## DECEMBER HIKE ON WPA WORK IS INDICATED

County Judge W. S. Adamson has received a letter from Major Karl E. Wallace, Fort Worth, director of WPA district No. 7, which states that a substantial increase in the quota of workers on projects in the county is expected for December.

As of November 1 there were 845 men and 270 women working on WPA projects in the county as set according to WPA quotas.

Roughly, at that time there were 1,345 men and 401 women in the county certified for employment on the WPA. The difference between the number working and the number eligible for employment represents the number of WPA clients idle.

Should the quota be increased for December, the county is well-prepared with projects upon which to work, said Judge Adamson.

Lloyd E. 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## SUSPENSION OF GOVERNOR NOT EXPECTED SOON

AUSTIN, Nov. 24.—Rep. Bailey Ragsdale of Crockett, who proposed to "suspend" Gov. O'Daniel until old age assistance is financed, said today he does not intend immediately to contact representatives regarding a session of the house for that purpose.

Ragsdale called O'Daniel an "obstacle to old age assistance."

The Crockett legislator said he had not contacted Lt. Gov. Coke Stevenson to ask if he would call a special session if O'Daniel were suspended.

The procedure outlined by Ragsdale is for the house to convene themselves and prefer an impeachment charge. That would require 76 of 150 representatives approval, but Ragsdale does not propose impeachment. The charges would automatically impeach the governor until he is tried by the senate.

Ragsdale said that instead of proceeding with the action Lt. Gov. Stevenson could call a special session to pass a social security legislation, then he said he would personally offer a resolution to rescind the action.

EDINBURG, Nov. 24.—"Preposterous, absurd, ridiculous," was State Senator Roger Kelly's comment on the proposal to suspend Gov. O'Daniel while the legislature holds a special session.

"That's just about the craziest thing I ever heard of," said Rep. McDaniel.

## German U-Boat Confirms Report Of Torpedoing

BERLIN, Nov. 24.—The navy high command announced today that a German submarine had confirmed the torpedoing of the British cruiser Belfast, 10,000 tons, in the Firth of Forth off Scotland.

"A New York Times report that the British cruiser Belfast was badly damaged has been confirmed by commander of a German U-boat," the communique said.

The United Press London bureau cabled "unable to reply" to the British view on the report.

## Parents-Teachers End State Meeting

GALVESTON, Nov. 24.—The Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers was pledged today to prohibition of liquor sales within 300 feet of school boundary lines.

Present laws prohibit such sales within 300 feet of school doors. Other proposals approved were to keep the United States out of war, to promote democracy, to expand vocational education and provide teacher retirement funds.

The convention chose Dallas for its 1940 meeting place.

BAIRD, Nov. 24.—Clyde defeated Olden 39 to 13 here Thursday to win the unorganized championship of their half of district 12B.

Clyde and Olden were tied for their half of the district, and agreed to forfeit to the winner of the May-Baird game, scheduled in Cisco Friday.

Hugh Tarrant, Clyde back, made four of his team's touchdowns, and threw a pass for another.

He went through the line for the first tally on a drive originating on Clyde 40.

Olden counted twice in the second on passes from Bryant to Hendrick and Hoekman, the latter taking the ball for a 32-yard gain, and the score. With one extra point added, Olden led, 13 to 6, but the Bulldogs came back after taking the next kickoff, with Tarrant scoring.

H. Tarrant passed to Klipper for the third Clyde touchdown, Tarrant added another in the third period, and ran 54 yards for a score in the fourth. Tate intercepted an Olden pass for the final touch.

Klipper placed the point conversions after the last three touchdowns.

## ROOSEVELT IS EXPECTING BIG DEFENSE FUND

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., Nov. 24.—President Roosevelt hinted today the next congress might be asked for emergency taxes for national defense to finance outlays of \$2,000,000,000 for the armed forces of the United States.

He asked the American people to decide if they prefer to finance national defense by borrowing or by a pay-as-you-go plan, based on new taxes.

Heavy national defense needs, he said, are making an otherwise optimistic fiscal picture. If cuts were made in non-defense appropriations and tax revenues continue at their present high level, the deficit during the next fiscal year might be cut by one half, Mr. Roosevelt said.

The white house also denied that Ambassador Joseph Kennedy had been called home from London for consultations.

The statement authorized by President Roosevelt denied that Kennedy and the ambassadors to France, Belgium and Poland had been ordered home. He said Kennedy had asked for a Christmas leave, and it had been granted.

## Province Capital Held By Japanese After Long Raid

SHANGHAI, Nov. 24.—The fall of Nanning, capital of Kwangsi province after four days of artillery and aerial bombardment, which set large portions of the city afire, was announced today by the Japanese army.

The city was littered with dead and wounded civilian victims of 10 air raids a day for three days. The air raids were preceded by artillery bombardment.

Occupation of Nanning by the Japanese cuts off a vital source of Chinese arms and ammunition which were being brought from French Indo China.

## 1940 Texas Crops Will Be Balanced

DALLAS, Nov. 24.—E. R. Alexander, head of the department of agricultural education of Texas A. & M. said Texas farmers in 1940 will have the best opportunity they ever had to "produce a balanced crop and balanced living."

The British steamer Mangalore, 8,832 tons, was sunk by a mine today while at anchor off the coast. The crew of 44 was rescued.

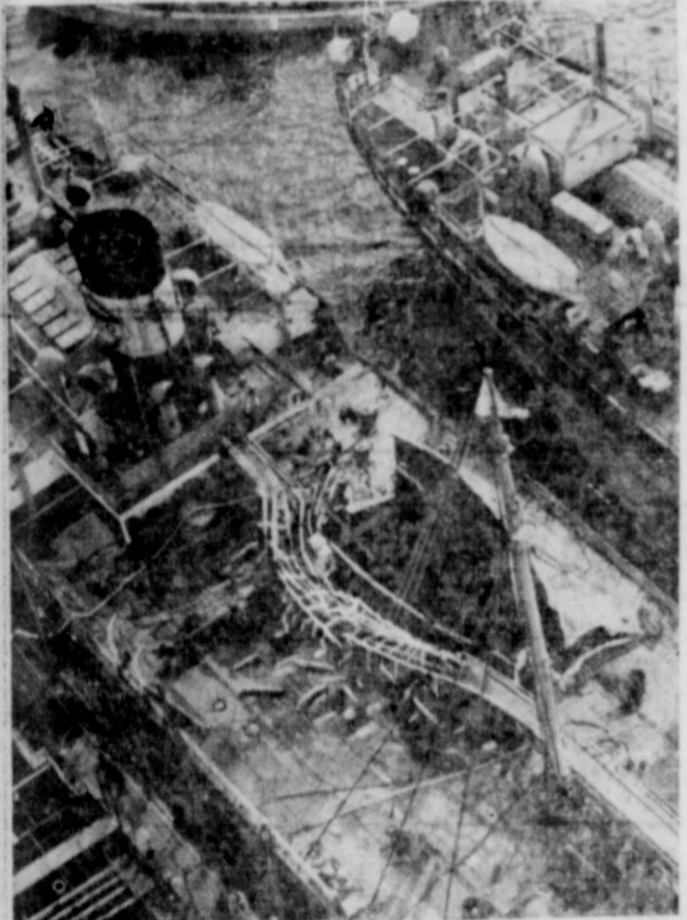

## U.S. Shipping Needs a Helping Hand

Eventually, perhaps, South American routes will open up for the United States merchant marine. Later, there will be more trade among nations on the American continents when foreign ships are gradually taken off and U. S. commerce and tourist trade increases.

But until then, the United States will have a shipping problem, no matter what attitude government officials may take on transfer of registry for boats now flying the American flag. It is a situation to which no one paid much attention while the debate over the neutrality act revisions was going on in Congress. But, when it was all over, everyone agreed that it should have been foreseen all along.

It is estimated that about 130 of the 4522 vessels in the American merchant fleet will go out of U. S. European service because of the new neutrality act restrictions. This means a loss of about 800,000 tons of the total 11,000,000-ton registry. Application to transfer eight of these ships to Panamanian registry is awaiting action in Washington, while owners of most of the others wait to learn what precedent will be set. Between 8000 and 10,000 seamen will lose their jobs, according to some union leaders.

Joseph R. Ryan, president of the A. F. of L. International Longshoremen's Union, has indicated that most of the men in his union will not suffer because foreign boats bearing away munitions and war supplies will still have to be loaded by American dockhands. Ryan is not opposed to the transfer of registry. Leaders of other maritime unions, however, have registered emphatic protests.

And protests have come from other sources. Both the spirit of the neutrality law and the Monroe Doctrine have been cited as reasons why transfer of registry should not be permitted. Senator Charles L. McNary (Rep., Ore.) had Panama's interest in mind when he said: "Panama is in a sense a ward of America. The guardian should be mindful of its actions." Others have pointed to Panama's strategic position as a defender of the Panama Canal and the folly of the United States in subjecting this Latin-American nation to any undue international embarrassment.

There is a question whether refusal to permit the transfer would help to keep American seamen employed. Under either circumstance, it appears, seamen would lose their jobs. If the ships are transferred, Britons will replace the crews. If the vessels continue to fly the American flag, they may be forced out of service. Shipping companies can be expected to send out their boats with empty holds, unless heavily subsidized.

If there is any chance of opening up new trade, in both tourists and freight, among Pan-American nations, this possibility should be thoroughly explored. Such an arrangement would be far the best, amenable to government, labor, and shipping firms alike.

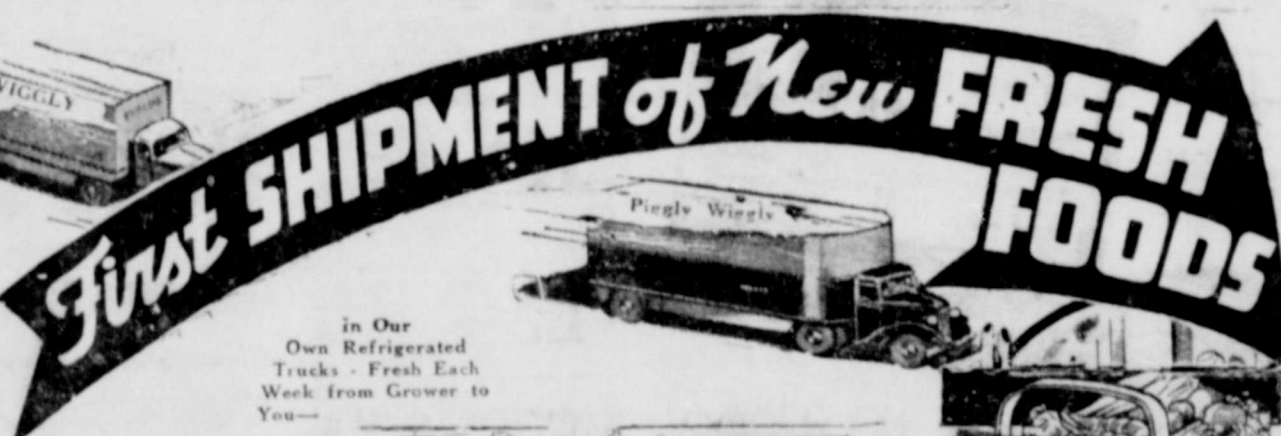
