2. Beware of the fellow who says, in politics, "Just leave everything to me. I will take care of your interests." It almost never happens. The people must guard and take care of their own interests, or it will be just too bad-for those

3. Beware the one-man machine. No one man is big enough to check the operations of a whole government, even if his intentions are the best.

ments just because the appointees are "good fellows." 4. Beware the man who makes obviously unfit appoint-When you see obviously unqualified men slipping into offices, you may be sure they aren't going in for their health."

5. Beware of too strong and too well-oiled a party machine. It makes the pickings too good for any but the strongest to resist. Eeware the man who uses strong-arm methods; he's hiding something.

6. Beware of indifference, arch-foe of republican government, Achilles heel of democracy, and the only thing that permits the Louisiana kind of party to happen at all.
