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
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The Soil and Water Conservation District, the County Extension Office and the Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring a farm tour for area residents on Sept. 7.


Applications for two-day pheasant hunts to be held on the Granger Wildlife Management Area in Williamson County are being accepted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

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
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
