Last week I picked up my column from the same week a year ago. It was just a lazy way of saying something that needed to be said at the time. But for something really old, and illuminating, I lifted an editorial from the Progressive Farmer dated June 1934.

That editorial was written 49 years ago and in light of today's agricultural plight it is worth serious consideration. The piece from the Farmer follows:

WHY THE BANKHEAD LAW?

When depression became deadliest in 1932, manufacturers cut production as follows: iron and steel, to 31 per cent of normal; automobiles, 35; bituminous coal, 59; anthracite, 62; textiles, 83. But that same year 2,000,000 hopelessly scattered cotton farmers saw cotton production climb to 104 per cent of normal and prices of course went from bad to worse.

Last year they tried controlled production and doubled cotton prices so that on December 16 in Birmingham Secretary Wallace said: "The agricultural South leads the nation in recovery.'

Need we be surprised then that in January, 94.8 per cent of the cotton farmers to whom the United States Department of Agriculture sent its questionnaire, voted for continued control through some such plan as the Bankhead Bill? What farmers could not do for themselves to adjust supply to demand they can do through the new law's self-imposed cooperation. As Secretary Wallace told Nebraska farmers April 23:

"The farmers of the South have an extraordinarily cooperative attitude toward their great cotton crop."

Thus the enterprise of Southern farmers insures that again in 1934 "the South will again lead the agricultural recovery," as Secretary Wallace said it did in 1933.

Of course there are many kinks yet to straighten out before the Bankhead Law works as smoothly as it ought. But it does this supremely important thing: For the first time since the Machine Age began, farmers have an equal opportunity with Industry to do what twentieth century conditions absolutely demand - adjust supply to demand so that that famous law may become the producer's helpful servant instead of his tyrannous master.

The details are as yet imperfect, but the principle is emphatically sound.

According to a table of figures in the article the price of cotton had increased 100% between 1932 and 1934 while the price of grain increased

77%. The Progressive Farmer told it like it is. Farmers must have some means of regulating supply in balance with demand or suffer the consequences of glutted markets. The current PIK program should have some effect on the price of farm produce but a one-time shot won't do it. It must be an ongoing program if we are to have anything like lasting prosperity in the agricultural sector.

The economic health of agriculture today is just about in the same condition as it was in 1932. The same remedy necessary to get it back on the road to recovery in the '30s will work in the

The Castro County Agricultural Housing Project, known popularly here for years as the "labor camp," has a new name: Azteca Complex.

Larry Gonzales, president of the Azteca Economic Development Corp., announced the official name change at Azteca's first annual banquet Saturday evening in the County Expo Building.

Azteca is now the agent of record for the huge housing project, which has been plagued through the years by vandalism, financial woes and class-action lawsuits. Under Azteca's supervision, the project is just one of several programs which Azteca envisions to help low-income people in the area, Gonzales

"We will be building more rent housing in the future," Gonzales said. "Our corporation is so flexible that we can work just about any kind of program we care to get into."

Miguel Zuniga of Carlsbad, N.M., who received a special award plaque Saturday night for his work as a co-founder of Azteca while he lived here, traced the growth of the corporation, which was organized in 1979 "when several Hispanic people got together with a common wish that they could have some input into the community's direction, and that they could help the lower-income people in the community.'

Azteca was first organized to develop low-rent housing here, but later was named by the Farmers Home Administration to take over the operation of the agricultural workers' housing project.

Azteca's future plans, Zuniga said, "are related to this same goal - to help those people in need. I think Castro County will become very important because of this effort.'

During nearly three years of operation, approximately 7,000 Italian soldiers were imprisoned. Through their work on area farms and such projects as the painting of religious murals in St. Mary's Catholic Church at Umbarger (25 miles northeast), many of the soldiers made lasting friendships with local residents and with American troops at the camp. The center's chapel, constructed by the prisoners, is the only building remaining at the site."

Her chosen place: Pakistan hospital

Multan, Pakistan, is hardly the place one would expect to find someone from Dimmitt. But in Multan, that is exactly what one would find.

Sharon Barker, a registered nurse and midwife, is a medical missionary at the Women's Christian Hospital in Multan.

She has served half of her initial three-year term as a nurse and midwife in Pakistan. She is currently on a month's leave, and is visiting her parents, Elvis and Joy Barker.

"I wanted to work specifically among Muslims, because there are not many missionaries among them," Barker

Being a Western woman in a Muslim country, Barker had to make certain adjustments.

"Adjusting went more smoothly than I expected. God helped me to adjust slowly," she said.

more modest in their dress and are rarely seen without husbands or other female members of the family. Western woman alone in public usually sparks atten-

'Because of our dress style and independence, they think we have lower morals that their women." Barker said.

Adjustments also had to be made medically. Muslim people are so poor that only basic hospital care can be

"A combination of poverty and lack of education work together to result in a high

infant mortality," she explained.

The people of Pakistan do not understand how to clean baby bottles.

Disease-carrying flies land on baby bottles and further spread infection, so the hospital tries to promote breast feeding. Because of the poverty, they cannot give the right proportion of powdered milk or formula. Another health hazard develops when expectant mothers go to untrained midwives for pre-natal care. These midwives often give the mother injections

that harm the unborn child. When they seek our medical help our decision has almost already been made for us. We have to see the mother's life as being more valuable than the child's in this culture. Consequently the baby's life sometimes has to be sacrificed for the sake of the mother's.

Barker's training for her Muslim women are much missionary work involved six years of preparation beginning with nursing school at the University of Texas School of Nursing in San Antonio. She then attended Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary in South Hamilton, Mass. Her final step of training was a year in midwifery school in Woolwich, England.

"I feel it was God's will for my life when He called me into nursing. I believe God called me into this and led me step by step to help these women and fulfill their physical needs as well as their spiritual needs," Barker said. [Continued on Page 13]



Insects of interest

Thrips, mites, cutworms pose early crop threats

By ALLEN KNUTSON Extension Agent -Entomology

THRIPS CONTROL ON

COTTON Thrips are a common early season cotton pest that can cause significant injury during cool, wet weather. If growing conditions are favorable, cotton often quickly outgrows thrips damage with little or no delay in crop maturity. However, during unfavorable growing conditions, the additional stress from thrips feeding may further slow crop development. Also, thrips concentrate in the terminal during cool, cloudy weather and may kill the growing point of the plant. About one week is required for the plant to recover from this injury.

Test results involving thrips control have often been contradictory. Some tests show reduced yields from thrips injury, while other tests have not shown any advantage to thrips control.

Because of our short cotton growing season, and often high thrips infestation levels, systemic insecticides or seed treatments are commonly used at planting. Seed treatments are much less expensive, but do not last near as long as the systemic insecticides applied in furrow. When unfavorable weather conditions persist, control provided by seed treatments may break down before plants are no longer susceptible to thrips injury (4-5 leaf stage).

The use of foliar sprays, either by ground or air, provide the option of saving treatment costs if thrips control is not necessary. However, fields need to be inspected for thrips as soon as plants emerge. Proper timing of thrips control is critical since once extensive damage has occurred, it is too late to treat. Control may be justified when thrips average 2-5 per plant.

MITES IN WHEAT

Brown wheat mites are causing concern in some fields, particularly dryland wheat. Very large numbers of these tiny, black mite may cause leaf injury and stunt plant growth. Rain or irrigation often quickly reduce mite population and aids plant recovery. When mites are abundant and causing plant injury, and irrigation is not possible, chemical control may be justified.

AT-PLANTING INSECTI-CIDES FOR SORGHUM

Several insecticides, including Counter, Thimet, and Furadan, are labelled for atplanting use on sorghum. Some of these materials provide only early season control or suppression of green bugs and chinch bugs. Counter 15G has provided season long control of greenbugs in Experiment Station tests. Counter should be knifed-in below the seed according to label direction since Counter may reduce stands if it contacts the seed. It may be more economical to save the expense of at-planting insecticides, scout fields, and use a foliar treatment if needed late in the season.

CUTWORMS IN SUGARBEETS

Cutworms have been reported eliminating stands in sugar beet fields in several counties. Cutworm damage can be identified by the presence of wilted plants cut off at ground level or the presence of leaves in the row. The cutworm can often be found next to the damaged plant just under loose clods and soil.

Cutworms are up to 11/2 inch long, dark grey with a brown head, and typically curl up into a "C" shape when disturbed. Cutworms I found near Nazareth appear to be the black cutworm species.

Cutworms feed on weeds, grasses and possibly dead plant material. They survive land preparation and the lack of food until they can begin feeding on the emerging beet seedlings. I have seen plants neatly cut off at the soil surface before the leaves ever

unfolded. Cutworms should be controlled with granular or liquid insecticide applied as a band over the row. Lorsban 15G is labelled for at-planting as a 5-7 inch band over the drill row and incorporated 1-2 inches. Lorsban 15G can also be applied as a band postemergence (up to 2-4 true leaf stage) and incorporated 1/2-1 inch. Lorsban 4E can be used as a foliar spray (rescue treatment) under 24(c) registration

at 2 pints per acre. Growers replanting lost stands have two options: 1) band Lorsban over the row at replanting or 2) replant and wait to apply Lorsban (granular or directed spray) just before seedling emergence if cutworms are still present.

Cutworms I found yesterday were nearly full grown (11/4 inch) and should cycle out (pupate) in several days. Thus, it is unlikely they will be present by the time beets replanted now emerge.
