

The problem of states' rights is back again.

Purely political questions of states' rights have been largely solved and put behind us. But in a world whose eyes focus on economic rather than political matters, states' rights is back with a new set of problems.

The Constitution plainly meant the country to be one economic unit. Until recently no one questioned the advantages of "the largest free trade area in the world." On the theory that most men are reasonable mortals who will compromise rather than scrap if somebody just takes the trouble to help things along a bit. By not large, the theory works.
