Viola and I have had that experience on four different occasions and it was with deep regret that we left our old locations to seek our fortune in communities that we hoped would give our family better opportunities.

Don's column in the Arizona Record had a standing head, "I've Said It," and the caption last week was "Like No Other Place In The World." The column follows:

The time has come for me to put aside the problems of the hour and talk instead of cabbages, kings and swan songs.

After seven years, 361 issues, 1456 deadlines, 7300 pictures and 11,000 stories, I'm ending my tenure with Globe and the Record. I'm going back to the Texas Panhandle, to my other home town, to become co-publisher of the newspaper on which I started as a printer's devil when I was 12.

Dimmitt is the kind of home town a man can go back to. In the last 10 years it has doubled in population, and has added three schools, five churches, two subdivisions, two shopping centers, a processing industry, a large manufacturing plant, a new county hospital, a municipal complex, and a multitude of new businesses. Next year, construction will start on a \$20 million grain sorghum refinery there. The farmers who nurture its irrigated land are mostly college trained, and they posted the highest per-family income in the U. S. in the 1960 census. Added to the considerations of family, lifetime friends and future ownership, it's an opportunity I can't turn down.

But Verble and I will miss this town, where we invested seven years of our lives. We'll think of you and Globe not more than 50 times a day, and we'll remember:

Driving 2400 miles to get here from an Army post in Georgia, sight unseen, with the back seat of the car converted to a bed and playpen for six month old Cumie.

Bunking in for six weeks at Mrs. Scott's Town House Hotel, and wondering whatinell a building was doing on a slope like that.

Living in three homes in seven years, the last our own.

Rev. Hal Heath sitting up with me at Gila General Hospital late one Sunday night in November, 1961, while Dr. Bishop delivered our son, David. ("You're kidding!" "No I'm not — it's a man child. Do you want proof?")

A town pulling itself out of an induced recession, absorbing the slack, and launching a new period of expansion for itself.

An editorial which Jimmy Synodis at Phoenix Title & Trust Co. used to interest a builder for a new subdivision.

The not-so-pretty stories. The wrecks, the killings, the plane crashes, the attempted murders, the abandoned kids, the morbid trials, which were written. The crimes of fathers against daughters and men against boys, which weren't written. The wonderment of the whys of these things, and the lack of an answer.

The shocked stillness of the town after the assassination of the President. A symbolic composite picture, born of desperation, for which we were erroneously credited with photographic genius.

A memorable trip to Seattle to collect a national award for this column, and the calm conviction that the best ones must not have entered.

A hole in the ground, and a small group of gutsy people who wouldn't say die, and who turned it into a first-class community center.

The annual Globe Folly, where everyone was surprised at the talent, and where our acts were worth \$26 apiece to the Community Center this year.

Accompanied by a caravan of cars, which gathered at the Highway Park south of town, Jack and Mary Flynt were escorted to the welcoming party Tuesday evening on arriving home from Corpus Christi. They had won the signal honor of serving in the top posts of the State American Legion and Auxiliary. Practically every club, civic and business organization in Dimmitt was represented in the welcoming delegation which also included a large number of local and out of town legionnaires.

Latimer Returns From State Workshop For CAP Directors

Frank Latimer, executive director of the Castro County Office of Economic Opportunity, returned home this week after attending a state workshop for CAP executive directors at Austin. Latimer stated that:

"Only fifty-five Community Action Programs cover eighty-eight counties, but seventy-seven percent of the population are organized in Texas, and it is doubtful if many more will meet the requirements of The Office of Economic Opportunity and be funded."

"As with all government programs, if a county fails to avail itself of Federal, State and any public monies, others will qualify and spend the money for you, but in their own counties. However, there never will be enough money, so we are fortunate that our programs have been approved, and we are in excellent positions as further grants are submitted for consideration."

Since the beginning of the Anti-Poverty program under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964: Castro County has received \$97,442 for eight programs. Swisher County has received \$52,642 for four programs. Parmer County has received \$22,692 for four programs. Deaf Smith County has received \$10,050 for one program.

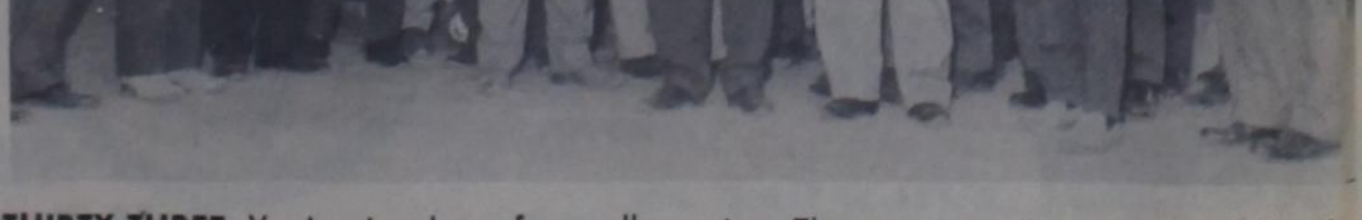
Tech Agriculture Tour Observes Cucumber Production, Processing

Thirty-three vocational agriculture teachers on a tour sponsored by the Texas Tech agriculture education department were in Dimmitt July 21 to observe cucumber production, grading and curing procedures at Western Vegetable.

Tour organizer L. M. Hargraves of the Texas Tech agriculture department said, "We are interested in vegetable production, including beets, onions and potatoes."

"Our stop here is primarily to see and observe cucumber production, grading and curing and to observe tomato growing and mechanical harvesting."

The thirty-three vocational agriculture teachers are from Sidney, Spearman, Grand Falls, Olney and all points in between all over the state.

Mr. and Mrs. Jack Flynt became the first husband and wife team, in the history of the Texas American Legion and Legion Auxiliary to serve in the top posts of the two organizations, when they were elected Sunday as State Commander of the Legion and State President of the Auxiliary. It is believed that they are the first husband and wife team to head the two organizations in any of the states of the nation. Mr. and Mrs. Flynt were elected to the offices of State Commander and Auxiliary president by an almost unanimous vote.

Mr. and Mrs. Flynt were elected to head the two state organizations at the 48th convention of the American Legion which ended in Corpus Christi Sunday. Election of officers of the Legion and Auxiliary were held Sunday morning and the Flynts were installed in the posts they will hold for one year, at installation services Sunday at 1 p.m. According to Mr. Grant Hanna of Hereford, past Commander of the 18th District, the Flynts will be provided with a new car each and also a liberal travel expense account.

Commander Flynt will direct the business and activities of the state American Legion organization with 72,000 members, representing 710 posts from the State

Legion office in Austin. Mrs. Flynt, as State President of the American Auxiliary will head an organization of 20,000 members, representing 450 units, she, too, will headquarter at Austin.

Active in many civic and business organizations, Flynt has served the veterans organizations in a number of positions ranging from private membership to Commander of the Dimmitt Greer H. Estes Post 445 to 18th District Commander for two years to vice-commander for the fourth division. A World War II veteran, Flynt has been a member of Post 445 since 1952.

He is a native of Tulsa where he graduated from high school, and he has a degree from Texas A & M. Duties he has performed as a member of the American Legion includes serving as a member of the Finance Committee, the Resolutions Committee, Credentials Committee, Department Post Activities and Program Committee, M and O Commission and the Rehabilitation Commission of the State Legion Organization.

Mrs. Flynt has been a member of Unit 445 for the past 14 years and has served as president of the unit and of the 18th District three years. She served nine years as unit secretary - treasurer and eleven years as 18th District Girls State Chairman.

A graduate of Happy High School, Mrs. Flynt finished pre-med work at Austin College, Sherman, and taught high school math at Tulsa and Spearman.

Like her husband, Mrs. Flynt has served on practically all major Auxiliary committees and has devoted much time to all phases of Auxiliary activities on local, district and state levels. She has represented her unit for the past fourteen years as delegate and alternate at District, State and National Conventions. She attended national conventions at Denver, Colo., 1961; Las Vegas, Nevada, 1962; Miami, Florida, 1963; and Dallas, Texas, 1964.

Both were sworn in Sunday afternoon after election and presided over executive committee meetings immediately thereafter. About 700 delegates, representing all parts of the state, attended the convention. The Flynts will hold their new offices for one year and will represent their organizations at the national convention in Washington, D. C., August 27 through September 3.

Vegetable Harvest Getting Into Full Swing In Castro County

Vegetable harvests in Castro County are just now getting into full swing with the gathering and processing of carrots, onions and cucumbers.

The harvest of the county's 965 acres of cucumbers has only begun, with some farmers in their second or third week of picking and some not yet started.

Ronnie Smith of Western Vegetable where most of the cucumber crop is being harvested, said that this year's crop is "pretty fair" with prices running close to normal and a little higher. Right now the prices are running a little higher," Smith said.

The harvest should be finished between the first and middle of September, Smith said.

The harvest is also just beginning on the 300 acres of carrots in Castro County. LaMantia-Cullum & Collier, in their first year of operation in Castro County, are handling most of the county's carrots.

The prices are good with 48-lb. bags selling for \$3. According to the management at LaMantia-Cullum & Collier, "the price and quality are good on both," referring to carrots and onions.

There are only about four acres of onions left to be harvested out of the county's 300-400 acres. The carrot harvest will not be completed before the latter part of December.

The 1966 "Miss Grain Sorghum" Pageant is set for August 5 and 6 at the Dimmitt High School Auditorium. Ticket sales have been in progress since July 8 and a capacity crowd is expected when "Miss Grain Sorghum of 1966" is crowned by Lanell Lafon, the reigning "Miss Grain Sorghum."

With the entry deadline near, entries have been received from as far away as Ulysses, Kansas, and as near as Hart, Texas. Eighteen entries have already been received in this year's pageant.

In addition to her title and crown, "Miss Grain Sorghum of 1966" will receive a \$500 scholarship to the college of her choice. In addition, she will represent the grain sorghum industry at various functions throughout the year. Several appearances have already been set up and tentative arrangements have been made for others.

This year's pageant is being carried out over a two-day period. Girls will register at 1 p.m. August 5. That afternoon will be spent in briefings and stage rehearsal. That night a reception will be held for the participants. They will spend the night in private homes and report back to the Auditorium Saturday morning at 9 a.m. for an all day session of interview and talent rehearsals in preparation for the pageant Saturday night.

Tickets will be \$1.50 for adults and \$1 for children. Tickets may be purchased from any member of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce or at the Chamber office.

Congressional Comm. To Consider "Truth In Packaging" Proposal

Congressman Walter Rogers said Saturday the House Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce, of which he is ranking majority member, will begin hearings Tuesday on so-called "truth in packaging" legislation. Congressman Rogers said the proposal is one that "must be weighed very carefully because its provisions could constitute an absolute encroachment into the free enterprise system — and could measurably jeopardize manufacturing progress and opportunities for young people and small businessmen."

Congressman Rogers said the bill to be considered would delegate decision making powers affecting one-fourth of all consumer goods expenditures to officials in Federal regulatory agencies.

"The Committee will have to decide, during its careful review of this matter, whether legislation posed in the name of consumer protection is in reality a further effort by federal regulators to expand their power to regulate this country's economic life and future," Congressman Rogers said.

As initial witnesses, Secretary of Commerce John T. Connor and officials of the Federal Trade Commission and Food and Drug Administration will appear before the Commerce Committee.

In Monday's session of the Committee, Congressman Rogers said, a final decision is expected to be made on provisions to be included in auto safety legislation to be recommended to the House. Con-

gressman Rogers said the controversial, highly-publicized issue of auto safety had been handled by the Committee "in an extremely responsible manner" and that the bill to be reported will be "more practical and workable" than similar legislation passed recently by the Senate.

In the Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, on which Congressman Rogers serves as second ranking majority member, deliberations will continue on the Lower Colorado River Basin Projects Act, legislation which was forwarded to the full Committee by the Rogers Subcommittee on Irrigation and Reclamation. As a result of efforts led by Congressman Rogers, the Texas Panhandle and High Plains area is included in the bills provisions for planning the future use of Western and Southwestern water resources.

The full House of Representatives will spend the week deliberating the Civil Rights Act of 1966, which Congressman Rogers termed "a highly controversial measure certain to touch off a bitter fight on the floor, because the bill's housing provisions, contained in Title IV, are looked upon by some as a flagrant violation of the Constitutional right of private ownership of property."

shape show that size shoe is all wrong for you. In that case, you'd better have your shoe salesman make a special check of the exact size you need.

When the shoe heel pushes under or new lifts are needed often, the shoe is too short. Wear at the toe tip also means that the shoe is too short.

Heels that wear on the inside indicate that your arch is weak. Slight wearing at the back or outside line is normal. When "pockets" for the toes wear inside the sole, the shoe is too tight. A shoe that is puckered or wrinkled behind the ball along the arch shows that it is not long enough from ball to heel, thus pushing the ball of the foot forward. While the overall length of the shoe may be right, the proportion probably is not.

CHUNK PICKLES (SWEET)
7 lbs. medium size cucumbers, slice crossways 1/4 inch thick
2 cups slack lime
2 gal. water

Mix. Soak for 24 hours in crock jar. Rinse thoroughly, cover with cold water, soak for 3 hours.

YOUR OLD SHOES TELL VOLUMES ABOUT YOU

Your shoes should be built for walking, and your old shoes are your best guides to what you need in a new pair. So, if you made mistakes in selecting your last pair of shoes, both your shoes and you have suffered. The way the old shoes look now may show you what those mistakes were.

Here are some of the common signs you may find on your old shoes that indicate some "buy-manship" mistakes. If the shoe is worn unevenly, with most of the signs of wear in the front, the shoe is too short for you. Soles should wear through first at the center. If the upper portions of the shoe bulge over the shoe line, the shoe is too narrow. Shoes that are worn completely out of

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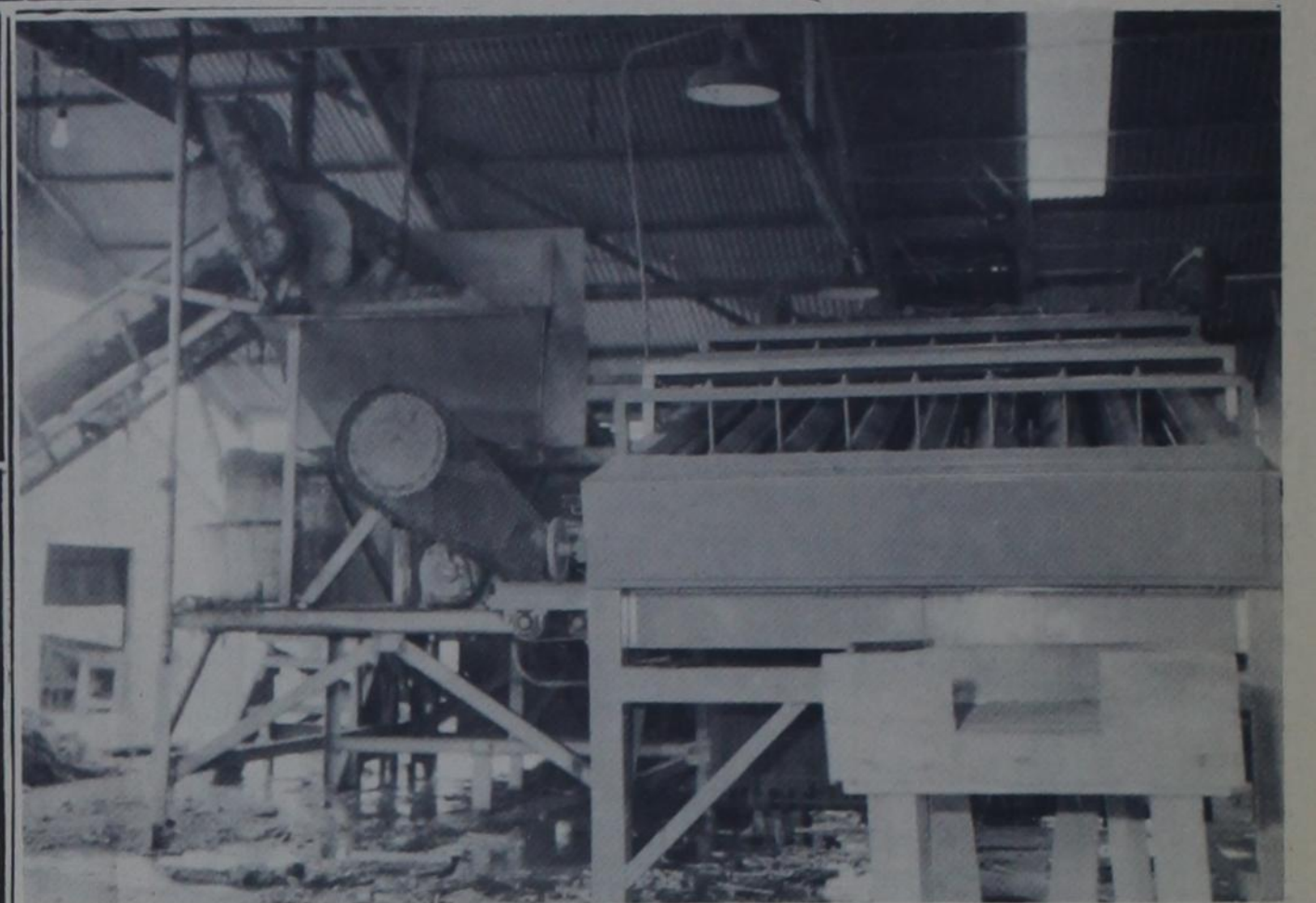

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Black Plastic Ups Cantaloupe Yields

Drive by Roland Dreahn's farm on U. S. highway 290 near Hempstead and you'll see two strips of shiny, black plastic along the ground. Cantaloupes are growing up through the plastic.

Looks kind of odd at first. If you stop and talk to Dreahn, he will tell you that so far this year he's harvested 1,490 pounds of cantaloupes from those two rows. Two identical rows - except for the plastic - have yielded a measly 60 pounds to date.

In this light, it doesn't look so odd, it seems almost fantastic instead.

Dreahn is using the plastic in a demonstration for the Waller County Agricultural Agent, Burl Richardson. Richardson is out to show the truck garden farmers in Waller County the benefits of using the black plastic mulch. Dreahn's demonstration is a good talking point.

"Actually," says County Agent Richardson, "the rows without

the plastic will yield more than 60 pounds. But it will come later - and the early-season price is nearly always better." He figures the rows without plastic may yield 500 pounds at the most. All the rows are 410 feet long.

Richardson says benefits of the plastic are getting early yield (and the higher price) and a higher yield. Reason for the higher yield is the plastic conserves moisture and absorbs sunlight - allowing earlier planting and faster germination.

Also, there is less cultivation labor since weeds won't grow up through the plastic. Nutgrass is the exception. Don't use plastic on ground where there is nutgrass, says Richardson, unless the soil is sterilized first.

The plastic comes in rolls 3 to 4 feet wide. It is rolled down the row before planting, and each edge covered slightly with dirt to hold it down. Then, holes are punched and the seeds planted.

Dreahn says the plastic keeps his cantaloupes from rotting since they rest on the plastic instead of the ground. The plastic can also be used on watermelons, to-
