Quota System Washed Up by Immigration Tide

Because the world today is such a different world from that of 1924, the immigration quota system enacted at that time is having unexpected effects.

When the quota system was proposed, the background was roughly this: Congress apparently felt that immigration in the early 1900s was overly weighted with people from the south and southeast of Europe. So it set up a quota system, assigning to each foreign country an annual number of immigrants which should be a certain percentage of the number of people who had already come to the United States from the same country at an arbitrary date in the past. The date and quotas were so set as to give larger quotas to northern Europeans, and to cut the quotas from the southern and eastern European countries.

For some years it appeared to work fairly well toward the end sought. Then came the depression. Immigration stopped almost entirely. During the first few years of business depression, almost no country filled its allowable

Then the dictatorship tightened their grip on several European countries, and organized religious and racial persecution as a state policy began to appear. Instantly the She thinks a maid stole it." applications for immigration visas from the countries affected began to rise.

So today we have a curious situation in regard to immigration, one not imagined by those who framed the law of 1924. It is this: Immigration from Central Europe, which fell under its quotas for many years, is now dammed up behind the quota wall in overwhelming masses. These quotas will automatically be filled to overflowing for many years. Yet quotas from countries like Great Britain and Ireland, Belgium, France, Holland, Switzerland, and Scandinavia are not nearly filled. As a result, the bulk of our immigration in the foreseeable future is going to come from almost the very countries which the act of 1924 sought to make a minority. In point of fact, last year a numerical majority of all immigrants came from Ger-

This makes it clear that the basic immigration act of 1924 is no longer a suitable basis for an immigration policy. When the working of an act is such as to bring about a result contrary to the purposes of the act, it is time somebody suggests restudy and redrafting of the law,

The present working of the immigration act is such as to suggest that the whole policy ought to be reconsidered. 

Contractors on the \$5,000,000 illacy County Irrigation project ished their employment totals ist 1,600 as PWA Regional Dictor George M. Bull announced Fort Worth that first regular liveries of water would begin about Sept. 1.

The irrigation project will be ne of the most complete in the nation when it is finished. Between 20,000 and 25,000 acres will be supplied water in Septem ber, and additional acreage will til the entire 70,000 acres will be watered beginning Dec. 31.

Altogether, the project will in-lude 150 miles of concrete-lined anals, 130 miles of underground pelines, and reservoirs and pumping stations. The project's will take approximately 150,000 cre feet of water from the Rie Grande each year.

Cement Gun Company of Allentown, Pa., the concrete contractor. has 1,300 men working on lining of the canals. The company's contract is the largest one of its nature ever awarded in this country. The only one larger was for a ca-

area to produce three or four crops a year. This is a principal winter fruit and vegetable producing section. The project also wil help to make productive 7,000 acres of citrus fruits which here tofore have borne little marketable produce because of water

The PWA financed the project with a 70 per cent loan and a 30 per cent grant.







This statement is published as a paid advertisement by Humble Oil and Refining Company for the benefit of those who are interested and not acquainted with the facts.

On August 11 the Humble Company posted reductions in the prices at which it purchased crude oil in Texas and New Mexico by amounts ranging from 5 cents to 32 cents per barrel, and averaging 18.5 cents per barrel. In view of the fact that this action on our part has been severely criticized before the public, we outline below the facts and reasons on which it was

1-On August 1 the quantities of crude oil listed below, aggregating 218,920 barrels daily in Texas, Louisiana and Arkansas, were moving to market at prices substantially below the Humble's postings for similar crudes:

2-The amount of crude moving below Humble's postings was greatly increased when on August 10 the Sinclair-Prairie Company posted a reduction of 20 cents per barrel affecting the oil produced and purchased by it in Texas, New Mexico. Oklahoma and Kansas which action was followed immediatey by reductions in the price made by a number of smaller purchasers. These reductions applied to more than 150,000 barrels of oil. This, added to that mentioned in the preceding paragraphs, equals 368,000 barrels. In the three States in which Humble operates, Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana, the aggregate volume of oil moving below Humble's prices approximated 171/2 per cent of the total current production in those

3-The movement of constantly increasing quantities over the past year or more of crude produced in the new Illinois fields, reaching a total of 300,000 barrels daily on August 1, on a price basis substantially lower than Humble's postings in its territory, exerted a progressively depressing effect on the crude oil market. The effect was felt in Texas; and actually since April I Humble has lost 10,000 barrels per day of business absorbed by Illinois crude. This loss of business was in addition to that lost by Humble as a result of the movement of crude at low prices in the territory where we operate.

4-On August 11, therefore, the total volume of oil moving at prices below those of the Humble was approximately 668,000 barrels.

5-The crude oil market has been under pressure for more than a year. The price adjustments made last October did not remove fully the disparity between Humble's prices and those of some oil moving in its markets. Since that time the volumes

of crude moving below our prices have increased steadily, with result that when the reductions of Sinclair-Prairie and others came on Aug. 10, affecting approximately 150,000 barrels of crude per day, conditions were so bad that we were compelled to reduce our prices to meet this competition. In no case are our new postings lower than the Sinclair-Prairie postings for similar crudes.

6-The Humble Company is primarily a producer of oil. Its crude oil properties constitute its principal asset. Its net production averages 133,000 barrels a day. We are also crude oil merchants and purchase, at our posted prices, 251,000 barrels of crude oil daily in Texas and New Mexico. These prices also govern the price at which we sell the oil which we produce. Because of our large production we are vitally interested in the maintenance of fair prices.

Our refineries consume something near the amount of oil which we produce. As a consequence, with respect to our purchases we are in the same position as a merchant dealing in any commodity. To continue in business, we can not over a long period of time pay higher prices than competitors. We are compelled to meet competition. The price of oil, like that of other commodities, is subject to change with market conditions. These are simple and fundamental business principles. We were reluctant to cut the price of crude, not alone because of its adverse effect on our own earnings, but also because of its effect on our customers and upon the industry and the State at large. Under these circumstances we could not continue to pay the prices we had been

7-As a matter of policy the Humble Company maintains stocks of crude oil very slightly in excess of the amount required as working stocks to carry on operations. We do not believe in storage of oil above ground but in production of oil currently as required for market. We do not speculate in oil. We have no desire to buy oil at any price to accumulate for storage.

8-We think the price for oil brought about by the competitive conditions above mentioned is lower than should be realized. In our opinion the flood of oil from Illinois and Louisiana, most of which is being produced wastefully, in violation of conservation principles, is primarily responsible for the market conditions which necessitated our price reductions. It is our hope that these conditions will be corrected and that the market will improve.


