Let's Keep a Sharp Eye on the Laboratory

Ever since the Nazi Bund came out in the open in the United States, it has been evident that we will have to learn how to handle a new problem.

The incidents, one after another, which have followed the bund's public appearances, have provided lessons we all should heed.

First: When the Madison Square Garden rally of the bund was held, Mayor LaGuardia established a policy, and carried it out with firmness: 1. Nazis have the same right to meet in public that anyone else has—no more, no less. 2. Gatherings of hostile people met with the obvious intent of breaking up the meeting must not be permitted. 3. If there is any policing to be done, the police will do it, and not any kind of unofficial and privately organized groups.

Second: A recent similar rally in the Bronx set another precedent. Police found that the Nazis had organized something they call "Storm Troops"—men in uniform and equipped evidently to keep order. Police stripped off their Sam Browne belts and arm-bands. Lesson: Any such "amateur police" must not only be prevented from assuming police functions, but must not even be allowed to kid themselves that they have any such powers.

Third: In Mexico City, a huge mass-meeting of unionists had been arranged. A rival organization then hastily tried to arrange a "competing meeting," with every chance that there would be trouble between them. Police action: the second meeting was prevented, with assurance that they could meet later at any time and place that was not obviously inviting friction between the parties.

Is that an infraction of freedom of assembly? Probably. But in the United States it is the right "peaceably to assemble" that is guaranteed. In cases like this, where the intent is obviously to invite defiance and friction between groups, it is just possible that it may be better to insist on separate dates. This issue is not yet clear-cut in the United States.

But it is obvious that when one group has set a date and planned a meeting, other organizations with a whole year of dates before them will scarcely choose the same time and place unless they hope for trouble.

It is a good deal like traffic regulation. Any two cars have the same theoretical right in the same place on the street at the same time. But if both insist on it, there is a collision. Police step in to set up regulations and enforce them, granting one or the other a prior right under specified conditions.

These new problems we will solve as they come along. But it is worth our while to keep our eyes on the laboratories where the test cases are already beginning to crop up.

"Officials can efficiently cope with public health problems, such as assuring pure water and milk to consumers and other phases of disease control. These lend themselves readily to organized efforts. However, where the problem involves personal conduct, the solution becomes more difficult.

"Physicians and public health officials realize that scientific information and the part that the individual must play in personally applying such knowledge are very different matters. The high maternal mortality rate is an example of this fact.

"In the light of present-day knowledge, nearly 30,000 annual deaths in the United States associated with maternity can mean only that medical science is not being given a fair chance in pre-

vention. "Expectant mothers must realize that both for their own sake and for that of the new life in the time to become interested in a successful outcome is the moment the expectancy is realized. It so happens, however, that many mothers fail to surround themselves with the medical advice and protection that are so important not only at the conclusion of the gestation period but throughout the entire term. Many of the conditions cause needless maternal mortality that can be traced to ignorance or of indifference to this primary guard.

"Or, to express it positively, every expectant mother should be under the supervision of a physician during the entire prenatal period.

All-State Shrine Ceremonial To Be Held In Fort Worth

PORT WORTH, Texas—Moshlah Temples' silver jubilee and All-State Shrine ceremonial will be held in Fort Worth, May 26-28 with nine of the ten Shrine Temples in Texas having their divans and uniformed bodies in attendance, which will make the gathering one of the largest of its kind ever held in the State of Texas.

It is planned that there will not be one dull moment from the time the visitors arrive until their departure according to Sam Bennett, chairman of the entertainment committee. Calls for hotel registrations being requested of I. Scott McConnell, chairman of the hotel committee will tax the capacity of the hotels according to Senator Jesse E. Martin, potentate of Moshlah Temple.

Over 100 blocks of the downtown district, including the Masonic Temple and Memorial Coliseum will be gaily decorated in the Shrine colors for the occasion, the contract having already been signed and the decorations will be placed early the week of the ceremonial.

The highlight of the ceremonial will be the staging of a patriotic pageant, Sunday, May 28. This pageant will be staged at Texas Christian University stadium and it is expected that a capacity crowd of over 35,000 people will participate in the "Americanism" program. The principal speaker on this occasion will be Congressman Martin Dies of Orange, who has been prominent in the Congressional investigation of un-American activities in the United States.

BRUCE CATTON - - IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—A new government "pump-priming" program, emphasis of which would be on money-lending rather than on outright money-spending, is under consideration by the administration.

It is this idea which is back of the recurrent reports about consolidation or regrouping of the government's lending agencies.

In brief, the plan is to produce recovery through extensive lending of government money. The machinery to do the job is at hand, in the 30-odd lending agencies now in existence. If the consolidation scheme goes through, the government will have at hand a credit-creating agency infinitely greater than anything ever before seen either in or out of government.

Today the government's credit organizations are scattered all over the lot. They range from such giants as the RFC and the Home Owners Loan Corporation down to the Disaster Loan Corporation, the Federal Intermediate Credit Banks, and some still-liquidated war emergency corporations and agencies. There are 38 of them in all.

As of the end of February, these 38 corporations and agencies had total assets of \$12,411,000,000 against liabilities of \$8,349,000,000.

Now, if these agencies were combined into one, what would emerge would not merely be a giant corporation with the figures just quoted on its books. It would also have a still unused lending capacity (lumping together the unused capacities of its component parts) of approximately \$10,000,000,000.

No banker in the history of the world ever had that much credit at his disposal.

In actual practice, of course, the figure will be somewhat less, that, as it is extremely probable that all of the agencies will be put into a few of the new HOLC, FHA, Electric Home Authority, and port Bank—will be gathered as nucleus agencies.

These have legal net worth of \$5,887,000,000. Loans already made total assets of \$2,230,000,000. Outstanding loans of more than \$1,500,000,000.

Just how this reorganization would be done, and who would be in charge of the new things which have worked out. The fact was that RFC, HOLC, would be lumped together with Harry Hopkins, which seems to have been in part, at least, the position in the Senate suggestion would put now boss of RFC, in connection with reorganization, a recommended President Roosevelt budget message may be calling.

Lintless Cotton Is To Be Developed By Some Scientist

COLLEGE STATION, Texas—Some day, scientists expect to develop lintless cotton, but numerous problems must first be solved, according to the men who are directing experiments at Texas A. & M. College.

"If a strain of cotton can be developed that will produce numerous bolls well filled with seed that will serve the uses of ordinary cotton seed and have bolls that do not open and scatter the seed, then what might be a new crop will have been discovered. The geneticist knows a good many things he might do to achieve a non-shattering boll. A variety known as Wagad, which belongs to another species of cotton, Gossypium herbaceum, an Indian cotton, does not open under environmental surroundings of much of the American cotton belt.

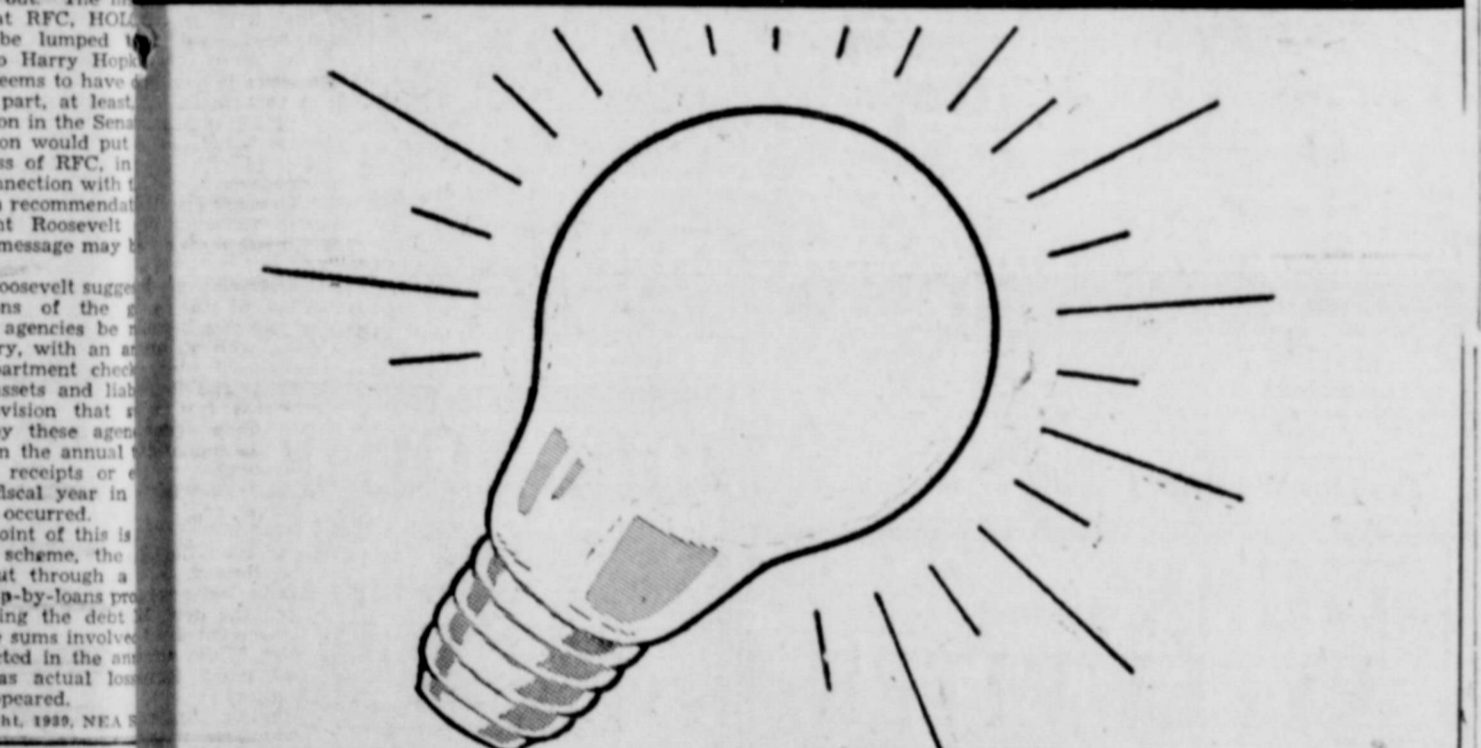

Tuberculosis No Longer Most Fatal Disease In Texas

AUSTIN, Texas—Tuberculosis no longer ranks first among the major killing diseases—a position it formerly occupied not only in Texas but in the entire country. However, despite its now being seventh on the list in 1938, it continues to kill more persons between fifteen and forty-five years of age than does any other single disease.

While the treatment of the individual early case is of great importance, it is of equal moment from a public health point of view, that the spread of infection to others be prevented. A more concerted attack on this front would mean the saving of thousands of lives.
