The World Keeps Getting Messier

In case you've lost count, there are three wars currently being waged in the world. They are all wars that grew out of aggression, and there isn't much doubt among the neutral judges who the bullies are.

It's a bad season for small neutral countries. Lollypops are being taken away from all the small boys. The little tyke, Finland, is tugging a little harder than was confidently expected; and Joe Stalin's Soviet regime has already suffered some pretty severe shin bruises.

But in the end, only a miracle can save Finland from absorption by Russia; and then the campaign will be carried to other quarters. Under the "protective" wing of Signor Mussolini—who has Albania and Ethiopia on his belt—the Balkan nations realize they are none too secure. Norway, Sweden and Denmark feel a tremulous uncertainty concerning their futures. The Russian bear has arisen and is willing to tackle anyone not more than one-tenth its size.

Of one thing, many neutral experts seem to be certain: This is not a series of three wars; it is one great war with three different battle fronts. The Sino-Japanese affray, the first, has long since been pushed into the background. But it is irrefutably linked with the two bloody disputes in Europe.

The "bloodless" conquests of Czechoslovakia, Austria, Sudetenland, Memel, and Danzig were next. They were just as much a part of this great upheaval as the party war against Poland, the declared war against Germany by Britain and France and the invasion of Finland by Joe Stalin.

Even Mussolini's conquests of Ethiopia and Albania fit into the general picture. None of the patiently immoral conquests can be considered apart from the others.

Eventually, perhaps, there will be conflicts among the greedy powers, after they have effectively subjugated all of the eligible smaller nations. Gangsters co-operate only as long as there is a common objective, and then the rubbing-out process begins.

The messier this whole affair becomes, the more evident it should be to the United States that the biggest contribution we can make toward better world conditions is to remain aloof. Our whole democratic spirit may revolt at the strangulation of helpless neutrals elsewhere. Our sense of justice may be badly jarred. But we could do nothing more than complicate things further by throwing ourselves into the international riot.

Even if we wanted to fight, we might have a pretty difficult time trying to decide on what front we wanted to throw our strength. We couldn't be three places at once, even if we wanted to. And it is pretty definitely established by now that we don't want to be any place but right here—on the American continent.

AUSTIN, Jan. 12.—Pointing out the fact that less than one-fifth of Texas' young people—those between the ages of 21 and 25—exercise their right to vote, the First Voters League of Texas this week launched a statewide drive to encourage the payment of poll taxes and the procurement of exemption certificates before the January 31 deadline.

Headlining the drive will be a statewide rally on the University of Texas campus Monday night, January 15, with President Homer Price Rainey as principal speaker, with leading state officials taking part.

President Bob Sawtelle declared that "the continuance of democracy depends upon the active and alert participation of our young people in the affairs of their own government."

Mayors of Texas cities, and officers of local service clubs have been called upon for active assistance in the drive to get each of Texas' 500,000 first voters to obtain their voting papers before the deadline.

"The active participation of young people in governmental affairs is one of the greatest needs of our democracy today," McGown said, "and the fact that in 1936 less than one-fifth of the eligible young people in Texas took part in elections is a distressing situation which must not be repeated in 1940."

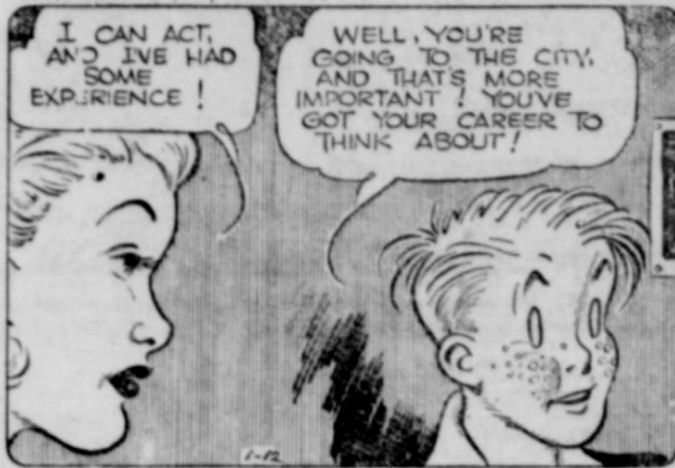
