Two nabbed in shooting, assault

One suspect was apprehended this week in connection with a shooting incident, and another man is being sought for allegedly assaulting a police officer.

Shortly after midnight Sunday, a Hereford man sustained a gunshot wound to the right elbow while in the parking lot of a local club. Police said the victim had been arguing with another man during the evening.

At closing time, the two men went to the parking lot where the victim allegedly kicked the man and knocked him down, officers reported. The other man went to his vehicle, got a .22 caliber revolver and allegedly shot the victim, then fled the scene on foot.

A few hours later, Dimmitt policemen took the suspect into custody. Charges are pending with the district attorney's office.

A Dimmitt police officer was hospitalized shortly after midnight Saturday after reportedly being assaulted by a man the officer had stopped for a traffic violation.

According to Police Chief Don Franklin, the officer was attempting to arrest the man for driving while intoxicated when the suspect struck the officer and fled the scene on foot. The officer chased the suspect and caught him on the Church of Christ lawn. During the struggle, the suspect gained control of the officer's flashlight and struck him several times on the head and face.

The officer managed to draw his service revolver and fire a warning shot, and the man fled, Franklin said.

The officer then radioed for assistance. He was taken by ambulance to Plains Memorial Hospital, where he was admitted for bruises, abrasions and a possible concussion.

He was released from the hospital the next day and has returned to his patrol duties. Franklin said the suspect is believed to have fled to another state.

Miss Heard was the Spirit Queen. We got our queens mixed up.

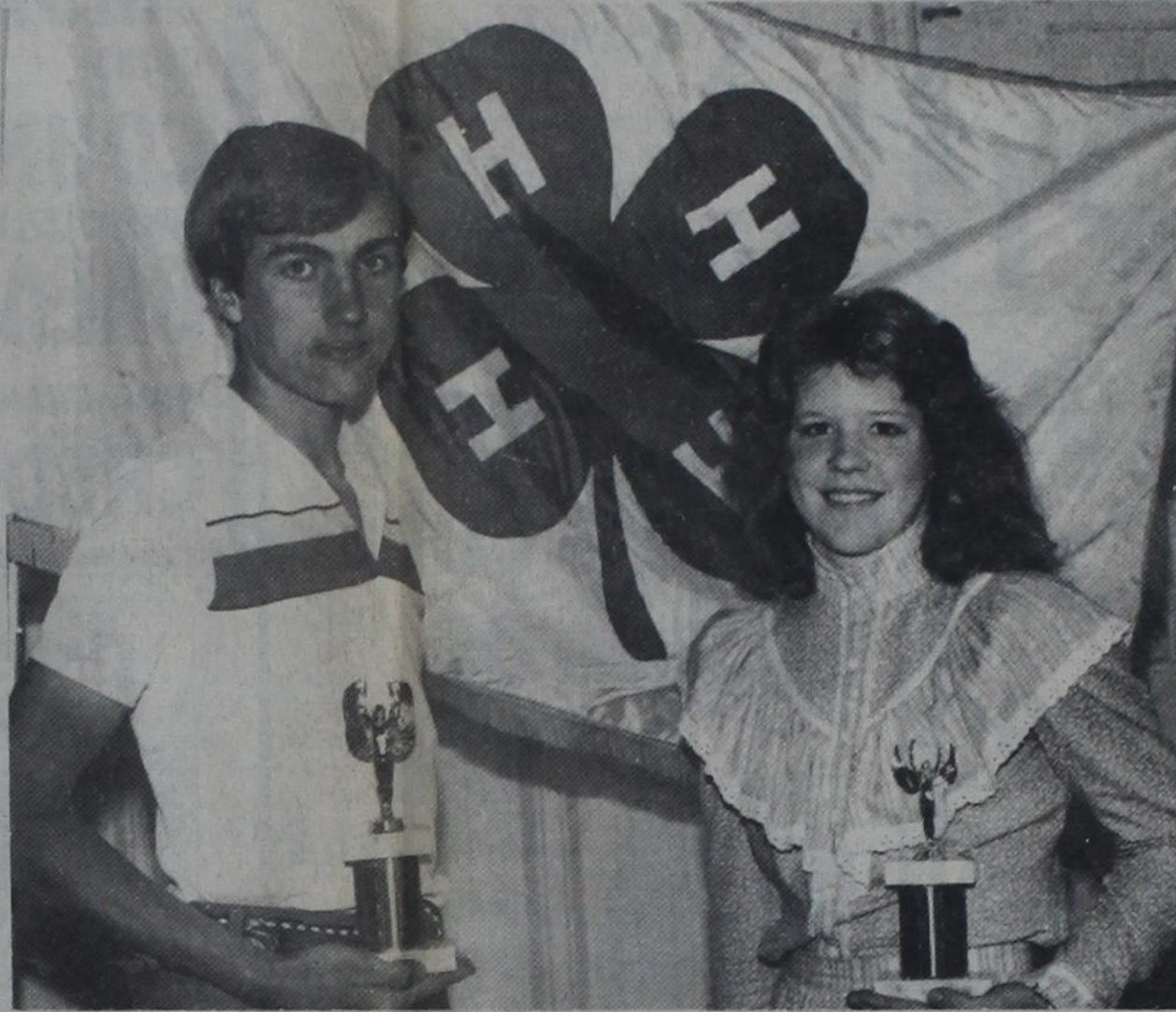

Kim Howell of Bethel and Bart Huseman of Nazareth were announced Saturday night as Castro County's Gold Star 4-H Girl and Boy for 1982-83.

Announcement of the county's top two 4-H'ers climaxed the annual County 4-H Awards Banquet, held in the County Expo Building Saturday night in conjunction with National 4-H Week.

Miss Howell is the daughter of Jimmie and Sue Howell. Huseman's parents are Louis and Gin Huseman.

Two other prestigious 4-H awards went to Charlynn Hunter of the Dimmitt 4-H Club and Trampas Moke of the Bethel 4-H Club, who were named the winners of this year's "I Dare You" awards. Each was presented with a copy of the book, "I Dare You," in recognition of the leadership they have displayed and their desire to do

their best.

Miss Hunter is the daughter of Richard and Charlene Hunter. Moke is the son of Don and Carolyn Moke.

Scott Simpson, who emceed the banquet, was presented with two honor certificates for having placed first in the state with his dairy judging record book. He is the son of Bob and Celia Simpson and is a member of the Dimmitt 4-H Club.

County Farm Bureau to meet Saturday

The Castro County Farm Bureau will hold its annual county convention Saturday at the Dimmitt High School cafeteria, beginning with a meal at 6:30 p.m. catered by Southern Sea.

At about 7:30 p.m., S.M. True Jr. of Plainview will speak. True is a current State Director for District 2 of the Texas Farm Bureau, and is a candidate for president of the Texas Farm Bureau.

One of the highlights of the convention will be the reports by students who attended the Summer Citizenship Seminar. This year Castro County Farm Bureau sponsored Tammy Heck, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Heck of Nazareth; Coy Myrick, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Myrick of Hart; and Joe Saucedo, son of Mr. and Mrs. Eliseo Saucedo of Sunnyside.

The main purpose of the convention is the discussion and adoption of policy resolutions by local farmers and ranchers. These resolutions are intended to enhance the profitability of agriculture and to protect the rights of individual farmers and ranchers. Therefore, a wide range of topics may be considered, such as the farm program, taxes, credit, Farmers Home

Students in Dimmitt are making fewer trips to the principal's office as a result of a new discipline program that is in use at all three schools.

The program, known as "assertive discipline," was reported on at the Monday night meeting of the Dimmitt school board.

Developed by a California couple, the system involves the establishment of a few simple rules, and also prescribes set penalties, as well as allowing for rewards for good behavior.

Supt. Robert Ryan said that the system was carefully explained to the teachers and students at the beginning of the school year. Also, students' parents were informed of the use of the system and were asked to sign a form saying that they understand the way the system operates.

The rules in each building cover classroom conduct, such as no talking out of turn; personal relations, such as no hitting or teasing; and out-of-classroom conduct, such as no running in halls.

Penalties are different for classroom and out-of-classroom infractions. Classroom penalties are first of the "social stigma" type, such as having the offender's name written on the blackboard. Subsequent offenses are followed by marks by the name, and after a set number of marks, a paddling may be administered. Other penalties include phone calls from the student to a parent explaining why the student has gotten into trouble, and trips to the principal's office as a last resort.

Each building principal said that the system has definitely cut down on the number of trips to their offices by misbehaving students.

"Much of the misconduct is squelched now at the classroom level," Middle School Principal Emmett Broderson said. "Students know better what is expected of them, and teachers have a more consistent system of punishment, which may be administered more swiftly and surely than a trip to the office."

"The noise level has been greatly reduced and there is much less unnecessary movement," Richardson Elementary Principal Elmer Berryhill said.

High School Principal Alex Glass said that all of his teachers are using the program to some extent, with eight of them using a formally approved plan.

"The students are accepting it, and it really seems to be working out great," Glass added.

Use of the program is strictly voluntary, according to Ryan, but the principals said that all of their teachers are using the program in one way or another.

Methods of rewards for the students include praise to individuals and whole classes, as well as popcorn or other treats, or allowing extra play time or free time.

Also Monday night, the board members toured various school facilities to view repairs, maintenance and construction done during the summer months.

The board agreed to host the Oct. 28 meeting of the Panhandle Area School Board Association from 7:30 to about 9 p.m., furnishing a meeting room and a meal for those attending. Election of officers for the association is expected to be on the agenda.

Board member Deanne Clark reported on her recent trip to the Texas Association of School Boards and Texas Association of School Administrators convention.

In other business, the board:

—Accepted school policy revisions recommended by TASB to bring all schools in the state under unified policy in matters dictated by state law.

—Approved additions to the substitute teacher list after disqualifying four who are related to school board members.

—Adopted a revised job description and evaluation form for principals.

—Were informed that tax statements should go out some time this week if they are finished being printed in time.

—Granted a request by the Dimmitt Ministerial Alliance for rental of the high school auditorium for a community Thanksgiving service Nov. 22.

Absentee voting begins

Registered voters in Castro County who are going to be out of the county on election day, Nov. 2, have from now until Oct. 29 to vote absentee.

Voters who will be gone on election day should go by the County Clerk's office in the Courthouse to vote absentee.

Students registered in the County, but living at the college they attend may write to the County Clerk for an absentee ballot. Their request must be mailed from outside the county.

Lions to serve pancakes Friday before the game

The Dimmitt Lions Club will serve its annual Pancake Supper in the high school cafeteria before the Dimmitt-Muleshoe football game here Friday evening.

From 5 to 7:30 p.m., the Lions will serve Aunt Jemima pancakes with Log Cabin syrup, Owens country sausage and Wright thick-sliced bacon, along with coffee, tea and milk.

Prices will be \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children 6 and younger for "all you can eat, or until you run out of time," according to co-chairmen Bob Caddell and Chuck Braafadt.

Commissioners approve bill for Juvenile Board

The Castro County Commissioners Court met Monday and approved a bill concerning the forming of a Juvenile Board for Hale, Castro and Swisher Counties.

Commissioners also approved the payment of six bills, and met in executive session to interview Menzies McWilliams for the position of Assistant County Extension Agent.

The juvenile board will consist of the three county judges and two district judges. The salary for each county judge will be not more than \$1,200 per year, payable in \$100 per month installments paid out of the general county fund. Each county will pay 16% of the district judges salaries.

Commissioners approved the payment of six bills which included: \$3,729.89 for redistricting commissioner precincts, \$2,952 to the Texas

Association of Counties; \$5,643 to Brown and Graham, \$2,268 to A-1 Mechanical, \$2,292 to West Texas Culvert, and \$6,660 to West Texas Equipment.

Commissioners interviewed and hired Menzies McWilliams as Assistant County Extension Agent.

Castro County Judge Polly Simpson and Precinct 4 Commissioner Al Maurer are attending the County Judges and Commissioners annual conference in Abilene this week.

Registration was at 1 p.m. Wednesday, and Precinct 1 commissioner Ed Bennett will attend the conference tonight (Thursday).

The conference is being held at the Abilene Civic Center and will conclude with a banquet Friday evening. New association officers will be installed at that time.

FmHA and Azteca meet in Dimmitt

FmHA representatives and Azteca Economic Development board members met last Wednesday in Dimmitt to discuss loan and grant application conditions to be met by Azteca.

Upon approval, a \$1,179,000 federal grant, plus loans totaling \$131,000 from FmHA, will be used by Azteca to renovate the Castro County Agriculture Housing

Project and pay off the original note.

Billy Stewart, assistant district director of FmHA in Lubbock, delivered to Azteca a letter of conditions along with a letter of approval that loan and grant application conditions had to be met before the loans could be finally approved.

"If Azteca meets the conditions we presented, the project bids will be opened," Stewart said.

"We agreed to loan them the money if they would meet certain administrative conditions," he said.

Some of the conditions, according to Stewart, are: that Azteca get the management plan up to date (plan of operation); get a management agreement with whom is going to manage the project; get bid specifications up to date to show what kind of work is to be done; and get a mortgagee's information letter.

Azteca President Larry Gonzales estimated between 30 to 45 days time would be necessary to meet the conditions.

Texas Democratic Party Chairman Bob Slagle will be in Dimmitt Tuesday for a rally at the city hall meeting room from 2:15 to 2:45 p.m.

The rally here will be part of a 75-county caravan to stump for the Democratic Party ticket.

"We are making a concentrated effort to take the Democratic Party's message across the state and to garner support for the ticket," Slagle said. "I believe we've got the strongest ticket we've ever had."

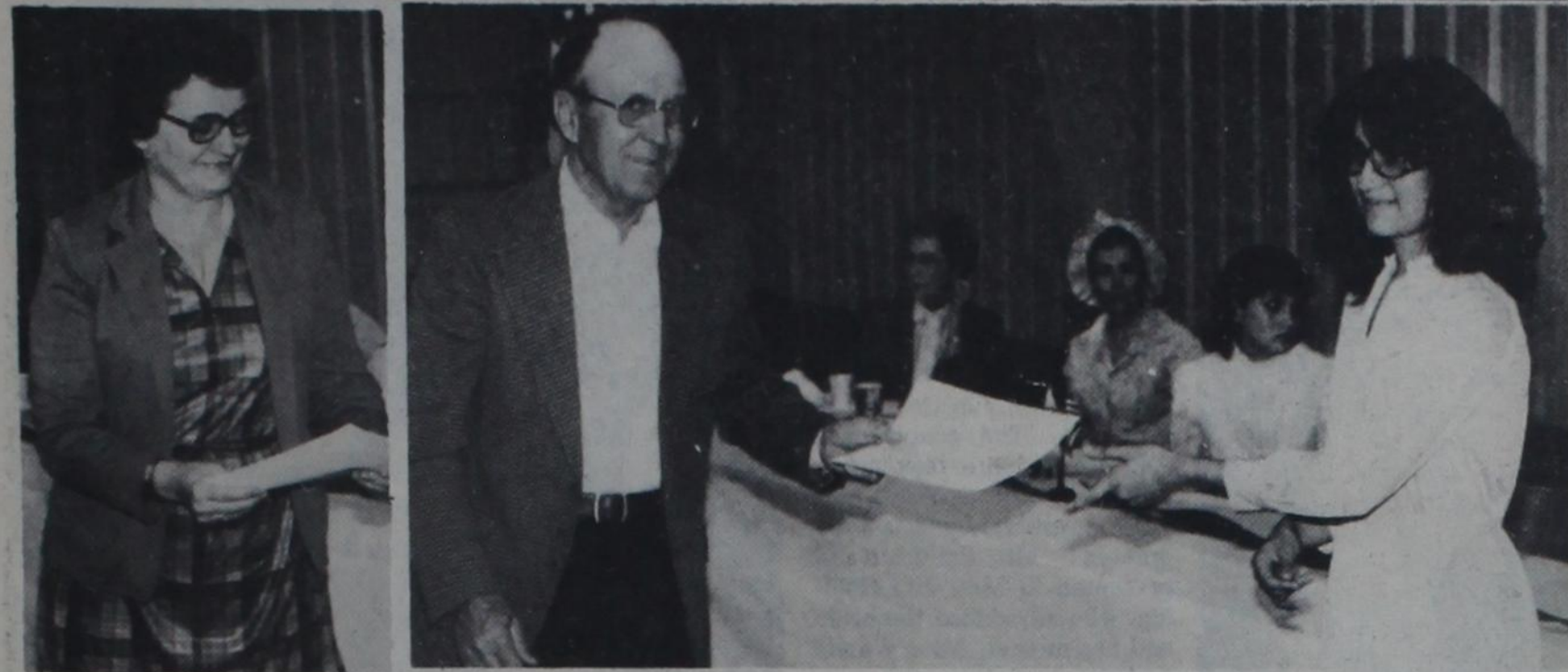

Fire Calls

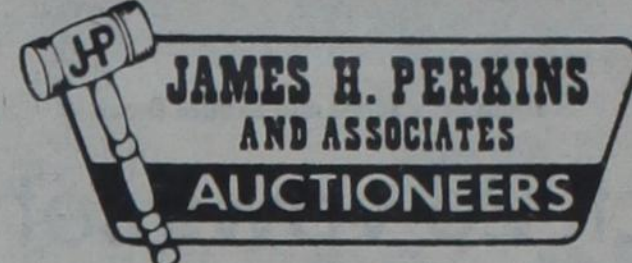
The Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Dept. answered two fire calls the past week.

YOUR CITY AT WORK

CITY PERMITS

The City of Dimmitt requires various types of permits prior to specific types of work being performed within the city limits. In most cases the general public is not aware of specific occasions which require the purchase of a permit. Primarily permits are required in order that city officials may inspect various types of work to insure compliance with safety regulations. Then inspections insure that the individuals hired for a specific type of work have met all the minimum Federal, State and Local requirements.

This week, I would like to point out sections in the electrical code which deal with the requirements for an electrical permit and also the fines for violations.

Section 4-101- Permits Required for Electric Work Generally:

It shall be unlawful for any person altering material, wiring fixtures, or other apparatus to be used for the utilization of electricity for light, heating, or power in or on any building or premises in the City without first securing a permit from the City's electrical inspector; No permit shall be required for minor work such as repairing flush and snap switches and replacing fuses, or changing lamp sockets and receptacles. This code shall not be construed to require a permit for maintenance work on the premises of a person regularly employing a maintenance electrician for that purpose.

The City does provide for a penalty on all violations of the electrical code.

Section 4-164- General Penalty; Continuing Violations: Whenever in this code an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or whatever in this code the doing of an act is required or the failure to do any act is hereby declared to be unlawful, the violator of any such provision of this code shall be punished by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00). Each day any violation of this code shall continue, it shall constitute a separate offense.

Our electrical inspector has been made aware of specific instances where individuals performed electrical work within the city of Dimmitt without first obtaining an electrical permit. I would like to take this opportunity to inform all electrical contractors that the City will require electrical permits on all electrical work as set out in Section 4-101 of the electrical code. The City will also uphold the provisions of Section 4-164, which provides for penalties of violators.

The provisions of the electrical code are designed to provide the utmost care and safety in electrical installation, and to protect the interest of local citizens.

HIGHLIGHTS

The Dimmitt Volunteer Firemen recently completed a major project at the Fire Station. They have been trying to install a fence on the east side of the station which would allow a private area for the families of the Fire Marshal and Assistant Fire Marshal. Our Volunteer Firemen are commended for their hard work and efforts. They have also utilized their own funds in this project. Dimmitt really appreciates their hard work and we want them to know that it has not gone unnoticed.

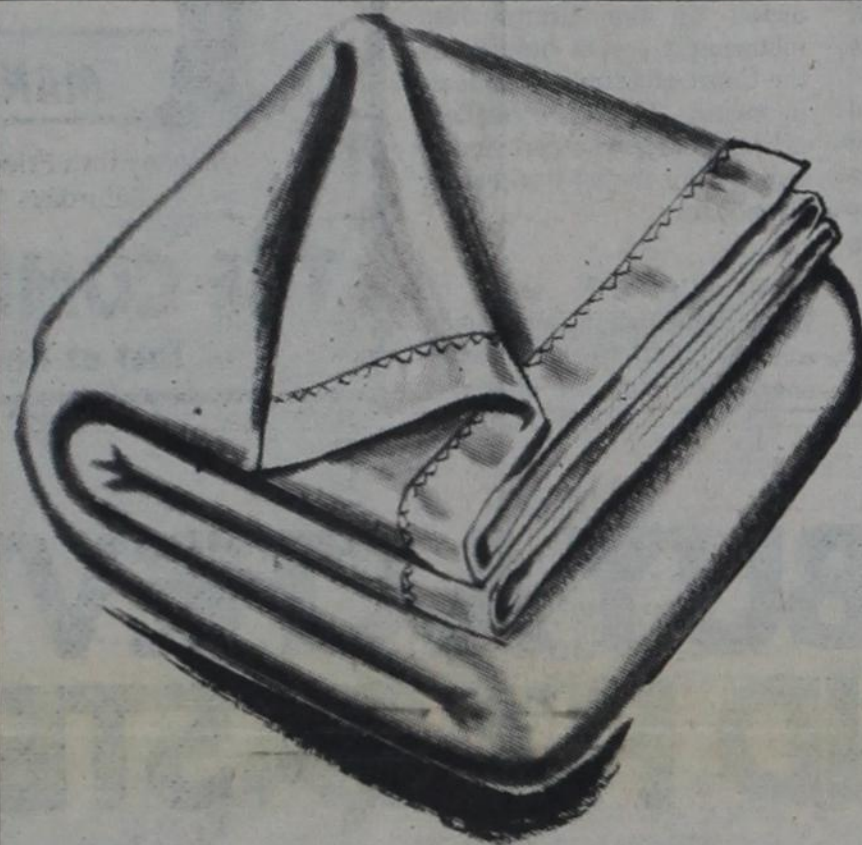

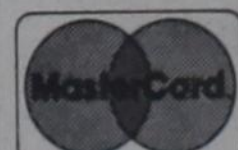

Littlefield 20, Dimmitt 3

Wow, what a Catfight!

"So close and yet so far away," is how one writer summarized his feelings.

"You guys are just a half-inch away from the major leagues," is how Triple-A baseball manager and former star player Don Hoak expressed the same thing.

Dimmitt was oh-so-close Friday before falling to Littlefield, 20-3, in the District 2-3A opener in Littlefield.

The Bobcats, now 3-3 on the year, kept a thousand fans at Wildcat Stadium on their toes all evening, as they drove with ease before having to settle for a Johnny Nino field goal, and kept the Littlefield ground game bottled up.

Littlefield, now 5-1 and 1-0 in district, had to resort to the pass for what proved to be the winning touchdown, and had to keep its air game going to keep several other drives alive.

Dimmitt, winning the opening coin toss for the first time this year, came out smoking. Quarterback Richard Guzman, enjoying his best night so far, kept the Littlefield defense guessing on the option.

Guzman, who ended up

with 102 yards rushing on 12 tries, picked up 41 yards on three keeps in the first drive with 17- and 21-yard gains that garnered crucial first downs. However, the drive, which started at the Bobcats' 33, bogged down at the Wildcat 6 and Nino booted a 22-yard field goal to give Dimmitt a 3-0 lead halfway through the first quarter.

The state-ranked Wildcats knew what was coming after they ran their first three plays of the night, as three rushes netted nothing. A short 21-yard punt by Bryan Gregory afforded the Bobcats good field position, but a fourth-down try came up short. Dimmitt garnered five first-quarter first downs, while Littlefield ended up with only one. The first quarter ended with the fired-up Bobcats leading 3-0.

Gregory, who would remain a thorn in the Bobcats' side all night, brought the Wildcats out of the doldrums with a 20-yard scramble late in the first half. Gregory, though, was the only effective cog in the Wildcat rushing machine, and Littlefield went to the air. Gregory hit five of six passes on the drive, including two

tosses for 33 yards to tight end Pat Demel. Split end Ferante Lewis caught an almost-batted-away throw falling out of the end zone with 1:44 left in the first half to put the Wildcats up, 7-3, after Gregory's extra point.

At the intermission, Dimmitt had garnered 108 rushing steps, with eight more coming on a Guzman toss to tailback Mark Bruegel. Littlefield had been held to 85 rushing yards, but added 64 passing. The Wildcats had 11 first-half first downs, with 10 coming in the second period. Dimmitt earned seven first-half first downs.

In the scoreless third quarter, it was more of the same for Littlefield, as highly-touted runners Steve Greene and Larry Cantu, at tailback and slotback, were kept in check by the Dimmitt defense. However, Dimmitt was stopped twice by turnovers, a lost fumble and an interception of a Guzman throw-away attempt.

The third quarter would prove to be disastrous injury-wise, too, as the Bobcats were forced to go three-deep through their tailbacks by the end of the game. In fact, during Dimmitt's last series, split end Dwight McDonald was moved to tailback, while tight end Jeff Watts moved to split end and Brad Holcomb, who alternates with McDonald at split end, moved to flanker.

Guzman, though, remained the big man in the Dimmitt offense, hitting two passes for 36 yards, a 16-yarder to Bill Johnson and a 20-yard toss to Watts. Guzman picked up another 48 rushing yards on four carries.

Littlefield's Gregory, though, found even more room as he threw for 62 yards and picked up another 55 yards rushing. He added the final two touchdowns after several important members of the Bobcat defense — including tackle Max Sandoval and linebackers Bill Johnson and Sid Sageser — went out of the line-up with injuries.

Gregory scored from a yard

with 4:25 left, and padded the lead to 20-3 with 2:06 left on a 15-yard scamper.

The Wildcats will be in Tulia this week, while Dimmitt will be at home against Muleshoe.

Dimmitt High School tennis team members won two firsts, two seconds and a third place award this weekend in a tournament held in Tulia.

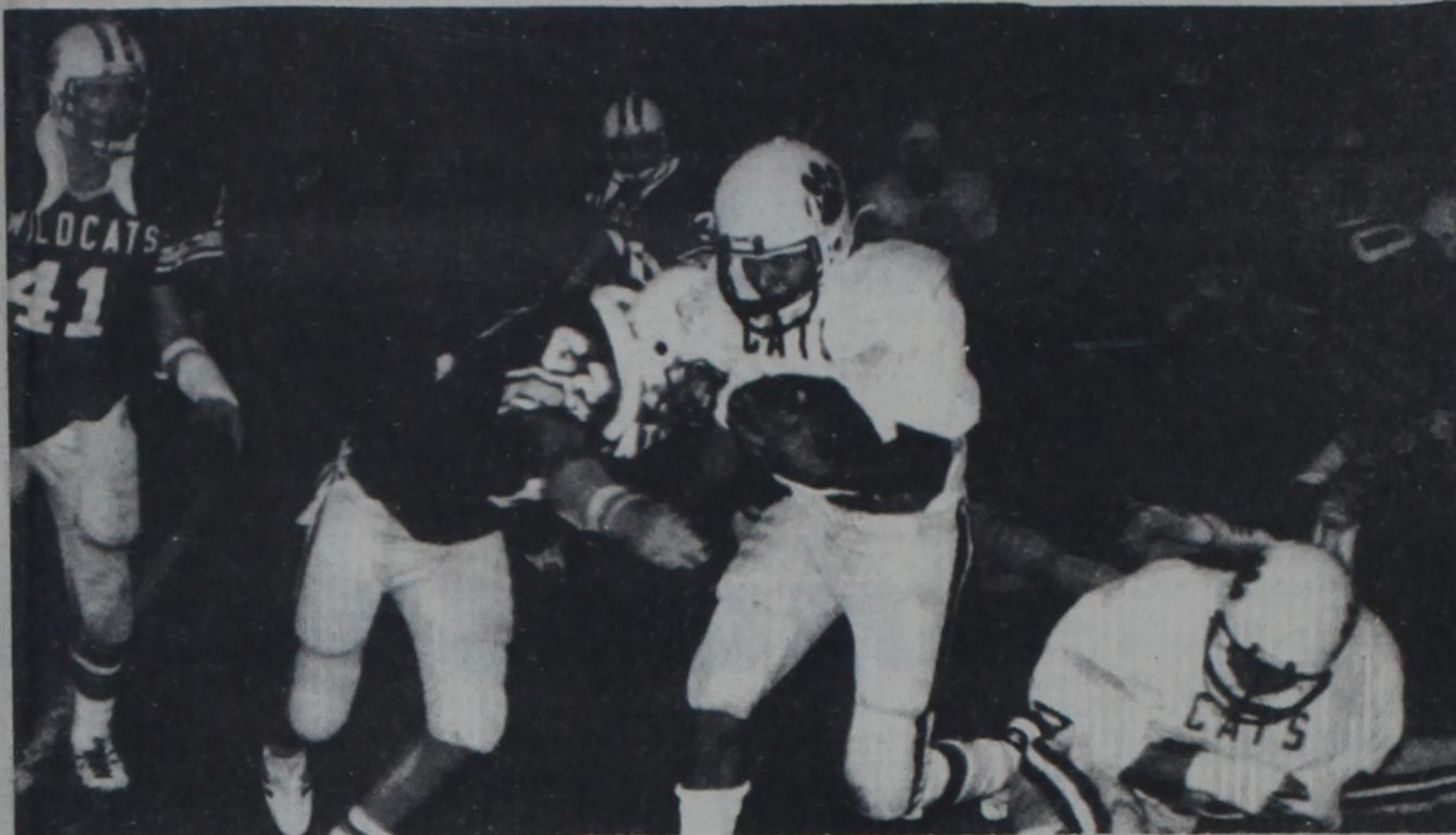
Joe Saucedo won first place in high school singles, then teamed with his brother, Richard to take the doubles title.

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1983 cotton program announced by USDA

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced a 20% acreage reduction program and a voluntary 5% paid land diversion program for the 1983 upland cotton crop.

Program sign up will be Oct. 1 through March 31. Producers may request 50 percent of the projected 1983 deficiency and diversion payments at the time they sign up, Block said.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates the 1983 deficiency payment rate will be 12.8 cents per pound. When farmers sign up, they can request to receive an advance payment of 6.4 cents per pound. The advance diversion payment rate will be 12.5 cents per pound.

To be eligible for program benefits, producers must limit 1983 cotton planted acreage to no more than 80 percent of the farm's upland cotton base and devote to conservation use an acreage of eligible cropland equal to 25% of the 1983 planted acreage.

For farmers who participated in the 1982 cotton program, the 1983 acreage base will be the same as the 1982 base. If a farmer did not participate in the 1982 program, the 1983 acreage base will be the average acreage planted to upland cotton in 1981 and 1982.

Farmers participating in the 20% acreage reduction program may also voluntarily divert up to another 5% and receive a diversion payment of 25 cents per pound times the farm payment yield times the acres diverted.

Block said the number of acres eligible for payment will depend on the level of diversion selected by the producer up to the maximum of 5% of the base and on the number of acres planted within the permitted acres. The diverted acreage also must be devoted to conservation use, he said.

The 1983 target price is 76 cents per pound and the loan rate is 55 cents per pound.

The loan rate applies to Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton, micronaire 3.5 through 4.9, at average U.S. location.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm, for which the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two years. It may not be mechanically harvested but may be grazed except during the six principal growing months. Cropland devoted to permanent conservation practices will be eligible for cost-sharing payments through the agricultural conservation program.

Neither cross compliance nor offsetting compliance will apply to the 1983 cotton program.

A recourse seed cotton loan program again will be offered in 1983, Block said. Recourse means the borrower is obligated to pay back the full dollar amount of the loan.

USDA announces 1983 feed grain program

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced a 10% acreage reduction and a 10% paid land diversion for the 1983 feed grain program. Block also announced an additional \$60 million allocated to the fiscal 1983 farm storage facility loan program beyond the \$40 million originally allocated.

Block said current law requires for him to announce only a 10% acreage reduction and 5% paid land diversion program for feed grains. But, with such large supplies, he said an additional 5% paid diversion would help bring supply more in balance with demand. "We must do everything possible to reduce carryover supplies and increase commodity prices," Block said.

Block said the per bushel target prices for 1983-crop feed grains will be: corn,

\$2.86; sorghum, \$2.72; barley, \$2.60; and oats, \$1.60. Regular Commodity Credit Corporation price support loan rates, per bushel, will be: corn, \$2.65; sorghum, \$2.52; barley, \$2.16; oats, \$1.36; and rye, \$2.25.

The sign-up for the 1983 feed grain program will be Oct. 1 through March 31. Producers may request 50% of their projected 1983 deficiency payments and 50% of their 1983 diversion payments when they sign up.

USDA estimates per-bushel deficiency payment rates will be: corn, 21 cents; sorghum, 20 cents; and barley, 15 cents. Advance deficiency payments to eligible farmers will be half these rates. Advance deficiency payments are not authorized for oats.

Land diversion payments have been established at \$1.50 per bushel for corn and

sorghum, \$1 for barley and 75 cents for oats. The land diversion payment is based on the per bushel payment rate times the farm yield times the acres diverted.

Farmers who request advance diversion payments at the time they sign up for the 1983 program will receive a payment equal to half the established payment rates.

A producer who accepts an advance payment, but who later does not comply with program provisions, must refund the amount of the advance payment with interest. Interest charged will be the rate in effect for commodity loans on the date of the advance payment, plus 5 percentage points.

To be eligible for these benefits as well as for price support loans, a producer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats and barley acreage planted for harvest to not more than 80% of the farm's feed grain base.

As under the 1982 program, two bases will be established: one for corn and sorghum, the other for barley and oats.

Producers also must devote to conservation uses an acreage equal to both the acreage reduction and land diversion requirements.

Land designated for conservation use must have been devoted to row crops or small grains in two of the last three years except for a summer fallow farm, for which the cropping requirement is for only one of the previous two years. Mechanical harvesting is not authorized and grazing will not be permitted during the six principal growing months on the acreage taken from production, Block said.

The 1983 feed grain bases will remain the same as the 1982 feed grain bases with adjustment for crop rotation. Neither cross compliance nor offsetting compliance will apply to the 1983 feed grain program.

Block said USDA is delaying decisions on the 1983 feed grain reserve program until the domestic and world supply and demand situation is studied.

The Dimmitt Police Department has purchased and turned over to the animal control officer, eight traps, which safely and harmlessly capture nuisance animals ranging in size from small cats to the largest breeds of dogs.

The property owner must sign a form authorizing the

trap to be placed on their property.

The animal control officer will handle all baiting, re-setting, collecting of animals and transporting the trap from the property.

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
