AUSTIN, Tex., Feb. 2 .- State Auditor Tom C. King warned today that the state government of Texas is facing the most serious fiscal crisis since the days of the

In his annual report, King found the current situation bad and added that there is no remedy for it under the present organization.

A "fourth branch" of govern-ment—overlapping boards whose members have six-year terms-has developed in addition to the regular executive, legislative and judicial branches, he said.

"Boards and commissions, reported, "authorized the disburse ment of approximately 95 per cent of the \$162,640,000 of expenditures from the state treasury in the last fiscal year. In addition, they spent approximately \$25, 000,000 state funds which were never placed in the treasury and over which state officials did not

Sources of these extra funds, he said, are licenses, special assessments, local institutional funds federal grants, and ad valorem taxes.

This "headless fourth divisien of government," said King, is divided into many units and responsible only to "invisible pressure groups" which sponsored their creation and constitute a "bureau cracy of the spoils system."

Before this government has economy, said the efficiency expert, control of these state officials must be placed under someone selected at the ballot box. "The spenders of tax money




