without competing in domestic markets.

Purchase of these things will further provide Americancan dollars for countries, most of them in South America, which now find it hard to buy American goods because the United States does not buy enough of their products to provide needed exchange.





Meat is recognized as an excel-lent source of high quality pro-tein. The nutritive value of any protein depends upon the number and amount of amino-acids pres-

The superiority of animal proteins is an accepted fact. Meat proteins have an excellent suplementary value, which means they make up the amino-acid deficiencies of the cereal grain proteins.

There is, of course, some loss of soluble protein from the meat to the drippings. This need not represent loss of food value, however, since drippings ordinarily are used in making gravies and sauces.

Experiments conducted at the University of Missouri showed that drippings from meat which has been braised contained more protein than drippings from roasted meat. A greater degree of "doneness" increased the loss increasing with oven temperature and cooking period.

Iron and phosphorus are the two minerals of which meat is a rich source. The availability of iron in foodstuffs has been the measure of the value of any nutrient is the extent to which it is utilized by the body.

Studies on the availability of iron in certain foodstuffs were conducted by Sherman, Elvehjem and Hart at the University of Wisconsin.
