**No Martyrdom for Moseley**

The proposals that Gen. George Van Horn Moseley be court-martialed, and the suggestion of Thomas E. Stone, chairman of the Council of U. S. Veterans, Inc., that he is guilty of treason, seem pretty muddled ill-advised.

Whether any such charges could be technically sustained against the general under army regulations, is a matter of military law, in which we are not skilled. But it would seem unwise to pursue them. For the very worst thing that could happen would be at this point to make a martyr of General Moseley.

Hitler never amounted to much until he was jailed for his sickly "putsch" attempt against the republic, and the Communist movement is much indebted to the building up of martyrs in the public, and especially the party, eye.

The general has been very definitely out of order. Despite a service record in many ways distinguished, he seems never to have grasped the fundamental fact of the American military service—that it must not, and generally does not, meddle with politics. The American way implies a complete separation between the military and civil powers which is something galling to military men with political minds.

Yet it is basic. An American soldier is an American trained and pledged to carry out missions assigned to him by the appropriate civil authorities. He is not an intriguer, nor has he any duty to "save the country" except under definite orders from his properly-constituted superiors, chief of whom is a civilian president.

General Moseley should know these things, as practically all of his associates in the service know them, and as 99 44-100ths of them observe them.

As a pensioner drawing \$6000 a year from the taxpayers, the general is not only subject to the military authority directly, but he is subject to a canon of good taste which dictates that he employ his well-earned leisure in pursuits outside the active political field. There is always trout-fishing, and the collecting of stamps is said to induce quietness of mind.

The general, during his active career, served his country well. The country, in retiring the general on a generous and sufficient pension, recognized this, but it also pointedly indicated that it no longer required his formal active services as a soldier.

From this, any man able to take a broad hint might deduce that neither does the country require his informal and all-too-freely-volunteered services as a sleuth and amateur undercover man.

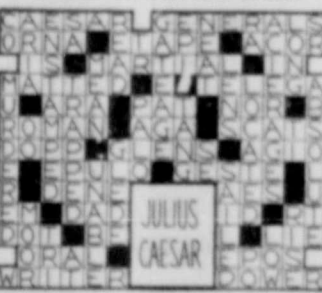

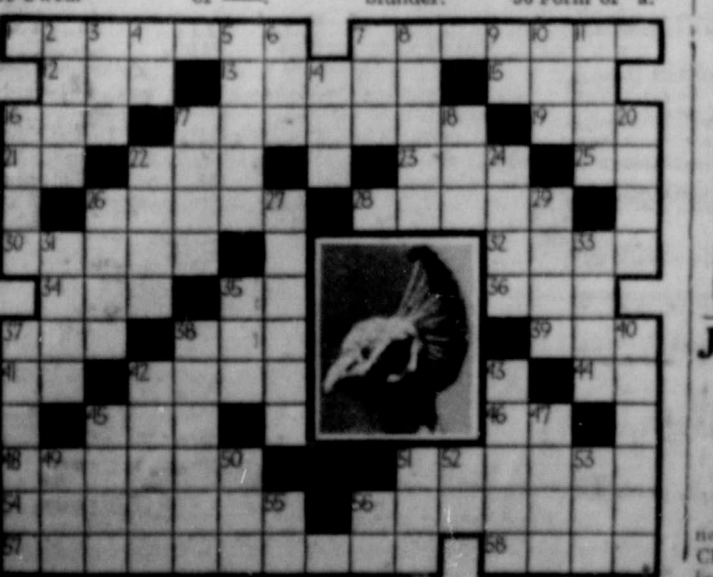

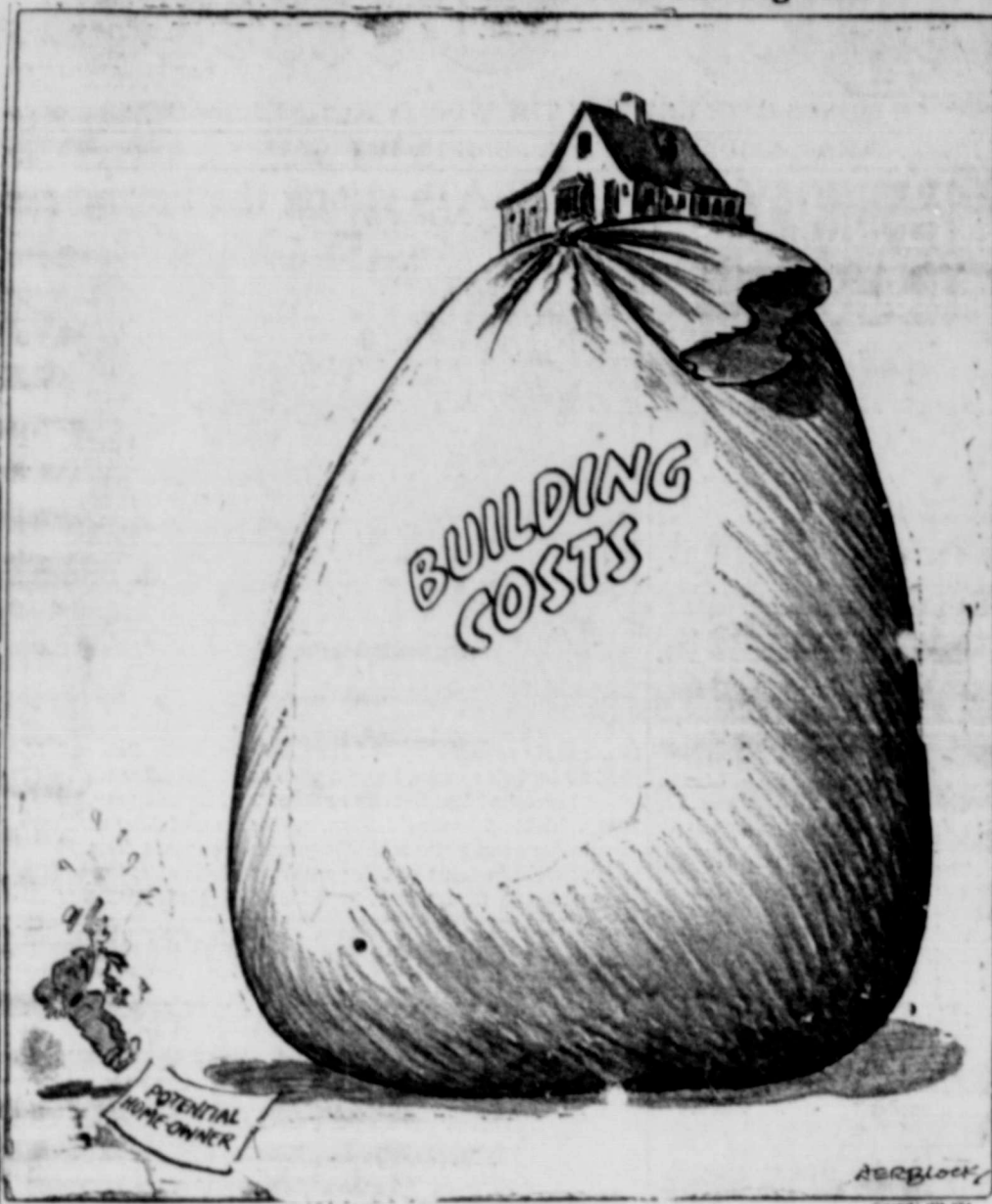

**Japan's Demands May Be Serious British Problem**  
By United Press  
LONDON, June 16.—If Japan's new demands against Britain in China persist, an extremely serious situation will arise and the British government "will have to consider what immediate active steps it can take to protect British interests in China," a semi-official statement said today.  
The statement said British circles cannot help but "take the most serious view of the further demands which have been made, and which raise the widest issues affecting the rights of all those powers which have treaty rights in China."  
Referring to the recent threatening statements of the Japanese spokesman in Tientsin, the statement continued:  
"It is clear from these statements that the surrender of the four strategic Chinese prospects can no longer be regarded as the reason for the imposition of measures against the British Concession."

### Cotton Exports Are Given Insurance In War Danger

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Extended protection of foreign-bound cargoes of American cotton against war dangers on the high seas has been announced by Everett R. Cook, chairman of the war risk committee of the National Cotton Council.

Under arrangements completed with cotton underwriters and confirmed by the Insurance Underwriters Association, cotton cargoes have been made subject to insurance binders as much as thirty days in advance of sailing, adding 23 days to the previous seventy-day limit.

The extended contract was prepared and submitted for confirmation at conferences in New York attended by the war risk insurance committees of the Council and of the American Cotton Shippers Association, together with representatives of underwriters and of leading New York banks.

government in case of war, for In announcing extension of insurance limits by private companies Mr. Cook declared that the two committees would continue to press vigorously their efforts to obtain government guarantee against confiscation or requisition of American cotton after arrival in foreign ports, and against losses which might be incurred through blocking of currency.

"Present arrangements protect cotton exports as long as they remain on board ship, up to 15 days after arrival at a foreign port," said Mr. Cook, "but there is still no protection during the period between unloading and final receipt of payment. The individual shipper remains liable for confiscation of his goods by a foreign government in case of a change in government such as that which occurred in Spain, and for blocked currency in case a foreign government changes by arbitrary decree its legal methods of reimbursement. No insurance against such exigencies is available through private companies."
