GERMAN PRESS OPENS A NEW POLISH ATTACK

The dispute over Danzig entered a new phase today when the German press opened an attack on Poland significantly at a time of sharp controversy over the city of Polish custom officers in the free city.

The Nazi papers seized on an alleged statement by the Warsaw newspaper, Czas, pro government, or the basis of the attack. Czas is supposed to have said Poland would bombard Danzig if the free city in its desire for union with the Reich should try to confront Poland in an accomplished fact. The attack coincided with a conference at Weizsacker, between A. Hitler and Albert Forster, Danzig Nazi leader.

Y. A. Woodwork Shop Receives Order From Headquarters

Mr. W. J. Barr, in charge of the Y. A. wood work department, Ranger, stated this morning his shop had received an order from the head office at Austin authorizing the Ranger woodwork shop to build 10 typewriter desks, 1 utility office desks and 36 office chairs. These are to be used for the Ranger division and the order came from the head office at Austin.

In addition to the above the shop is now completing for Eastland 150 chairs, 3 pulpit sets, 1 dining room set for a model home, including vanity and seat, and office desks.

Philip Mahogany is being used in most of the furniture built. 3 sets of dining room furniture have just been completed for the girls dormitory in Ranger.

Mr. Barr stated this morning the boys who do the work at the wood shop, under his supervision, are fast learners, are very interested in their work and many of them show excellent talent and genius in this particular kind of mechanics.

Old photographs and other pieces of furniture have been re-upholstered and made into new drapery sets and other useful equipment by the boys suitable for office use.

The shop closed down this morning making repairs on the building caused by water seeping in, and making it impossible to use electric current for fear some of the boys might get a shock when switches are turned on operating the machines.

Care Of Insane To Be County Problem

EL PASO, Texas—Mental patients in El Paso county may have to be cared for in jail cells at a cost of 75 cents a day if the county is forced to accept the burden because of lack of funds in state elementary appropriation bill, according to County Judge Joseph E. McGill.

Dr. Charles W. Castner of Austin said that a gubernatorial veto of some items in the elementary bill means 685 fewer beds for insane patients than the original appropriation provided, and that the burden of caring for patients might revert to the counties.

Censors Err In Drive Of Decency

DURBAN, South Africa—in her eagerness to carry out efficiently the censorship regulations concerning importation of indecent literature, every item on very consignment note is carefully scrutinized by the Durban customs officials.

Recently, a local firm of bookbinders received a consignment of new books from overseas, but delivery was held up for several days for one particular book to be investigated.

Necessity Man Hurt In Plow Accident

BRECKENRIDGE, Aug. 8.—John Vick of Necessity, who was a plow driver Saturday, had a narrow escape from death last week while plowing. The machine was being driven by his nephew, Martin Salslock, Mr. Vick fell off the machine in front of a number of discs and the ten disc plow came over his leg. He was cut and bruised, but said he was lucky when he remembered such accidents have resulted in men being cut to pieces. Martin succeeded in stopping the plow quickly.

Lawmaker Shows Ire At Foes By Wearing Trunks

BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 8.—State Representative John B. Wenzler, a 194-pound tavern keeper and lawyer, was barred by guards from the house chamber today when he appeared in a bathing suit in protest against "unfair tactics of republicans."

Wenzler had appeared at the state house and attempted to change his clothes in the house of representatives cloakroom, but guards barred him. He went to the press gallery and entered a telephone booth and when he emerged with a cigar, he was wearing bright blue trunks, gray jersey and felt hat, set off by a brand new pair of white sneakers.

After posing for news cameras, the 56-year-old legislator skipped lightly, gesturing with his cigar along the corridor.

When he reached the bottom of the steps leading to the house chamber three guards rushed him. "I blame the Republicans for stealing my pants," he said.

Conductors For Pullmans Needed In Texas Travels

AUSTIN, Aug. 8.—An order of the Texas Railroad Commission today required conductors on pullman cars at all times the cars are occupied by patrons in Texas.

The effective date for the order was held open to determine how much time will be required reasonably to make the necessary changes in the company employ list.

Chairman Lon A. Smith of the commission said he believed the order would meet with general approval with the traveling public and the trainmen.

T. P. Ball Club Loses To C. L. F.

H. H. Vaughn, captain of the T. P. softball team of Ranger, stated this morning that his team met defeat at Eastland last night because of the misjudging of a ball by one of the Ranger outfielders which allowed three Eastland men to cross the plate for scores. "I am not abiding said Vaughn, "it was just one of those things." Eastland has a good team but is not any better than the T. P. "We expect to play them again soon."

The score was 4 to 3 in favor of Clover Farm team of Eastland. T. P. is scheduled to play the Carbon Outlaws tonight at Carbon but on account of the rains it was not known whether the game would be postponed or not.

There is no game scheduled for Ranger tonight because of wet weather.

Russian Loan To China Is Reported

Chinese government officials said today that Soviet Russia is extending to China a loan of seven hundred million rubles.

(The ruble is nominally valued at 20 cents, which would make the amount of the loan \$140,000,000.)

'NO RETREAT' NEW DEALERS FUTURE PLAN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The new deal charted a course of "no retreat" today while conservative democrats predicted that the next congress would put a brake on mounting government expense.

Indications that the administration was determined to push forward, despite severe setbacks in the last session of congress, were seen in these developments:

1. President Roosevelt's announcement that he now has attained all of the objectives of the bitterly fought court reorganization campaign of 1937.

2. A speech last night by House Majority Leader Sam Rayburn, Democrat, Texas, in which he said that "later consideration" will be given to some of the administration measures sidetracked in the last session.

3. A renewal by Senator Claude Pepper, Democrat, Florida, after a conference with the president, of his attack on the republican-conservative-democratic coalition which pigeon-holed the administration's lending and housing bill in the closing days of the session.

Ranger Man Will Serve With New Board Additions

Beginning Oct. 14, L. E. Gray of Ranger will serve with two new members of the Board of Barber Examiners.

E. E. Mims of Fort Worth and M. O. Spier of Austin were only recently appointed to the board by Gov. O'Daniel, to succeed J. M. Burton of Tulsa and G. Ered Turner of Cooper.

Gray is a holdover member of the board whose term expires Oct. 14, 1940.

Sweetwater Next Host To Rotary

LUBBOCK, Aug. 8.—Sweetwater was selected as the site of the 1940 conference of Rotary International district 127 at the annual assembly of presidents and secretaries here today.

Registration was 180, largest in the district's history. Mineral Wells was runner up as meeting place, the vote being 21 to 19.

District Governor Hiram Arrant of Abilene presided.

O. B. Sellers, Fort Worth, past international president; J. Edd McLaughlin, new international director, and Dr. Thomas Taylor of Brownwood; immediate past Governor Linton Estes, Wichita Falls; Fred Wempie, Midland; James Wilson, Floydada, and Dr. Rue Parcells, Amarillo, all past governors, were present. Forty-five of the 54 clubs were represented.

Burkhardt led the high ton clubs of the district in attendance with 99.98 percent for the past year. Other high clubs were Abilene, Borger, Lamesa, Lockney, Panhandle, Post, Ralls, Ranger and Sweetwater.

Woman Arrested After Auto Wreck; Charged Drunk

BRADY, Aug. 8.—Complaints charging Mrs. Ben Wallace of Santa Anna with driving while intoxicated and with transporting liquor in a dry county were filed here today as the aftermath of a head-on highway crash in which Mrs. and Mrs. S. C. Herring and their two children of Abilene were injured.

Mrs. Herring, who was suffering from shock, a broken leg and general bruises and lacerations, was in a critical condition.

Sheriff Love Kimbrough signed the complaints against Mrs. Wallace, filing the driving while intoxicated charge in justice court to await grand jury action and entering the complaint charging transportation of liquor in a dry territory in the McCulloch county court. Kimbrough said ten cases of beer and 26 bottles of whiskey and gin were taken from the woman's wrecked automobile, which is being held by officers.

Both automobiles were practically demolished in the collision. The injured persons were brought to the Brady hospital in an ambulance and two automobiles.

At 2:30 a.m. the next morning, Baker climbed out of bed, hung his bedspread over a banister railing, and still dreaming of airplanes and parachutes climbed up on the banister and dived making a 14-point landing 20 feet below. He received no serious injuries.

O'Daniel Picket Decision Is Due At Meet Tonight

FORT WORTH, Aug. 8.—Local union painters meet tonight to decide if they will picket the home of Gov. O'Daniel.

Labor leaders contended O'Daniel awarded non-union painters a contract for repainting the O'Daniel Fort Worth home which they vacated in favor of the governor's mansion at Austin.

A spokesman said the painters would not picket the O'Daniel place in protest but verified today that the union had called a meeting to decide what action would be taken.

DROP SHOWN IN ESTIMATE OF COTTON CROP

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—The Department of Agriculture today forecast a 1939 cotton crop of 11,412,000 bales in its first estimate of the year.

Production last year was 11,943,000 bales.

The department reported that 137,076 bales had been ginned by August 1.

Yields in Texas and Oklahoma will be less than either for 1938 or for the 10-year average, the department predicted.

The forecast for Texas was 2,577,000 bales compared with 3,086,000 last year.

Fair's Finance Committee Starts Drive This Week

Cooperation of Eastland merchants and others in the county in preparation of the premium catalog for the annual fair was asked today by members of the finance committee.

The catalog will be distributed in ample time for study before the fair dates, Sept. 28-30.

It was pointed out that the catalog will be distributed to 3,000 persons throughout the county and will contain premium lists and rules governing exhibition of all products.

Members of the committee this week are to solicit advertising for the catalog.

'I Beg Your Pardon; You're Wrong Man'

MINERAL WELLS, Aug. 8.—While doctors were busy taking two dozen stitches and stopping the flow of blood in the arm of a Kansas City business man at a local hospital, he told the story of the emergency.

"I was standing on the curb waiting for a car, when a stranger approached, pulled his knife and started whittling on my arm. Hardly before I realized what was happening, the fellow stopped and looked me straight in the face and said, 'I beg your pardon, you are the wrong man,' and away he went down the street."

"At least I am glad to found out I was the wrong man before he did any further damage," he commented.

Baby Girl Lives With Heart Outside

MANILA, P. I., Aug. 8.—A baby girl, born with her heart outside the body, had survived 24 hours today.

Doctors feared that an operation to correct her condition would prove fatal.

The child was born to a Mrs. Rafael, 24, and was normal in every respect except that an over-large heart protrudes from the chest, covered only with a thin transparent tissue.

A glass bowl placed over the heart prevented infection and permitted attending surgeons to watch it function.

Delivery Is Refused On Unstamped Letters

What Would You Do If You Were About to Die?

Plays and stories without end have been written around the theme of what men would be most likely to do if they knew they had only a definitely-limited time to live.

Men have been portrayed as entering on one last desperate fling at pleasure; they have been portrayed as turning passionate to religion; they have been portrayed in stoical attitude of defiance, or in meekest resignation.

But the actual thing itself is being played out in New York. Claude Joseph Bradley has been told that within a very few weeks he must die.

Bradley is a sales manager for a cement company, and for several months, since a deadly paralysis attacked his legs, he has been doing business over the telephone.

Then he set about, not in a hysterical way, but deliberately and sanely, to make the most of such days as may be left to him.

He has himself carried to the wharf where he has a speedboat, and he enjoys a spin on the bay.

He eats what he likes, and hopes that maybe the doctors are wrong.

He has friends in to talk with him, and does what business he can by telephone.

The other night 200 of his friends gave him a party. Bradley himself played the piano for an hour or more to entertain his guests.

On the table there was a huge bunch of roses. Bradley took one to put in his lapel.

In short, here is a man staring into the face of death. But he does none of the melodramatic things the writers have imagined for such circumstances.

And perhaps that is the bravest thing of all; to carry on just as always, to the last moment that is allowed, without ever giving death the satisfaction of having been able to alter by his spectral presence, the blessed routine of life.

In Claude Bradley is that courage which is man's best attribute—the courage to face life and death with the same level gaze.

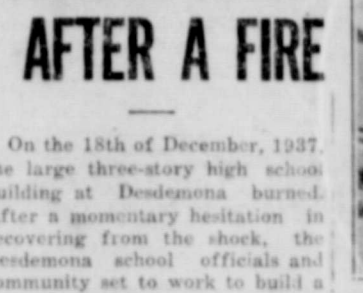
DESDEMONA'S M. E. CHURCH 39 YEARS OLD

The First Methodist Church in Desdemona was built about 1900 on a large lot just south of Main street and northwest of the community tabernacle. A good sized parsonage was also built on that lot. During boom days the church property was leased to an oil company for a good sum of money which was used in building a parsonage and church the latter being quite large but not nicely finished inside. The new buildings were placed on lots donated by Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Genoway.

DESDEMONA'S SCHOOL BUILT AFTER A FIRE

On the 18th of December, 1937, the large three-story high school building at Desdemona burned. After a momentary hesitation in recovering from the shock, the Desdemona school officials and community set to work to build a new school building, and organize a school system second to none. As a result, in less than 10 months a new, high school building of cream brick, decorated with red and blue tile, and of the most modern architectural design, was completed. Thanks to WPA.

The new building consists of four classrooms that are used only as classrooms, a combination library and study hall, a combination natural science laboratory and class room, a combination foods and clothing laboratory for home economics and home making. A combination gym and auditorium provides a splendid arrangement for athletic events and public gatherings. An excess of one thousand people can be comfortably seated in the gymnasium-auditorium. It is unique in design, having a curved ceiling of acoustical, which adds to the beauty and provides best sound quality or acoustics. This policy of combining various rooms and units of the building for more than one purpose greatly increases the usefulness of the building, and at the same time keeping the cost down to the minimum.

BAPTISTS HAVE LONG HISTORY IN DESDEMONA

The First Baptist church of Desdemona was founded more than 60 years ago. It was located about one mile south of town near Hog Creek and was a one room log structure. The building had only one door, in the south end of the building. One log was cut out of the west side of the building, this opening, being the only window. The benches were hewed out of logs. The building was heated in winter by a big fireplace. A homemade table was in the front of the building for the minister's use. It is told by old timers that in the early days people carried six-shooters to church with them, placing them on the table by the Bible. This was because of danger from Indians. Services were held once monthly beginning on Saturday, continuing Saturday night, Sunday and Sunday night. The minister usually came horse back. Only the minister had a song book. He read a verse of the hymn to the audience sang it in prison.

He taught here two years, but is now employed by the Humble Oil company in Louisiana.

A DESDEMONA CHURCH FACED BY OBSTACLES



By George Patterson In 1920 the Church of Christ of Desdemona was reorganized. There was no church building here at that time, so the first meeting was held in the Methodist church building on Sunday afternoon. There were only six members at the church at that time. At the first meeting Bro. Harry Mansfield, his wife, my brother, Had Patterson, his wife and my wife and I were the ones who attended.

We used the Methodist church building for a few months, for which we paid a rental of \$2.50 a month, for use of the building. The Church of Christ owned one and a half acres of land, so we bought a building and had it moved on the church land, where it now stands. That was early in the year, 1921. We had a meeting that year and there were several added to the church during the year. Bro. Lee P. Mansfield helped in our first meeting and he did the preaching. After the meeting was over he preached for the church that winter and there was much good done, and several more added to the church. We had our sorrows and we would build up and have a good membership. Then the oil companies would transfer men away and our membership would go down, but we had preaching monthly and meetings in which we would build the membership back up. This had to be done several times, but for the past four or five years it seems that the membership has been more permanently located and the church is doing well, though it would like to do more good.

Industry Is Growing Rapidly In The Southwest

By United Press

CRUCES, N. M.—A new zeal of seeds from the plant is growing up in the Southwest.

Chamiza, a dusty gray bush with yellow flowers in spring and blue-like seeds in autumn, is a soil erosion preventer and is rapidly gaining favor with cattlemen as a browse for their stock.

Experiment work for the seed for planting in a range grass has resulted in the growth of an infant industry. Recently an order was received from New Mexico A. & M. College, where experiment work on the plant was started, for 50 pounds of the seed. A student at the college is helping pay expenses by selling the seed to a farmer at Hatch, N. M., who is using a business by gathering and selling it.

The popularity of the chamiza among cattlemen of West and New Mexico is the result of a hobby which C. P. Wilson, station editor at the village, took up with a view to artificial reseeding of New Mexico ranges. Of several types of grasses and plants which he experimented, chamiza proved to be the most satisfactory.

It is a highly drought-resistant grass with a tap root sometimes 80 feet in length, enabling it to draw moisture from underground streams even in the most severe drought.

As a maintenance browse, it has a higher supporting value than any of the range grasses. On a college experiment on 3 1/2 acres planted with chamiza, one cow browsed for nine months and remained in condition. Seven acres, which carry a cow indefinitely, are grazed with the 60 acres ordinarily allotted per cow on common range grasses.

Chamiza has great adaptability to conditions and will grow on most West Texas and New Mexico soils. While present soil and soil of the texture, it will grow in areas containing small quantities of water and will thrive in areas receiving considerable quantities of water.

The seed is collected in the fall by stripping the seed from the branches into buckets. One man can gather 50 pounds a day. Although chamiza will grow if the seed is broadcast over unprepared land, best results are obtained if it is sown in rows.

East Texas Field Seething Over Its Daily Allowable

AUSTIN, Texas—The East Texas oil field is now seething over the allocation of its daily oil production among the various leaseholders. All sides seem to agree that the field production as a whole is satisfactory but they cannot agree on the relative share each should have of the total.

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Interstate Oil Compact Commission and member of the state commission that sets the

allowable production, says the operators are really fighting over "vevet."

"The field already has produced far more oil than was predicted for it, as a result of the efficient prevention of waste," Thompson said.

"It will go on producing for a long time. Everybody has more oil than they would have had without commission regulation but they complain that one gets more than another."

Thompson believes and says frankly that an equitable distribution is no longer possible in the East Texas field and will not be possible so long as the marginal well law requires a pumping well to be permitted 20 barrels a day and courts say better wells must have more oil.

At one time the marginal well minimum for the East Texas field was 40 barrels. As wells become more and more numerous, the railroad commission got into a predicament much like that now being experienced.

The legislature reduced the marginal well figure to 20 barrels. That left the commission an amount of oil over the quantity taken up by the marginal pumping wells so that better wells could

be given more than 20 barrels.

Continued drilling has put the field in a condition where it no longer is possible to comply again with the marginal well law and the court rule that a better well must be allowed more oil than a poor one.

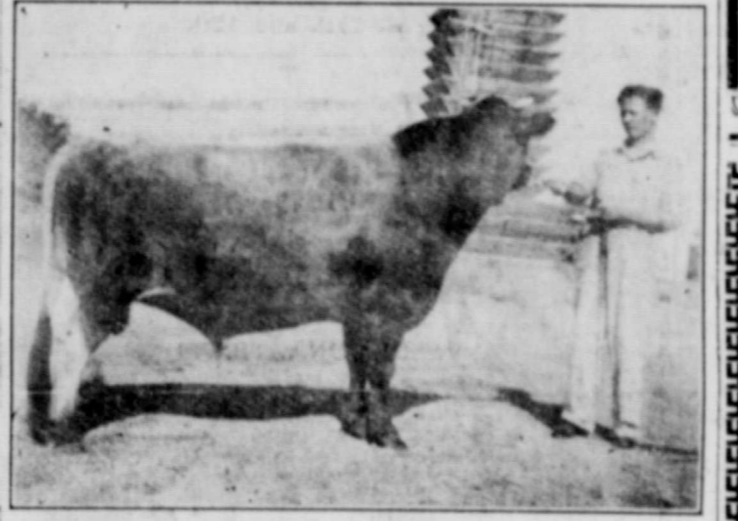
