Pastor of Ranger Church Dies After A Sudden Attack

Dr. L. B. Gray, for several years pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Ranger, died suddenly in a Ranger hospital Wednesday night, within an hour after being received as a patient.

Dr. Gray had been in ill health for several years, though his condition was not serious and he recently obtained a leave of absence from his church to recuperate. At noon Wednesday, just a few hours before he died, the pastor had charge of the Ranger Rotary Club program, and delivered an address on Thanksgiving.

For several years before moving to Ranger Dr. Gray had been pastor of the First Presbyterian Church at Strawn, and filled the pulpits of the churches both in Ranger and Strawn.

Since moving to Ranger he had become one of the most active workers for charities of all kinds and took an active part in all civic movements in the city, and was beloved by all who knew him.

NIMROD GAME ASSOCIATION NAMES CHIEFS

Officers of the Nimrod Game Management Association were elected this week and rules for the coming season drafted.

The officers chosen were: J. E. Stansell, president; B. P. Notgrass vice president, and A. N. McBeth, secretary-treasurer.

After a report on an inventory of quail had been given which disclosed there are less this year in the community than last year, it was decided that only members of the association may kill quail the coming year.

It was stated that the kill of members of the association will be limited to not over 40 per cent of the birds on the land.

Given as reasons for the decrease in quail on the land were that June rains drowned many eggs and wild house cats had killed more than hunters.

A change was made in the by-laws which permits the annual meeting to be held in November instead of the last half of January as heretofore.

There are 19 members in the association who have adopted conservation rules on a total of 6,007 acres of land.

Corrine Maddox Is No Billed By The Grand Jury

DALLAS, Nov. 29.—Miss Corrine Maddox, 26-year-old blond stenographer, who shot attorney Brooks Coffman to death on a busy Dallas street last week, was freed today of charges of murder.

A Dallas county grand jury returned a no-bill in the case.

"I'm so glad it's all over," Miss Maddox exclaimed. "Now I want to forget the whole affair."

Miss Maddox had been free on bond since Nov. 20, when she shot Coffman to death with two pistols.

Coffman admitted last spring the stabbing of Miss Maddox said she was driven to the slaying by fear Coffman would kill her first.

Kokomo Club Is Told of Poultry Feeding Methods

"Place a dry mash hopper at a convenient location in the poultry house," said Mrs. L. R. Higginbottom at a meeting with the Kokomo Girls 4-H Club Nov. 22, at the clubhouse.

This will not only save time in feeding the flock, but will also help to insure maximum production. Drinking water should be accessible to the hens at all times, as eggs contain a large proportion of water, and if they do not have water when they want it and need water when they want it, the egg production will be cut down.

Also keep plenty of clean straw or other litter on the floor of your hen house. If one will follow these suggestions your egg production and help you to have a better flock.

Biggest Victory Farmer's Death Found as Natural In Wood's Inquest



Natural causes were found as the cause of death of Ennis Henderson in an inquest conducted Tuesday evening by Justice of Peace E. E. Wood of Eastland.

Mr. Henderson, about 48, had been ill for some time. His death followed a hemorrhage of the lung Tuesday afternoon. Friends said a doctor had recently made application for Mr. Henderson, a farmer, to enter a state tubercular hospital.

The inquest was conducted at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Houston Williamson, one and one-half miles northeast of Morton Valley. Mr. Henderson had made his home with the Williamsons.

The body was shipped to Wills Point where it was said three children survive.

At the inquest Mrs. Williamson said Mr. Henderson had appeared in a grave condition when she arrived at the house that afternoon.

Mr. Henderson formerly resided at Olden.

Slayer of Police Officer Is Sought Near Big Spring

BIG SPRING, Nov. 29.—State and local police engaged in a hunt today for the slayer of W. J. O'Leary, 42, assistant Big Spring police chief, shot to death Sunday morning.

The slayer was believed to be a negro woman who was heard arguing with him shortly before the fatal shot was fired.

Texas Rangers and State Police came here from Austin, Lubbock and Pecos. The Big Spring commission was today considering offering a reward for the slayers' capture.

Long Auto Strike Is Ended Today

DETROIT, Nov. 29.—A 54-day strike in the plants of Chrysler Corporation, longest in the history of the automobile industry, was to end today with ratification of a new contract with the company and the United Automobile Workers.

The new contract will give wage increases and will give the company complete control of production. The strike cost the company \$102,000 and made 60,000 workers idle.

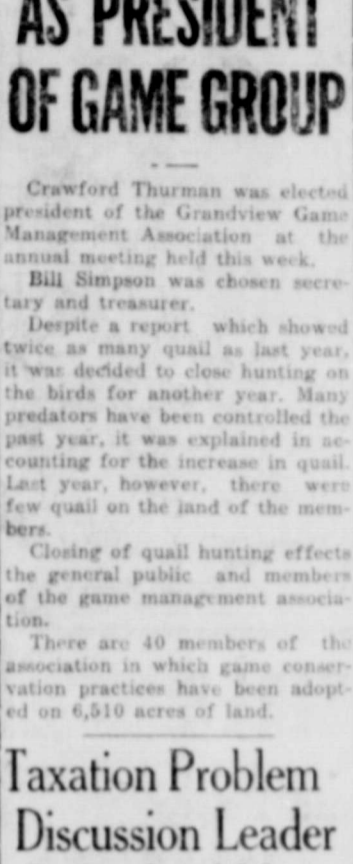
Russia Protests Border Incident

State School Land To Go On Sale In Texas January 2nd

Bascom Giles, commissioner of the general land office, will place on the market for sale January 2, 1940, 200,000 acres of surveyed school lands in the state.

A total of 480 acres of land to be sold by the state is located in Eastland county.

Of the 480 acres in the county, 320 are in the R. S. & F. survey and 160 acres in the H. T. & L. Railway company survey. Minimum price will be \$2 per acre.

Any tract containing 80 acres or more may be sold for cash or on time for at least one-fourth cash and the remainder payable in 39 equal installments, bearing five per cent interest, payable annually.

Applications to purchase on time must be accompanied by the first payment in cash or in such form as may be collectable at par in Austin, and a note in the prescribed form for the deferred payment.

Interest is due Nov. 1 of each year, and unless paid, the sale will be subject to forfeiture and the land again offered for sale.

In the office of County Clerk R. V. Galoway is a list of all lands, both in this county and the entire state, which will be offered for sale. Persons may inspect the list and secure further information from Galoway. Due to a scarcity of lists, persons will only be allowed to inspect the list since the land commissioner did not supply many.

RUSSIA SAYS ITS PATIENCE IS AT AN END



The patience of Soviet Russia with Finland "is ended" the official newspaper at Moscow declared today after disclosure that the Red fleet had been heavily reinforced in the Gulf of Finland.

Climaxing a series of bitter attacks on the Finnish government and announcement of four clashes on the frontier, the newspaper charged that the guns fired at the Russian forces were "aimed from Helsingfors and possibly from other capitals."

"Thousands of meetings testify that the long patience of the Soviet people is ended," the paper said.

Dispatches from Helsingfors said official sources feared that the Russians were planning a quick solution of the crisis before winter. Well informed sources believed that the Finns must capitulate or face war.

Soviet airplanes roamed over the Finnish frontier and it was reported Finnish legation in Moscow was under guard.

Hour after hour the Soviets tried to force home to Finland that they must give in to Russian demands for withdrawal of Finnish troops from the frontier and for naval bases on Finnish territory.

Finland's population of 3,800,000 was calm, though it was obvious they would get only moral support from the Scandinavian, British and Italian governments if Russia's population of 180,000,000 was thrown against them.

Reports were received of another battle in the North Sea with battleships and airplanes participating.

A German plane was attacked by British fighters as it approached the northeast coast of England and the air ministry said it dived into the clouds toward the sea. Search by fishing boats failed to find the craft.

British planes previously had raided the northern coast of Germany, turning machine guns on the airframe at Borkum.

The toll of shipping in the mine was expected to be decreasing, but the 1,041 ton British steamer Rubislaw hit a mine and sank with a loss of 13 lives off the English coast.

19 of Jury Are Picked On Panel In Maverick Case

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 29.—Nineteen of 32 prospective jurors were qualified today to hear the trial of Mayer Maury Maverick on charges of violating state election laws.

The 32-member panel was to be completed this afternoon, then the defense and prosecution will eliminate 10 each from the panel.

Maverick appeared dejected over his failure to have the charges dismissed.

Rains Fall Over All West Texas

Light general rains fell today over most of Texas giving relief from droughts that have given worry to farmers.

The heaviest fall last night was 49 of an inch at Big Spring, 1.1 Paso and Wichita Falls had .29 and all other weather stations in the western part of Texas had drizzles of .1 of an inch or less, except Amarillo.

The light rain continued over most of the state. Minimum temperature reported last night was 31 at Amarillo.

Tick Quarantine About Ended In State Of Texas

FORT WORTH, Texas—Final written on one of the bloodiest chapters in cattle country history with announcement that tick quarantines had virtually ended in Texas.

Commission of Texas, announced upon receipt of proclamation from Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel that no whole Texas county will be under both federal and state quarantine after December 1.

The original tick quarantine—designed to prevent spread of cattle fever—was placed on 198 Texas counties by federal and state governments in 1906. The quarantine included 191,885 square miles. Under the proclamation of Dec. 1, the entire quarantine area will comprise less than 3,000 square miles.

State agencies will release certain areas Dec. 1. Dr. H. L. Darby, inspector in charge of the Bureau of Animal Industry, USDA, here said Federal quarantine will not be lifted until about Dec. 15.

After State and Federal quarantine is lifted only parts of five South Texas counties will remain on the list. They are Cameron, Hidalgo, Starr, Webb and Zapata counties. Released entirely are Angelina, Hardin, Polk and Shelby counties, and parts of Cameron, Webb and Zapata counties.

The quarantine in Texas and other cattle raising states was an outgrowth of bloody cattle drive wars between 1866-1895, the era of the great drives north to market. Ranchers above the Mason and Dixon line frequently way-laid cattle drives and pitched war ensued because the northern ranchers feared their cattle would become infected with cattle fever.

Cuban Guineas Are Released In Texas As Game Birds

AUSTIN, Tex.—While Texans are blasting away at deer and turkey, the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has, in an effort to add to the wildlife supply of the Lone Star State, released 200 wild Cuban guineas on three south Texas areas. It was announced here today by the Department's Executive Secretary. It has long been believed by the game chief that wild guineas will prosper in several sections of Texas. In Cuba the wild guinea, which is not as pump as the domesticated guinea of the United States but which is more streamlined, is considered a rare game bird and hundreds of Americans travel to that island annually for that sport.

Should the birds prosper in the areas where they were released, the Game Commission plans to obtain, if possible, an additional thousand birds. However, a full test of the wild guinea's adaptability to conditions in Texas cannot possibly be completed for two years.

Wild guineas flush easily and, in contrast to the domesticated guinea, which they resemble greatly in color, fly as far as a quarter of a mile when flushed. Due to the fact that the birds roost high in trees and therefore are not so accessible to predators and because climatic conditions in South Texas are similar to those found in parts of Cuba, it is believed the birds will do well. They start nesting in March in Cuba and have clutches of eggs ranging from 20 to 30.

Game Demonstration Signs Do Not All Mean No Hunting

AUSTIN, Tex.—A misconception of the meaning of the Game Preserve Demonstration signs which so generously dot the countryside in Texas these days has grown up in the minds of the majority of sportsmen seeking places to hunt. Those signs do not necessarily mean that no hunting is allowed on the land posted with them, extension department officials of A. & M. College, under whose jurisdiction the program is

being carried on, pointed out recently. Landowners who are members of the game organizations using the signs do, however, insist that permission be obtained before hunters enter their land.

Some of the posted areas are closed to hunting because there is not sufficient game on them to make it safe for shooting and still have seed stock with which to raise more game. So, if you are looking for a place to hunt and see those signs, inquire as to whether the land is open to shooting. It may be that there is sport awaiting you beyond those signs.

"The money collected will be more than enough to assure five little tots that they can remain in the nursery for a month, as it takes only \$2 a month for their needs while in the nursery."

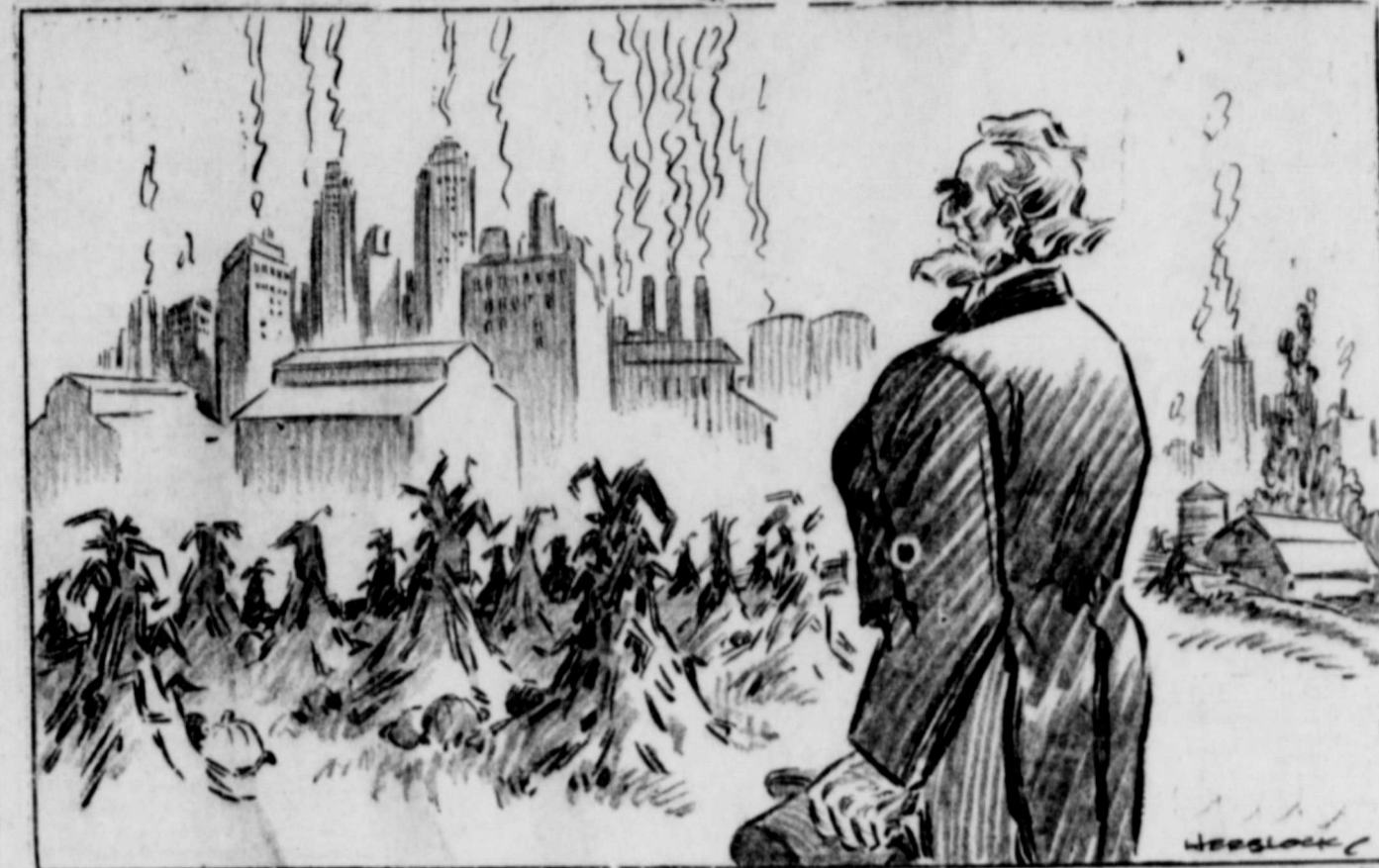

Simpler Homes and Lower Building Costs

Low-income families who are getting a little tired of folding beds and cupboard kitchens can take heart from the fact that the average home built during the first six months of 1933 cost less than did the average home built during the preceding three years. This does not mean building costs were down, but rather that people were building less elaborate houses.

According to the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the average cost between January and July of this year was \$3611; in 1936 the average was \$4044. These figures represent the bare cost of the building. They do not include land, land improvements, profits and commissions, which will bring the cost to the purchaser to something better than \$5000.

This figure is still too high. The Home Loan Bank Board says it's too high, and I. N. Tate, vice president of the Weyerhaeuser Sales Company, St. Paul, Minn., agrees with the board. Mr. Tate declares that about 75 per cent of all the homes being built retail for more than \$5000—and only 25 per cent of the wage earners in the country can afford to buy a home at this price.

The U. S. attorney general's office is currently investigating high building costs. It is possible that this campaign will result in price moderations. But even if every abuse is eliminated, the result will not be the complete answer to the building enigma—it will be merely a step toward bringing prices within the \$2000-\$4000 range, which most workers can afford.

The rest of the problems will have to be solved by the people who build houses and the people who live in them. The basic prices of materials will not be reduced very much; the price of labor can scarcely be expected to decline. But if the home owner were willing to live in the kind of house his income can stand instead of feeling that he must have a house better than the Joneses next door and the Smiths across the street, he would be much better off.

The four Hoess brothers in Hammond, Ind., tried out that idea, and it worked. The brothers had a lot of idle land on their hands, so they cut it up into acre lots and built identical houses. Each house sold for \$2600—complete with the land. The purchaser had to make some of the improvements, but he had his home.

This is the answer that the construction conferees in Washington suggested. Some builders were optimistic enough to predict that the cost of homes will be reduced by 50 per cent if buyers aren't too fussy about having something "different" and if they don't ask for too many frills in the design.

It's pretty well established that mass production cuts down costs. Each house will cost less and can be more quickly erected if the builder can use the same pattern throughout his project.

Perhaps if potential home owners get together with builders they will be able to afford to buy homes—and still have enough money left over to eat regularly.

BRUCE CATTON IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — Government officials who have been giving all of their time to the much talked of South American export trade boom are beginning to admit it will take the United States a long time to cash in on any opportunity that may be present there.

The last of three important conferences on the subject has just been finished at the Commerce Department. A survey of the ground covered indicates that no immediate boom is in sight. Crux of the matter is that if the South Americans are going to buy more goods from this country, some United States money must somehow be put in their hands. The conference examined three means by which this might be done: A step-up of tourist travel, an increase in sales of South American manufactured goods for U. S. retail trade, and an increase in exports of South American raw materials to this nation.

Most recent was the travel conference. Last year, Americans spent something like \$8,000,000 on travel in South America. They also spent close to \$135,000,000 on travel in Europe.

With the war on, no \$135,000,000 will be spent in Europe in 1940. If a good share of this tourist travel could be diverted to South America, American exports to South America could rise by that much.

Steamship company executives, Commerce Department experts on Latin America, and representatives of South American governments gathered to discuss the ways and means of this diversion.

The South Americans were urged to spend some real money on advertising, to lift some of the

petty restrictions imposed on foreign travelers and to provide better accommodations in some of the interior cities. It was suggested the shippers put on special cruises to make a strong bid for the tourist trade.

The conference on retail trade was held some three weeks ago.

Buyers for American stores are looking for new sources to supply a great variety of finished goods heretofore bought in Europe. In many instances, South America could give very well filled bill.

Take gloves. Many of the gloves sold in the United States have been made in Czechoslovakia and Austria, from hides produced in Chile. Chile still has the hides, and has a good supply of highly skilled labor. It ought to be easy to start a thriving glove industry in Chile.

The retailers suggested a skilled analysis of the situation be made by a mission composed of an American retail expert, a stylist and a production engineer. This trio would visit South America, interpret the North American market to the South American manufacturers, and give both sides a detailed report on the possibilities.

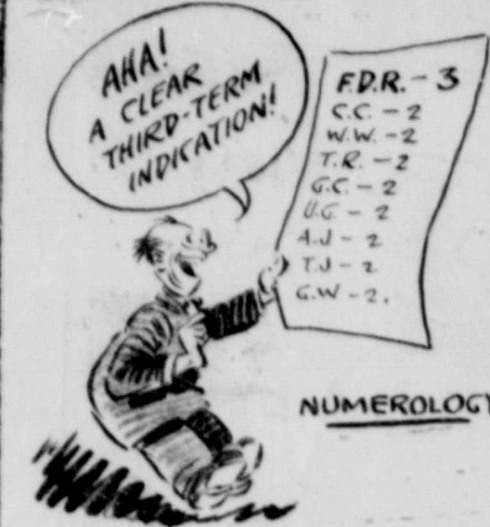
The conference visions a trade center in New York, where American buyers could see just what the South Americans have to offer and could submit samples of the sort of thing the American buying public wants.

No matter what is done along these lines, the underlying fact exists that new capital is needed.

The South Americans at the conference kept interjecting, "We must have credits." Before American retail trade can take a really big bite into South American production, someone must invest some U. S. dollars in the South American industries. To date that someone has not shown up.

Selling Of Tickets From Door To Door Bad Psychology

EL PASO, Texas.—Ticket selling from door to door by "your's and the neighbor's kids" Creates a bad psychological effect in the minds of children during the formative periods of their lives, believes Dr. I. M. Epstein, psychiatrist and child guidance director of El Paso schools. "The door to door business is like PWA—except that the neighbor does the supporting instead of the federal government," Dr. Epstein said.

The child too often gets the wrong psychological effect by selling on the basis of making the purchaser feel sorry for him and helping him win a prize or get rid of the tickets, he said. This leads to the "panhandling slant."

"I think the ticket selling habit is bad for children. If the child is selling something for which the buyer gets his money's worth, it's not so bad in the psychological effect, especially if the child is selling to persons interested," Dr. Epstein said.

WILD LIFE

Hoboes Help Feed Wild Turkeys

Not because the hoboes wanted to help feed the wild turkeys but because they were forced to do so by a trainman near Wichita Falls recently. The story goes that when a train conductor stops his train to sweep out the grain cars so that the wild turkeys may be fed, the Game Department feels that it is getting cooperation of the highest caliber. That is exactly what is happening in Archer county. The state game warden at Wichita Falls recently noticed the train halted near a river and the dust was flying out of the doors of several cars. Upon investigation he found that the conductor had about a half dozen hoboes sweeping out grain from grain cars to a bunch of wild turkeys that use that area. Questioned, the conductor said that he had heard the warden's plea, last winter when snow was on the ground, about feeding wildlife, said he had decided that everytime he had any empty grain cars on his train he would make use of the bums riding by having them sweep out the cars at a place where he knew a bunch of about 40 turkeys were ranging and were now being fed in this unusual way. Our thanks go to this unnamed train conductor for his service to wildlife by helping feed this group of turkeys.

Landowners Appreciate Sportsman Cooperator

It has been reported to me several times this dove season by the landowners in the good dove areas that they appreciate the cooperation given them this season by the hunters. Heretofore the hunter was hunted on many places where they had no permission, tore down fences and left gates open and really did everything to make the landowners want the hunting stopped. When these good hunting places are taken care of by the hunter, that hunter will usually have a place for a return hunt.

The work of the many landowners in Central Texas and the willingness of the hunter to cooperate with the landowner in these projects have produced good results this year. Hunters in Central Texas will have the best quail shooting that we have seen in a number of years. It is up to the hunter to help take care of this increase and not try to kill every bird in a covey just because you can. While hunting if a covey of about four or six birds get up, DON'T SHOOT; let's save them to

raise us some birds for next year. Get your portion of birds out of a large covey and don't wipe out three coveys of four birds to get your limit of 12 birds. This will be cutting your own throat for quail shooting next year. Let the landowner know in some way that you appreciate him for you to hunt and not see damage and trouble you. He is your friend in this privilege; so there's a place to hunt when the comes around again.

Baptists Expecting 10,000 At Session Of Training Union

AUSTIN, Texas—An attendance of more than 10,000 is expected for the 49th annual session of the Baptist training union to be held in Austin Nov. 29, Dec. 1 and Dec. 2.

More than 4,000 members have already registered from the 12,000 counties in the Austin Baptist district.

Plans will be laid at the session for the golden anniversary meeting to be held in 1949.

The opening meeting will be held in Gregory gymnasium of the University of Texas, where Dr. George W. Truett of Dallas will preach the convention Thanksgiving sermon. Austin churches which usually hold a union Thanksgiving service will participate in this service. Other sessions of the whole organization will be in Gregory gymnasium. Conferences will be at available buildings on the University campus or at churches adjacent to the campus.

Messengers are expected from 2,000 churches, the organization membership totaling 185,000. The

annual conventions of the Training Union are usually the most largely attended of any of the state's religious gatherings. An Austin committee in co-operation with the Chamber of Commerce is making arrangements to obtain rooms for the visitors. The university cafeteria and coffee-shop which ordinarily would close for the holidays will be kept open during the convention.

Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel and Mayor Tom Miller of Austin are on the program for addresses at the opening session. The keynote address has been assigned to Dr. Fred Eastham of Wichita Falls. Dr. T. C. Gardner, Dallas, is director of the work of the union. H. O. Rothell, Dallas layman, is president.

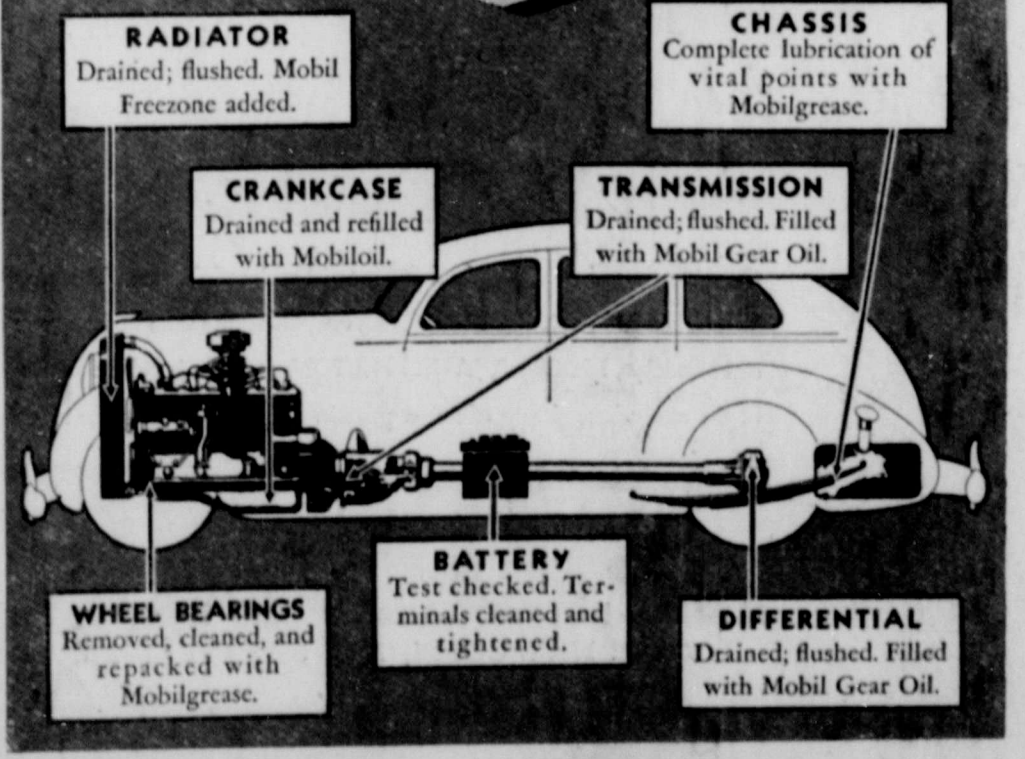

Clinic Plan Now Replacing The Old Home for Orphans

SALT LAKE CITY.—With the institution of a modern clinic system, the novel Children's Service

Society of Utah has completed a program for the care of orphans and underprivileged children which has drawn the plaudits of social service authorities throughout the nation.
The service is not an orphanage in the traditional sense. It provides "real homes" for all its 400 charges and the demand for "society" children which always ex-

ceeds the supply is cited to prove the esteem with which citizens regard this economical and effective social agency.
Operated entirely from donations, the system, developed by the society during 55 years of operation, has provided an outline for indigent children's aid programs in other states.
According to Mrs. Virginia Lee Bennett, secretary of the society, children come under its jurisdiction from juvenile authorities, social agencies, and relatives and parents who want children cared for and trained in a manner they themselves can not accomplish.
The society, which takes care of about 200 orphans or underprivileged children a year, has no "home." It places its charges in private homes throughout the state. After a request for one of the children has been received by the society, its welfare workers conduct a scrupulous investigation to determine if the surroundings are definitely congenial and suitable for the youngsters, Mrs. Bennett said.
Every child is given a thorough medical examination by specialists. Later, investigators call at the foster homes to check the health and attitude of the children and recommend clinical treatment or examination if such is deemed necessary. The clinic is free to all wards of the society.
Babies and younger children are checked about every two

months. Foster mothers are instructed in correct feeding formulas, hours of play, sleep, and proper feeding.
The new health program instituted this year has brought unexpected results. Mrs. Bennett said. Chronic heart ailments, tuberculosis and other diseases that might have developed into acute stages have been arrested.
"It likewise affords a wonderful opportunity to check on the nutrition of youngsters. Many of them come from homes where they have never had enough to eat and have developed serious defects as a result."
Several interesting cases of behaviorism difficulties also have been uncovered, she said. Under the expert probing of the doctors, the child often reveals the true source of trouble and a treatment is prescribed.
At present, children from the society are living in more than 200 homes throughout the state. In some instances, the society is paying for their board and room, many others are accepted free, and others work for their keep.
All in all, its sponsors say, the society has served as near "cure-all" for Utah's orphan and indigent child problem and at the same time has given the children unequalled opportunities for "home life" during their formative years.

Cisco Will Try Out Dehydrated Yams As Cattle Feed

DENTON, Texas.—The North Texas State Teachers College will shortly furnish Cisco with a quantity of dehydrated potatoes for carrying on experiments in fattening out steers, in return for three tons of sweet potatoes sent from the Cisco community recently for processing in the East Texas Sweet Potato Pilot Plant dehydration unit at the College here, Gilbert Wilson, instructor in chemistry, has announced.
Details of the plan were arranged during a recent visit to the College chemistry laboratories by a group of Cisco business men headed by E. A. Butler, publisher of the Cisco Daily Press, and Bob Taylor, manager of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.
Also a recent visitor to the laboratories was picturesque "Commodore" R. M. Hatfield, "Admiral" of the Trinity River, who first started the project for canalization of the Trinity. The "Commodore," who operated a large shipping service on the Trinity spent Tuesday and Wednesday in the College laboratories where he was especial-

ly interested in the work done with the castor plant.
Last Tuesday, A. Clinton Cook, associate agricultural economist with the U. S. Department of Agriculture, A.A.A., spent the day with Wilson gathering information on the research being done at the College on the sweet potato. This material is to be included in an official bulletin on the sweet potato being prepared by his development.

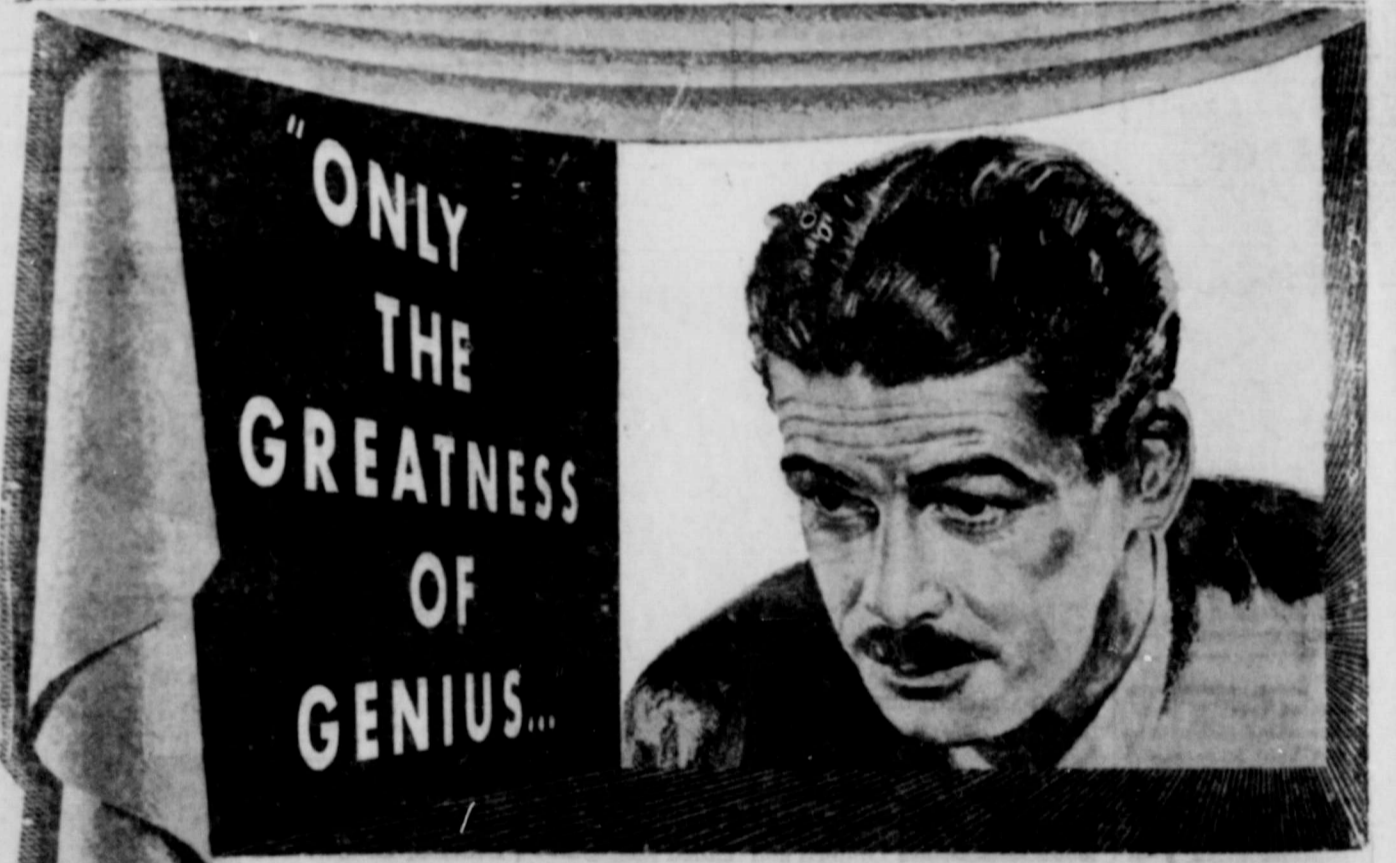
