City toughens vendor laws

First bales come in

The county's first reported bales of 1982 cotton were ginned Monday and Tuesday at Easter and Hart.

Ronnie Wheelless stripped the first full bale Monday. It was grown on the Lamar Estate land near Easter.

Ginning was completed at 5:05 p.m. Monday at Easter

Community Gin, Inc. manager Thomas "Skinny" Gage reported.

The cotton was machine stripped off of two acres. Wheelless said he expects to make about three-fourths of a bale to the acre.

For a first-bale bonus, the gin paid Wheelless \$1 a pound for the cotton, \$100 a ton for seed and provided free ginning.

The cotton was Gregg 35-XL variety, planted May 9 and irrigated once. It was produced from 2,100 pounds of seed cotton. The bale produced 504 pounds of lint and 800 pounds of seed.

Ginners were Lester Gatlin and Alberto Rivera.

A hand-picked bale was ginned Tuesday at Hart Gin, according to manager Gary Aycock.

"The cotton is opened up," said Army Armstrong of Bruegel Brothers Gin in Frio. "That little freeze Tuesday night ought to help."

Armstrong also expects to begin ginning around the first of November.

Mike Bryant of Five Point Farmers Gin estimated that his gin would probably start receiving cotton around Nov. 1.

"I think the cotton will be better than everyone thought earlier," Bryant said. He said a lot of the cotton in his area could make a bale to the acre, when earlier it didn't look like it would.

Crime Line offers \$500 in rewards

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen Monday night passed on the first reading a new ordinance governing itinerant merchants and vendors in the city.

The ordinance requires itinerant merchants, peddlers, door-to-door salesmen, etc., to obtain a city license before selling their merchandise or services in Dimmitt.

Application for a license must be made at least five days in advance when the applicant expects to begin selling or exhibiting his wares, and must be accompanied by a \$60 application fee. The license is good for a period of 30 days and must be applied for through the chief of police. Ventures employing more than one person must obtain a license for each person.

An applicant also must be fingerprinted and supply a personal photograph; have a certified copy of charter if incorporated, or a permit to do business in the state of Texas if unincorporated; have interstate sales tax permit or interstate commerce vendor's number; and purchase a \$2,000 bond.

The ordinance will NOT apply to wholesalers selling to retailers; vendors of farm produce, poultry, stock or agricultural products in their natural state; sale of goods for charitable or religious causes; exhibits or sales at fairs, etc., which are sponsored by civic, church or Chamber of Commerce groups; food vendors who regularly deliver to homes at least once a month; garage sales not longer than seven days nor more often than twice a year; or anyone already licensed by the state, such as in insurance or real estate.

City aldermen seemed reluctant at first to approve the ordinance, saying that it seemed too oppressive and possibly would be too difficult to enforce.

Police Chief Don Franklin said that he felt it would make his job easier to have the ordinance in force.

"I'd hate to see a case like some area towns have had of people coming in and gyping a lot of older people and then skipping out with no means of coming back on them," Franklin said.

Chamber of Commerce Board Member Leroy Maxwell said that the chamber's intent in recommending the

ordinance was to make it hard on such people.

"We just don't want them here. They don't contribute anything to our community in the way of taxes or community service. They just take money out of our economy, and oftentimes are selling inferior merchandise," Maxwell said.

The license permits can be revoked for any fraud or false statement made in the application or in connection with the selling of goods, as well as for failing to leave the premises of a customer when asked to do so. A penalty of up to \$200 can be assessed for selling without a license or violating any other provision of the ordinance.

A copy of the entire ordinance and the rest of the details of its provisions may be obtained from the city hall or from City Manager Paul Catoe.

In other business, the board spoke with Pete Stewart, manager of Goodpasture, Inc., who reported that his company is planning to install a holding dike for emergency disposal of the plant's waste water at times when the city sewer system is unable to handle the additional flow.

Stewart said that Amstar was unwilling to take the Goodpasture effluent into its waste-water lake. He added that the dike would be constructed as soon as the equipment came available to use.

Goodpasture pays the city for the privilege of putting its waste water into the city system, since the industry is located out of the city limits. The agreement is governed by a contract which is due to expire soon.

The board informed Stewart that the city plans to ask for an increase in the amount paid. Currently, Goodpasture pays the city 20 cents per 1,000 gallons of its water which the city takes into its system. The board requested that the rate be increased to 30 cents per 1,000 gallons. Stewart replied that he would have to consult his superiors, but that he foresaw no problems with the figure.

Also concerning water, John Alldredge asked the board about the status of his agreement with the city concerning use of water from the city's playa lake that holds effluent from the sewer plant.

Catoe said that the agreement (Continued on Page 9)

Corn-flake makers plan 'Texas tests'

Will Post Toasties and Kellogg's Corn Flakes someday be made from Texas corn?

The Texas Corn Growers Association hopes so, and has shipped samples of three varieties of locally grown corn to Kellogg's and General Foods for testing.

If the two big cereal manufacturers decide that Texas corn is better for corn flakes, it could lead to some hefty new food grain contracts for local farmers.

TCGA President Carl King shipped approximately 600 pounds of three yellow corn varieties to the companies Friday for laboratory testing.

King said he hopes to hear from the companies in about a month or so.

"This has been a goal of Texas Corn Growers for several years," King said, "to secure additional food grain contracts."

King and Weldon Davis,

chairman of the Texas Corn Producers Board and the High Plains Farm Bargaining Association, visited Battle Creek, Mich., recently to discuss the possibilities with the cereal manufacturers.

"They were interested in the hard-kernel yellow variety to use for cereal production," King said. There is less waste with hard-kernel corn.

He added, "Our corn has a longer growing season than in other areas. It has more BTU's (energy). It dries out better and makes a better quality corn."

"I told them we could certainly produce the variety of corn they wanted."

"Their concern was, could we raise enough to supply them, and I assured them we could if the price was right to the farmer."

The corn which King shipped was grown in test plots by different feed companies and farmers in this area.

Farm Bureau adopts policy resolutions

Members of the Castro County Farm Bureau adopted policy resolutions Saturday night calling for:

- Abolishment of the ad valorem (property) tax and its replacement by a designated state sales tax;
- A mandatory set-aside of 50% of all cropland, with a 25% paid diversion until carryover stocks are virtually eliminated;
- Abolishment of the commodity reserve program;
- Abolishment of the Federal Crop Insurance Program;
- Establishment by the USDA of a national quota on every crop to limit production;
- Raising of the loan levels on crops to the current target prices, and elimination of target prices;
- A 30-day deadline for the USDA to make its payments to individual producers; and
- Limitation to two consecutive terms for all elected state and county officials.

The county Farm Bureau convention, held in the Dimmitt High School cafeteria, drew the largest crowd in recent years, with 179 registering. Those attending were treated to a chicken-and-fish dinner catered by Southern Sea, with homemade ice cream for dessert.

New directors elected Saturday night are Rick Wright, Charles Summers, Tommy Stanton, Teddy Smithson, Steve Nutt, Brock Merritt, Gaylord Cogburn and Kevin Acker.

County FB President Gale Sadler of Sunnyside, who is retiring from the board, commented in his annual report to the members that "there's a lot of work to be done both locally and statewide — especially locally."

"The main criticism I've heard as president is that sometimes the state and national Farm Bureau policy doesn't reflect our own," Sadler said. "One standard answer to this problem is to join another organization, but I don't believe that's neces-

sarily the only way. I think increased participation by our county organization in state and national activities can bring about change at those levels."

He added, "We need to voice our opinions, take part, and realize our ideas are important, too, and that the whole organization is made up of people."

Sadler noted that the Castro County Farm Bureau took full delegations to most of the state conventions during his years as president, and that several policy resolutions that originated here were adopted by the state organization. One local policy resolution went all the way to the national convention, he added.

The banquet speaker was S. M. True, state director and one of two candidates for state president.

"1982 has been a successful year, but not without problems," True reported. "During the special session of the legislature, the state board worked in Austin on Proposition 3, exempting cattle, farm machinery and other personal property from state taxes," True explained. "The Texas Farm Bureau was the prime motivator of Proposition 3 being put on the ballot. The attorney general came back with a limitation of \$15,000 per individual and \$30,000 per couple. This was not the original intent of those who drafted Proposition 3. We're working to get the exemption back to its original intent."

True reported that Texas Farm Bureau membership may reach 300,000 this year, "quite a significant growth."

The three youths whom the County Farm Bureau sponsored at the Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar at Baylor University last summer also gave reports on the seminar. They were Tammie Heck of Nazareth, Coy Myrick of Hart and Joe Sauseda of Dimmitt.

Warrants are pending in assault, shooting

District Attorney Jimmy Davis said this week he is hoping warrants will be issued soon in connection with a recent assault on a Dimmitt police officer and a separate shooting incident.

Davis said that in both

cases officials are waiting on key witnesses to give sworn statements.

A 21-year-old California man is a suspect in the alleged assault on Dimmitt Police Officer Calvin Davenport.

The incident occurred Oct. 9, when the officer was attempting to arrest the man on suspicion of driving while intoxicated.

According to police officials, the suspect struck the officer and fled the scene on foot. Officer Davenport caught the suspect, and during a struggle, the man grabbed the officer's flashlight and struck him several times on the head and face. Davenport was treated at Plains Memorial Hospital and has since returned to patrol duties.

Eliseo Tobar of Dimmitt was arrested Oct. 10 in connection with the shooting of Daniel Pena of Hereford. Pena was wounded in the elbow. Police said the two men had been arguing during the evening at a local club. In the parking lot, after a struggle, Tobar allegedly went to his vehicle, got a .22 caliber revolver and shot Pena.

According to Davis, Pena has not yet signed a complaint, so Tobar was released and no warrant has been issued.

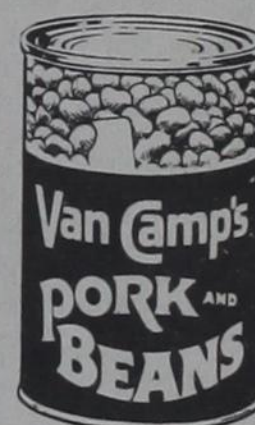

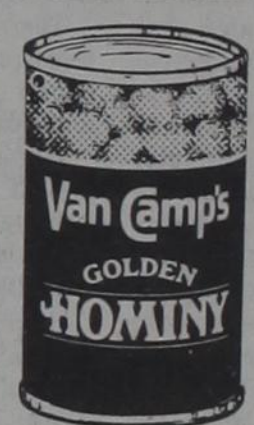

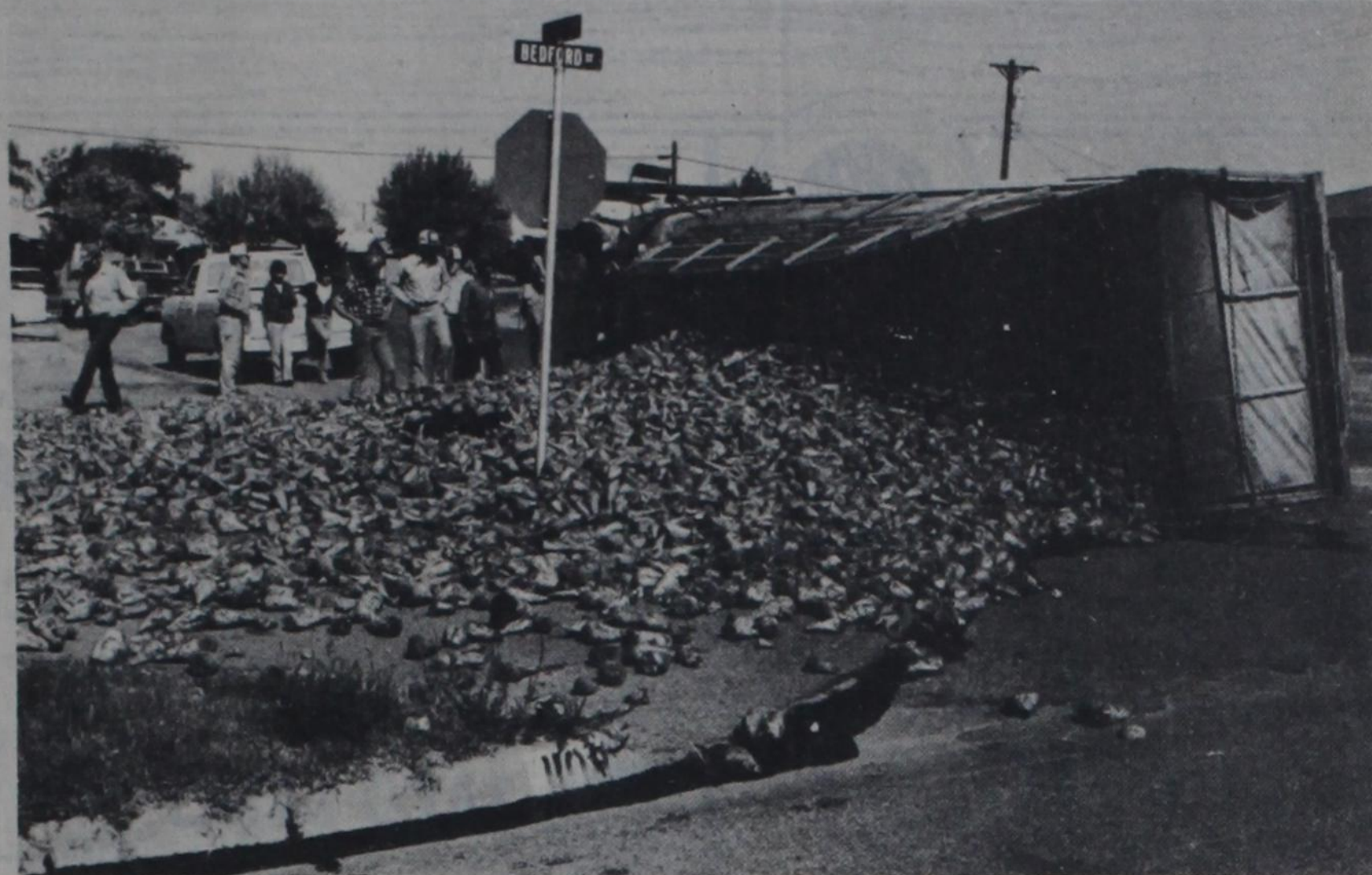

ASCS gives warning

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service cautions farmers not to jeopardize their eligibility for the farm-stored loan program by removing grain without permission. Any removal of mortgaged loan collateral before repayment of the loan is considered unauthorized removal and could result in severe penalties. Program regulations require that farmers contact ASCS if they plan to sell grain under loan, or if it is in poor condition and needs to be moved. Charley Hill, County Executive Director, says if the grain is to be used for feed, the loan must be repaid before it is removed from the storage bin.

Farmers who remove farm-stored grain without prior authorization from ASCS will be subject to having the loan called and could be denied future farm-stored loans.

Hill says the program is designed to help strengthen farm prices by providing loans to farmers for holding their grain off the market until prices increase.

East Germans to visit here

West Texas grain sorghum farmers will host a feed grain and livestock team from the German Democratic Republic (East Germany) Oct. 27-31. The team will be in the area to study the potential of grain sorghum in their livestock feed.

Bringing this team to West Texas is a part of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers' Board's continuing effort to increase sales of grain sorghum.

East German livestock producers are not currently buying grain sorghum according to TGSPB Executive Director Elbert Harp.

"They will not buy sorghum, regardless of prices, until the men on this team are convinced that grain sorghum is a good livestock feed," Harp said.

The East German team will make a stop at Taylor Feedlot the morning of Oct. 29, eat lunch at K-Bob's Steak House at about 1 p.m. and visit Estacado Lamb Feeding Division that afternoon.

Fire calls

The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. had two calls the past week.

At 7:05 a.m. Wednesday, a call came in reporting smoke at the Fred Bruegel Jr. home five miles west of Dimmitt. The county pumper, rescue unit and station wagon went to the scene along with 21 firefighters.

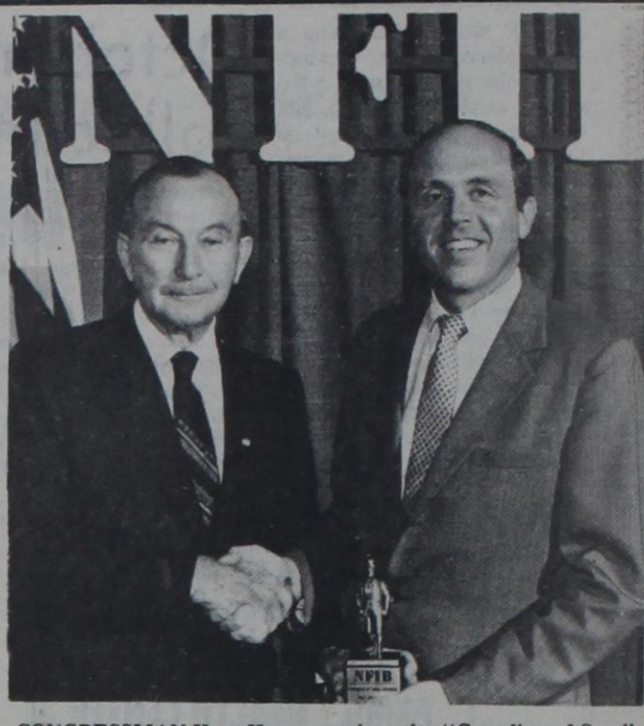
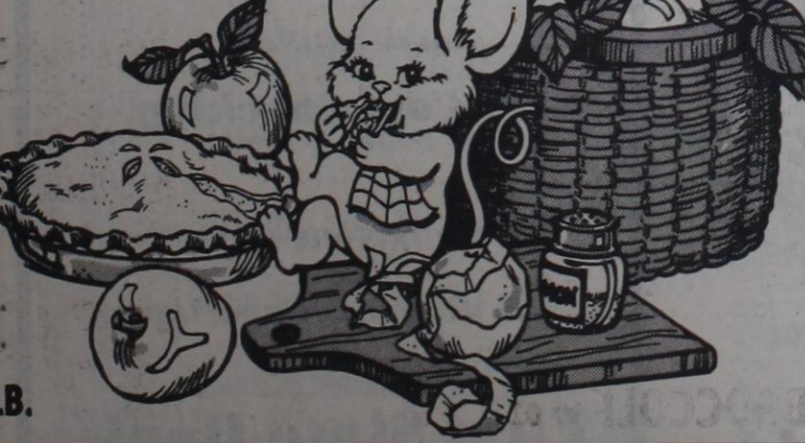

November harvest better for beets

Starting sugarbeet harvest about Nov. 1 will produce maximum tonnage and sugar. Growers that harvest earlier will reduce yield and returns. Delaying harvest after Nov. 1 is not likely to increase yield much, but greatly increases the possibility of bad weather and harvest problems.

Dr. Steve Winter, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Sugarbeet Researcher from the Texas A&M Center at Amarillo came to this conclusion after four years of research. Each year Mono-Hy D2 sugarbeets were planted in March in Pullman clay loam soil at the USDA Conservation and Production Research Laboratory at Bushland. The sugarbeets were managed for high yields.

Each year the researcher harvested the sugarbeets at two week intervals from Sept. 1 to Nov. 9. Percent sucrose and tons of roots were determined.

On the average, by Sept. 1, beet yield was 24 tons per acre. By Nov. 9, tonnage increased to 31 tons per acre. During the same time sugar percentage increased from 13.5 to 16.0.

Winter said in the first two weeks after Sept. 1 sugarbeet yield increased about 3 tons per acre. After that the increase was less each subsequent two week period. This increase in tonnage was consistent from year to year, regardless of yield level, which varied from a maximum of 26 to 36 tons per acre.

Weather greatly influenced change in sucrose content after Sept. 1. In two of the years weather was dry with warm sunny days and cool nights. These conditions favored rapid increase in sucrose up to 17.5% by Nov. 9. The other two years the weather was cool and cloudy with above normal precipitation. Under these conditions root weight increased rapidly. However, sucrose content increased slowly and did not reach a high level.

Winter also learned that sugar accumulation stops when the temperature drops to 24 degrees. Leaves may stay green but no longer manufacture sugar. The researcher says the average date for reaching 24 degrees is about Nov. 10 with extremes of mid October to late November. "Once 24 degrees is reached, sugarbeets should be harvested as soon as possible because value of the crop can not increase," Winter said.

Along with increased tonnage and sucrose content, the value of the crop increased with each two week period. On Sept. 1 the value of the crop averaged \$619 per acre. Two weeks later in September the value of the crop increased over \$100 per acre. An additional increase of \$140 per acre occurred during October and another \$47 the first two weeks in November.

Winter says selecting the proper harvest date makes a big difference in returns from sugarbeets. Harvesting about Nov. 1 will give the maximum yield of sugar and increase gross return up to \$400 per acre over harvesting on Sept. 1.

All family net income and all medical expenses of the family affect the amount of VA pensions; so be sure to have that information to expedite filling out the AIQ forms, which must be in the mails before the end of 1982 or one will not receive a January pension check due Feb. 1.

The fifth and sixth grade youngsters are members of two stamp collecting clubs formed in September, and are

sponsored by sixth grade teachers Glenda Sims and Lana Downing. Dimmitt Postmaster Bill Sava is acting as advisor to the clubs.

The theme for National Stamp Collecting Months is "Discover Stamp Collecting - The Hobby of a Lifetime." The special observance is being sponsored in cooperation with the Council of Philatelic Organizations (CPO).

A current project of the local clubs is participation in the nationwide stampdesigning project. The project will result in the issuance of the first US postage stamp based on an original design submitted through a school project.

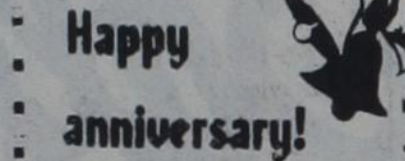

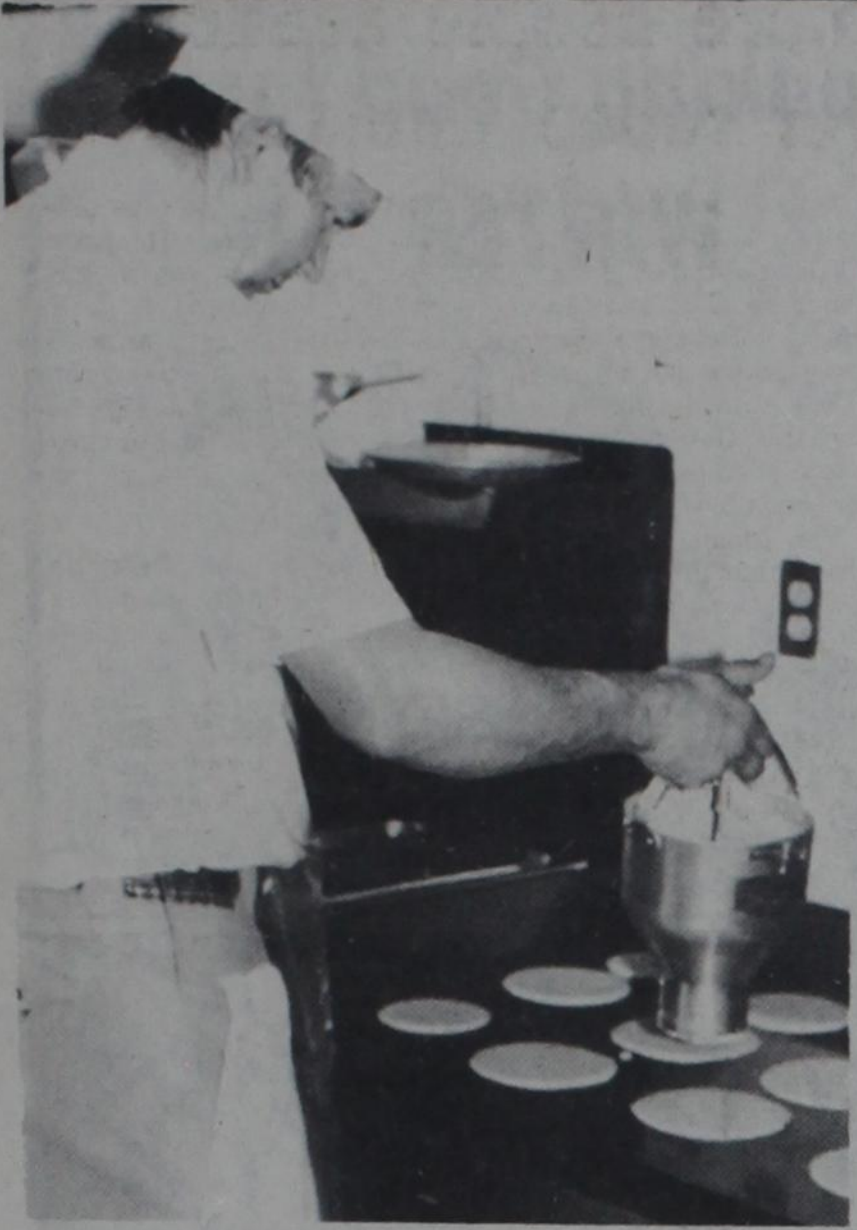

He defeated the incumbent in the democratic primaries, and should be an easy winner in the upcoming election.

It has been mentioned a number of times that Governor Clements is the first republican to be elected Governor of Texas in more than a hundred years. If he is a fair example of what the republicans have to offer, that is too often.

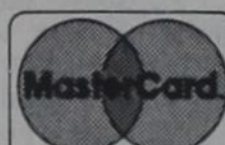

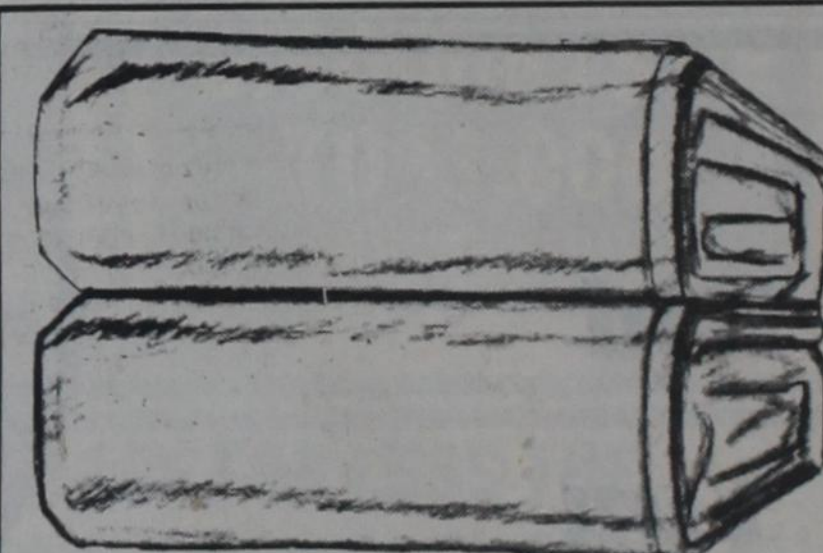

Mules use long strikes to edge Bobcats, 21-14

Every coach hopes that the big play can be counted on at any time.

It was indeed a big-play night Friday as Muleshoe scored with 35 seconds left to take a 21-14 win over Dimmitt at Bobcat Stadium.

The Bobcats, who had come from behind twice to tie the score, held Muleshoe in check most of the night, but two passes and three running plays spelled the difference for the Mules, now 5-2.

Darin Shaw, who caught only two Sammy Gonzales throws during the game, used both of the grabs to set up touchdowns, while Alex Paez, who gained 225 yards on the night, held the Bobcats at bay in the second half.

Shaw, a lanky junior, had two grabs for 65 yards. The first catch, a 29-yarder, came early in the game at the Dimmitt 20. The Mules scored six plays later as Paez went in from three yards out with 7:12 left in the opening stanza. It capped a 68-yard opening drive.

Paez, who carried the ball 18 times in the game, had just 31 yards in the first half on seven carries, and had just four carries good for more than 10 yards. His 38-yard carry early in the second half got the Mules out of a deep hole, while Sid Sageser charged from behind to bring him down at the Dimmitt 18 later in the period after a 48-yard carry.

It was a 73-yard jaunt on third down, though, that really stung the Bobcats. Paez, cutting across the grain, knifed through the Dimmitt defense and sped untouched to the end zone.

Dimmitt used the big play effectively, too. With the option slowed to a standstill by the Mules' string-em-out defense, the Bobcats' most effective weapon, QB Richard Guzman, was held in check. Guzman, who carried for more than a hundred yards against Littlefield, could gain just 54 steps against the Mules.

After spotting Muleshoe a seven-point lead and, following a 51-yard punt by Jeff

Watts, the Bobcats drove 82 yards for the tying touchdown. Defensive back Dwight McDonald, who was interfered with by Muleshoe's Jeff Hamilton on the play, picked off a Gonzales pass at the Bobcat 18. The Bobcats moved quickly to two first downs, but lost four yards on three plays after moving into Muleshoe territory. On third down, the Bobcats brought wingback Bill Johnson across the backfield.

Johnson, who had been subjected to some hard clouts on earlier carries, was given a gaping hole on the Bobcats' right side, and scooted 48 yards. Johnny Nino tacked on the extra point to knot the score at 7-all with nine seconds left in the first quarter.

The middle two periods were scoreless, though each team squandered scoring chances.

Muleshoe had four shots at the Bobcats from the Dimmitt 18, but two penalties negated gains, and McDonald had a knock-down on the fourth-down throw by Gonzales.

Dimmitt had an even better chance, which was set up by a Bobcat quick-kick. The Bobcats had been bottled up deep in their own end of the field and Guzman, who lined up at tailback on the play, booted the ball 47 yards.

After forcing Muleshoe's only punt of the second half, Dimmitt moved the ball down the field. Guzman hit two passes, a seven-yarder to McDonald and a 12-yard toss to fullback Johnny Gonzales. But the drive stalled, and Johnny Nino was called on to try a 35-yard field goal. The kick from the left hash mark just missed to the right at the end of the third quarter.

Paez's 73-yard jaunt came just 45 seconds later, putting the Mules on top at 14-7, but Dimmitt knotted the score five minutes later, again using the big gainer.

Guzman floated to his left and center Rodney Hunter afforded him time to throw with a crunching block that knocked two Mules to the turf. The senior quarterback found tight end Watts at the

Muleshoe 35. Watts was set free on a block from split end Brad Holcomb, and raced the last 30 yards for the 58-yard play. Nino's extra-point kick tied the score at 14-14 with 6:59 left.

Forcing a 29-yard Muleshoe punt on the next possession, the Bobcats went to work at their own 44. After an eight-yard gain by Guzman, full-back Johnny Gonzales picked up a first down at the Mules' 43 with three minutes left to play. Four tries into the line, though, netted just nine yards, and the Bobcats gave the ball back to the Mules on downs with two minutes left.

After Paez picked up 27 yards on three carries, Gonzales hit Shaw with a 36-yard pass to the Bobcat 19. Gonzales' two-yard jaunt

came with just 35 seconds left.

Muleshoe is now 5-2 on the year and 2-0 in district. Dimmitt stands at 3-4, the first time this year the Bobcats have been below .500, and 0-2 in district. The Mules will face Littlefield this week, while Dimmitt will go to Friona.

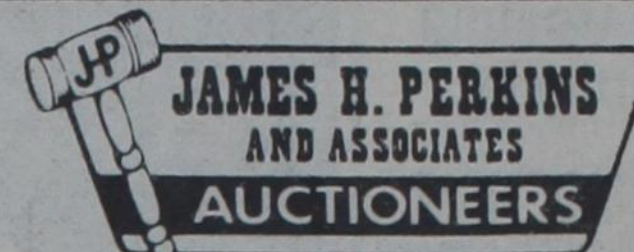
quently, they will be unable to field enough for a game Friday at Nazareth.

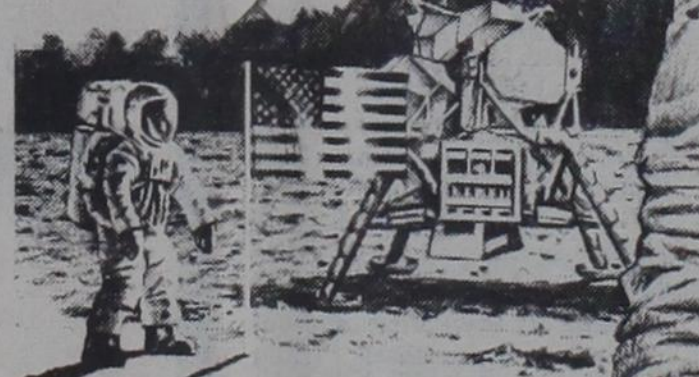

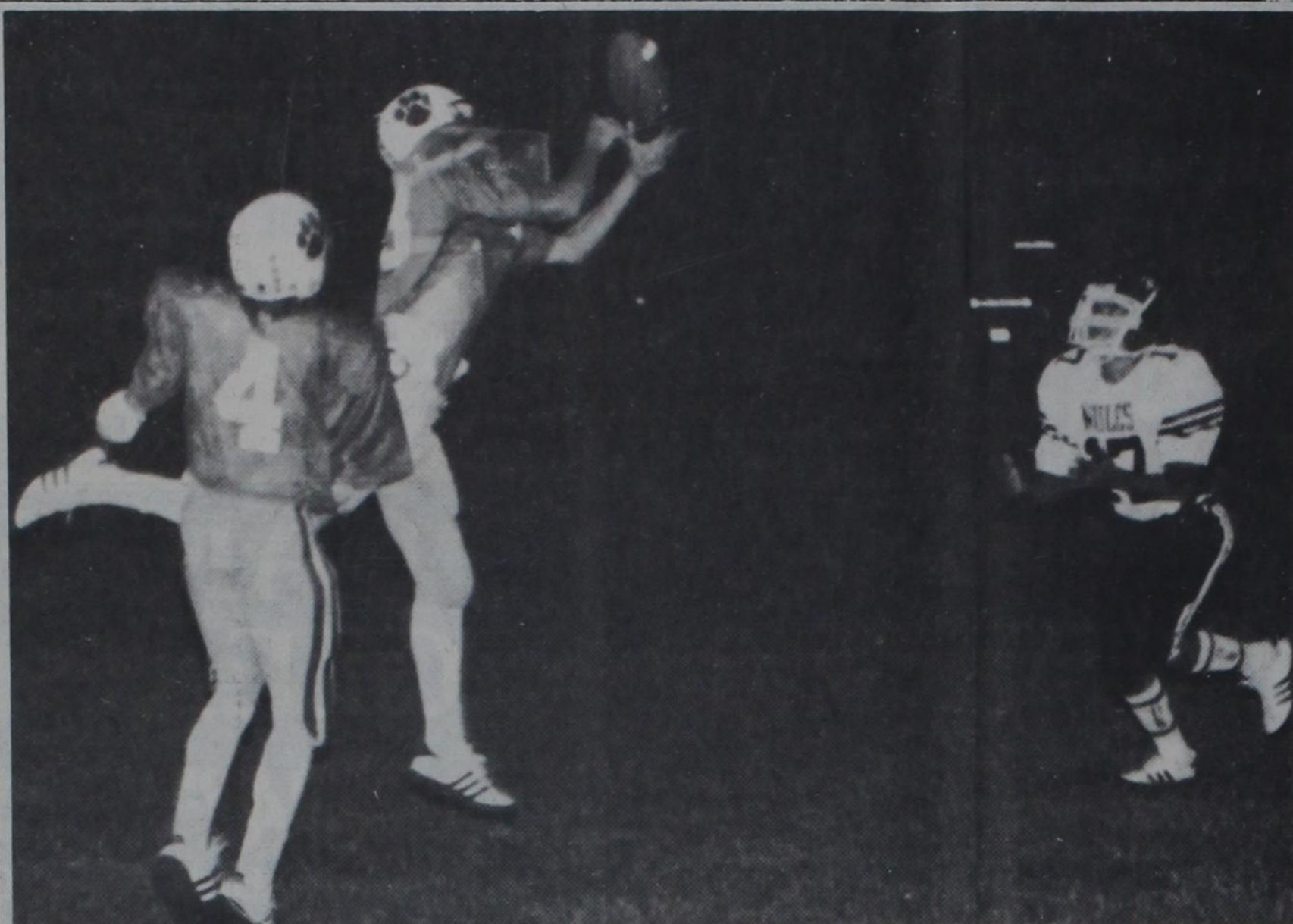

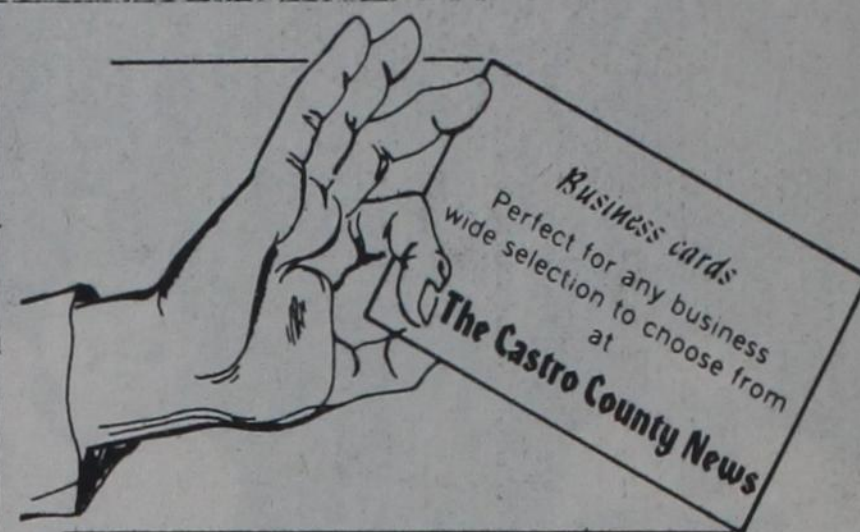

Mustangs blank Longhorns, 40-0

Olton's Mustangs continued to flex their muscles for the second straight week as they shut out the Hart Longhorns by a 40-0 count in the Olton High School Homecoming game Friday night.

The Mustangs opened the game by fumbling on the first play from scrimmage, but they immediately got the ball back as they forced the Longhorns into a fumble. It took Olton only three plays then to cover 75 yards for the game's first score. Gary Johnson carried in from 19 yards out with 2:46 gone in the initial period, putting the Mustangs on top 6-0.

The Ponies scored on their next possession, covering 62 yards in seven plays with half-back Edward Wright sweeping left end from 15 yards out with 4:39 still left in the first

period. Don Allcorn's PAT kick upped Olton's lead to 13-0.

The Longhorn defense stiffened, but it was the lack of offense that kept giving Olton chances to drive the ball.

In the second period, with Olton driving into Hart territory, Longhorn linebacker Chris Reyna intercepted a pass to apparently stop a Mustang threat, but a roughing the passer penalty gave the Ponies another chance, and they took advantage of it. Four plays later, it was Edward Wright carrying over from five yards out to put the Mustangs on top by a 19-0 count with 7:46 remaining in the half.

On the Longhorns' next possession, punter Robert Martinez was roughed up on his kick to give Hart its only first down of the half. But the Longhorns couldn't find any consistency in the first half as a fired-up and swarming Mustang defense played extremely well.

Olton closed out the scoring in the first half with halfback Gilbert Garcia diving over on fourth down from one yard out with 1:01 left in the second period. Mustang signal caller Gary Johnson passed to tight end Patrick White for two points, giving Olton a commanding 27-0 halftime lead.

In the second half, Hart was able to put together a little more offense, primarily behind the passing of Coy Myrick and Kerry Newsom and the running of Robert Martinez. However, the Olton defense was able to come up with the big plays to keep the Longhorns out of the end zone.

Midway through the third period, the Mustangs put together an impressive drive that consumed 76 yards in 11 plays, with Gary Johnson carrying over from three yards out with 5:01 remaining. Olton now led 33-0.

Early in the fourth quarter, Hart was facing a fourth-and-long when Longhorn punter Robert Martinez crossed up the defense by running a fake punt 35 yards down to the 7-yard line. But the Mustang defense stiffened up and held off the Longhorns on four downs to keep their shutout intact. From there, Olton took the ball and drove the length of the field in only seven plays, with quarterback Johnson passing to Joe Sanchez for the final 43 yards and the score. Don Allcorn added the PAT kick to raise the final score to 40-0.

Hart Coach Ken Hoskins commented, "We just did not play well as a team tonight. Our offense was really sluggish and our defense gave up

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

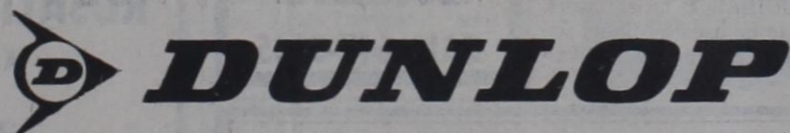

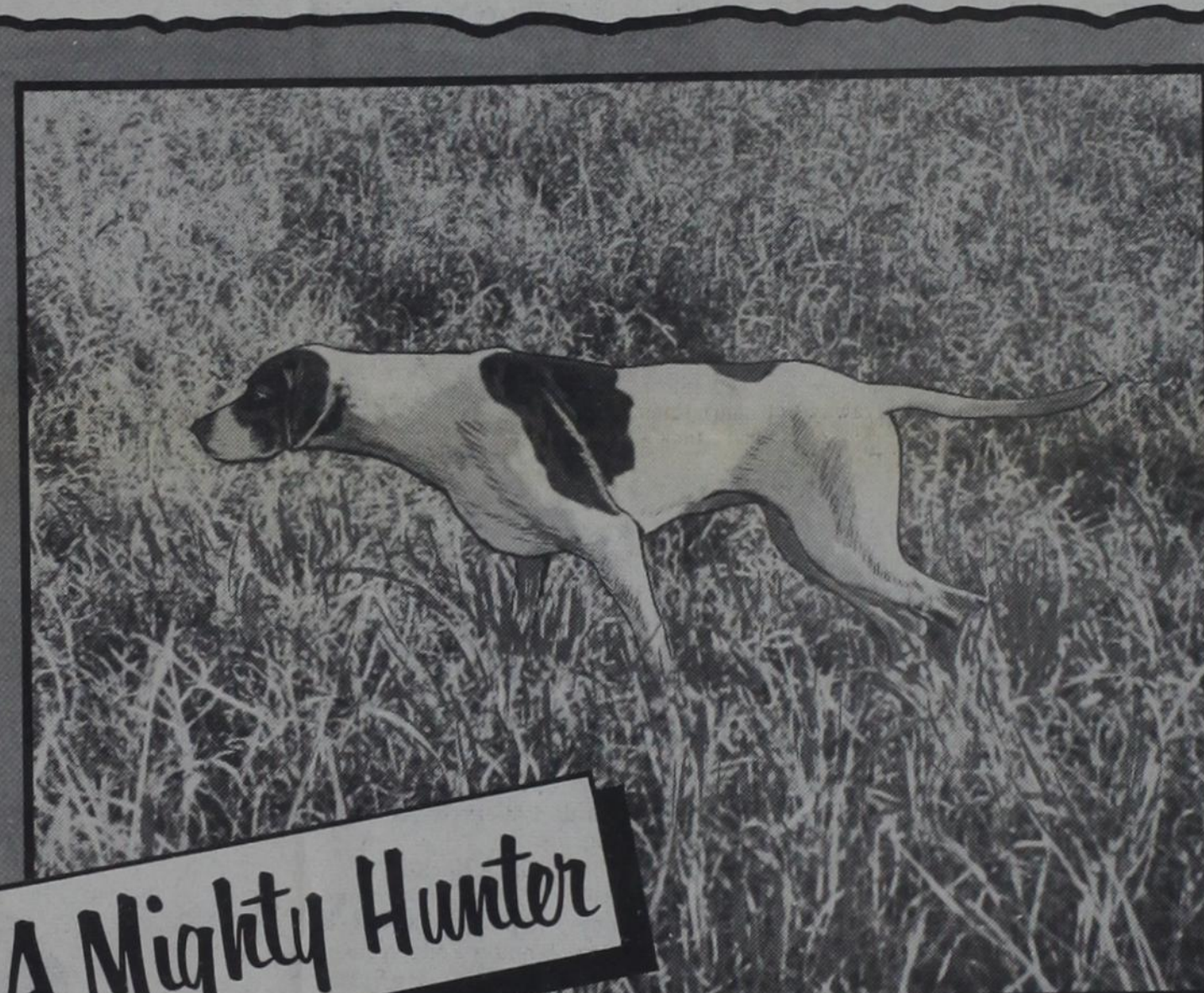

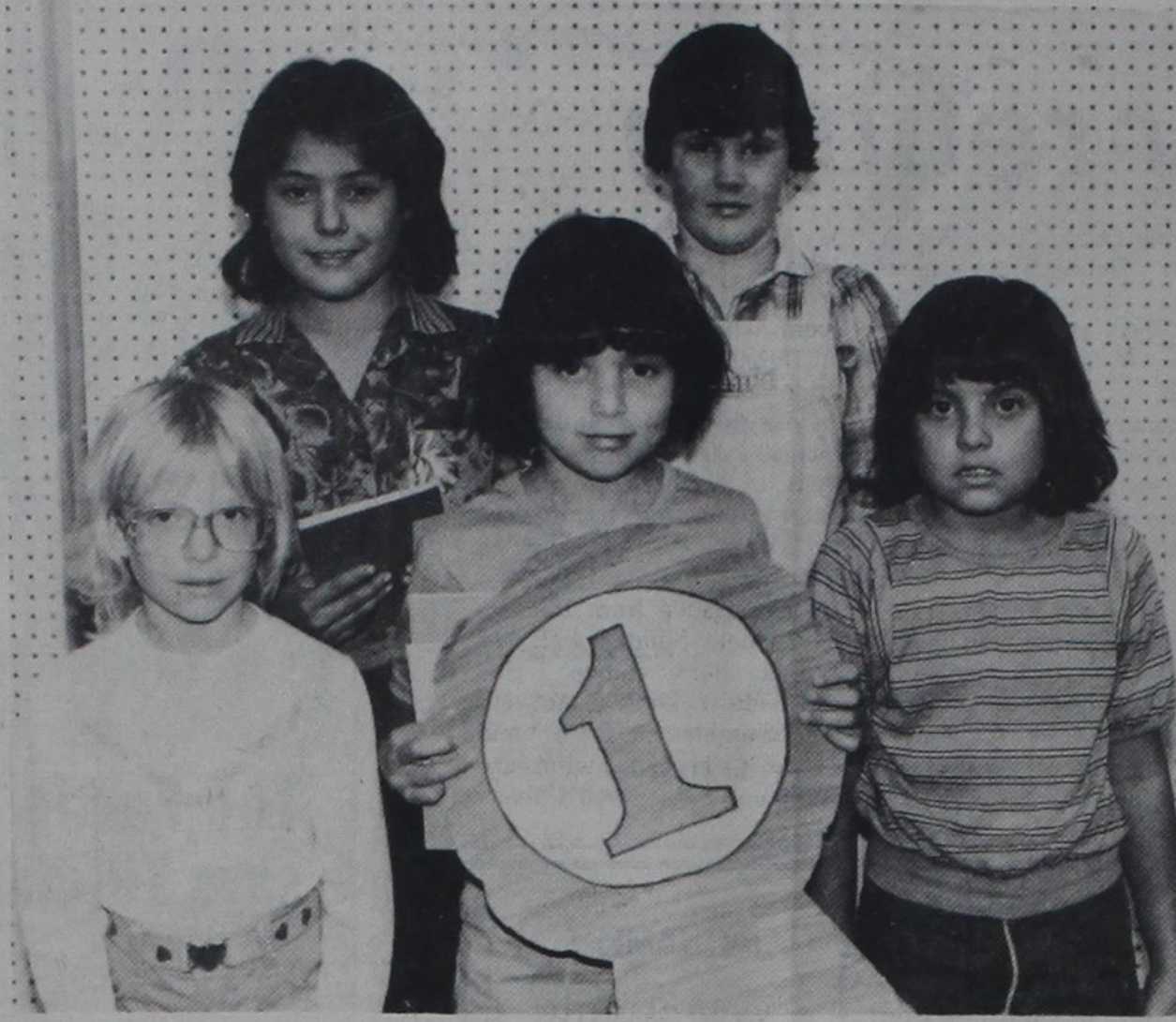
Clarence Kerns of Plainview, spokesman for Pioneer Hi-Bred International, Southern Region Division, said the initial scholarship to be presented in 1983 will be the first in a series of four to be awarded in consecutive years. "We are pleased that Pioneer Hi-Bred International has elected to fund a 4-H scholarship in Texas," said Dr. John Pelham, state 4-H and youth leader with the Extension Service.
