What Does the War Mean to Business?

If subsequent analysis bear out present predictions that the American business curve is bending upward once more, full credit for the expansion of domestic markets is likely to go to the war abroad. There is scant reason to deny that any European conflict should produce some effect on American business. No one in this country believed indices would be unaffected when hostilities broke out in Septem-

It is too early to forecast accurately the eventual results of Europe's conflict on business trends in the United States, but it is interesting to note the theory that the war was merely the instrument rather than the cause of expansion. This point of view is taken by The Annalist in its quarterly review and business forecast edition.

Since the United States was swept into the depression in 1929, industrial production has curved downward, despite a continued increase in population, it is pointed out. "From comparative charts, it is concluded that demand for manufacturing output has been restrained during the past 10 years almost to the point where increased consumption must become inevitable.

"It seems reasonable to conclude that the outbreak of war has been merely the spark needed to touch off the laent demand for gods suggested by the marked disparity ince 1929 between the growth of the population and the rend of industrial production." The Annalist declares. It ollows as a corollary that if a sharp decline would come ifter the cessation of hostilities, business would shortly find is own level again and proceed with the interrupted ex-

Furthermore, an increasingly large group of American . seconomists and industrialists say that if the United States arenters the war, the post-war outlook would be black. Excessive profits during the period of the war would be clipped by high taxes. Even though there might be enough left mto give industrialists an ample share, the somber after-effects do not appeal to business men today.

This country does not want another 1929. Excesses in withe business cycle must be eliminated in favor of a steady market flow. War profiteering, in its most sinister connota'ion, can produce no healthy results. So far, American business men want none of it. For the most part, they have expressed their desire to ride with the normal trend, forcgoing the hasty profits that may later lead to ruin

Courses in animal management and in meat and dairy hygiene are conducted by the Army Veterinary School. Young men interested in animal husbandry can there learn veterinary hygiene, anatomy, physiology, and first-aid. To those interested in food inspection, instruction is given in analytical, chemical, and bacterialogical examination of milk, fresh meats, processed meats, oils and fats, poultry and eggs, dairy p and fruits and vegetables. Instruction is also given in inspection of poultry and dairy farms.

The Army Medical School trains laboratory students in the techniques of blood cultures, Wasserman tests, analysis of drinking water, and study of specimens, chemically and microscopically, for bac teria. These courses are known technically as bacteriology, chemistry, helminthology, protozoology, haematology, and serology. The Xray technician's course embraces X-ray physics, wiring diagrams, maintenance and repair of equipment, films and processing, Roentgen and surface anatomy, fluorocopyy, manipulation of X-ray units, and localization of foreign bodies.

Enlisted men whose interests and abilities lie in administration and nursing are sent to the Medical Field Service School at Carlisle Barracks, near Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, for a four months' course, Administrative work, to the extent of typewriting and filing, is also taught at the other




