Beside that figure, the national debt looks small, and the cost of the World War could have been quickly ab-

Of course any such estimate of lost national income is a pretty theoretical thing. Neither machines nor men ever run without waste under any conceivable system of government. All this figure does is to point out to us rather convincingly our central problem. We must, whatever else happens, find ways of increasing that unemployment.
