AUSTIN, Texas—"Progress in petroleum refining is so rapid, as a result of the work of the chemist, that the modern plant may become obsolete within five years, a distinguished University of Texas chemist believes.

Dr. E. P. Schoch, director of the University's Bureau of Industrial Chemistry and veteran research chemist advanced this theory.

Although in our present economy we'd be lost without our gasoline which is currently the petroleum product of largest utilization, we are inclined to foresee, a time when the by-products, produced in the 'cracking'

process—certain gaseous by carbons—will be more valuable than the cracked gas itself, Schoch said.

Folks of all ages, in large cities and small towns, will converge in their community halls on Jan. 30 to celebrate the President's birthday.

Millions of dollars will be collected, and the money, as usual, will be used in the fight against infantile paralysis. Some of it will go to the Warm Springs Foundation in Georgia. Most of the funds will be retained by the individual communities to help them battle the disease among their own people.

Here is one campaign, already in progress, against which there will be no attack. The nation is virtually unanimous in its desire to aid those who are left crippled by poliomyelitis attacks, to save those who are not yet seriously affected. Here is one fight which we don't want to watch idly from the sidelines.

West Texas Cattle Show to Be Held In Abilene Soon

ABILENE, Texas.—The fifth annual West Central Texas Livestock Show will be held at the West Texas Fair grounds in Abilene February 14-15. The show will be held jointly with the first annual auction sale of the Taylor County Hereford Breeders Association and the Taylor County Livestock Show February 14. J. E. Moore, Abilene vocational agriculture teacher will be show manager, assisted by W. A. Ruhmann, assistant Taylor County agent.

Sponsored by the West Texas Fair Association and the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, the show is open to F.F.A. and 4-H Club members of Jones, Shackelford, Stonehall, Runnels, Coleman, Callahan, Coke, Nolan, Fisher, Haskell, Scurry, Mitchell and Taylor counties.

Exhibits will include calves, lambs, swine and capons competing for premiums totaling \$898.00. Auction sale of the champion and reserve champion animals in each class will be held the afternoon of February 15.

The Taylor County Hereford Breeders Association will be held the afternoon of February 14, with Earl Gartin as auctioneer. Plans for the 1940 West Central Texas Livestock show were discussed and approved, and the Monday and Tuesday immediately preceding in the San Angelo Fair Stock Show was selected as permanent date beginning in 1941 by county agents and vocational agricultural teachers of the West Central Texas show area at a recent banquet meeting in Abilene.

Dairy Products In State In Increase

AUSTIN, Tex.—Dairy products plants in Texas during December increased production substantially over December a year ago, University of Texas business research officials have announced.

Ice cream production was boosted 31.2 per cent above December, 1938, and slipped only a trifle below November output. On the basis of sample production of 22 plants, the University Bureau of Business Research estimates the State's output at 437,000 gallons, as compared with an estimated production of 333,000 gallons a year earlier.

Slumping 12 per cent from November, cheese factories kept their production 6.6 per cent above December, 1938. State production, based on reports from 21 plants, is estimated by the Bureau at 1,085,000 pounds.

Creameries remained at approximately the December, 1938, level of production, but output dropped 13.5 per cent from the preceding month. The Bureau estimates total State production at 2,541,000 pounds after sampling output of 31 plants.

Women Seeking Honest Labels On Woolen Products

PORT WORTH, Tex.—The ladies auxiliary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association looked to congress this week for passage of a new "honest wool" statute.

These ladies—who's avowed job is to broaden the market for the products their husbands grow—can spot a good piece of wool at forty paces, day or night.

Unfortunately, they claim, many other women can't.

Therefore the auxiliary started writing congressmen to enlist support for a so called "honest wool law." It would require the strict labeling of textile contents on any piece of goods. According to this women's group, the biggest racket on the market is shoddy wool. Shoddy wool, they say, is scraps of wool reworked. The scraps may come from a garbage can, rag bag or almost any place except from a sheep's back. The reliable woolen goods is made from virgin wool. The new law would call for "honest" labels on all textiles, silk and cotton included.

The calendar for the 2,700 years if published in regular form, even in small type, would require more than two miles of paper. Jones has figured. His booklet measures three and a half inches by seven and a half inches.

Each year's calendar appears on an individual page under year group numbers of which there are 14. All common years are included in groups 1 to 7, while leap years are classed 8 to 14.

To further condense the calendar, the centennial periods are grouped, those with years of the century having the same dates of the month with respective days of the day, are arranged in columns, as nearly numerically as proper groupings will admit.

Jones is a veteran linotype operator of the Reporter-News in Abilene, going there in 1922.
