There's nothing in the world to stop Europe's rulers from having peace, if they really want it. If they ask their peoples, they would get a decisive

Americans aren't supposed to butt their heads into Europe's affairs. We're supposed to mind our own business. It isn't considered good manners to interfere when the man next door quarrels with his wife, even when he starts beating her. Yet, if somebody didn't stop the argument, the entire community would soon get a bad taste in its mouth. After all, Americans do live in the same world with Europe-and we can't help it if we'd like to see the whole thing settled.
