States Proclaim Their Wares

The states of the Union have learned not to hide their lights under any bushels. If they've got anything to offer either industry or the tourist trade, they want the rest of the country to know it. And the best medium they know of getting the word around is advertising.

Before 1935, only six states made any provisions in their fiscal budgets for advertising. This year, 40 states have earmarked funds to be used for publicly extolling their merits, and 75 per cent of these states intend to use the newspapers of the nation liberally to get their messages across. A total of about \$4,400,000 has been appropriated. Thirteen of the states have appropriated more than \$100,000 each. The highest advertising allotment—\$825,000—is that of Florida, which long ago became aware of the old axiom, "It pays to advertise."

It's pretty hard to tell definitely just how much it pays. Many of the benefits from advertising are too intangible to be measured. But some of the states, which started advertising in 1937, have already seen the results burst right out into indisputable statistics.

Arkansas picked up 92 new factories, representing a total investment of \$2,600,000. New Jersey noted a \$167,000,000 tourist business last year and a 28 per cent increase in the value of the state's branded advertising products. North Carolina opened its arms to 51 new factories during the first eight months of 1939. Wisconsin's gain in tourist trade was reflected by the jump in gasoline taxes from \$6,500,000 in 1935 to \$8,930,000 in 1939, and in non-resident fishing licenses from 65,157 to 112,185.

The influx of tourists into any state projects its effect far beyond the hotel keepers, restaurant owners, resort landlords, and department stores, who are usually direct beneficiaries. The money taken in seeps through the entire community. It creates new jobs, makes possible greater spending, filters finally to the smallest business man far removed from direct contact with tourists.

States' advertising this year should bring even greater dividends, with travel abroad cut off. In many cases, the advertising efforts will help vacationers plan their itineraries.

Bay City Nets a "Horde of Silver"

MONTEREY, Cal.—There are no city dads or community boosters who will object to an outsider calling Monterey "a fishing village." That is, not if the outsider smiles and has a fair realization as to what extent his description of California's first capital applies.

For the wealth of the sea, and particularly sardines, has built a \$12,000,000 industry on the shores of the Bay of Monterey. This sardine industry is the prime economic factor in the lives of most of the 25,000 persons living on the Monterey Peninsula. And the chances are good that at a Friday noon "snack," the sardines

between the crackers were netted in the Pacific Ocean by one of the purse seine boats which make up Monterey's fleet of 80 ships. If so, the sardines were processed in one of the city's 11 canneries.

Record Catch Indicated
With the ending of the 1939 fishing season, fishermen expect to surpass the 1938 record catch of 154,846 tons, worth \$1,722,298 to the fishing fleet.

Although a dispute over the price to be paid fishermen by canners delayed operations of the current season five weeks, this season's catch has more than made up for the slow start. In 1938, the canners paid 2,500 employes \$1,750,000 to pack sardines.

Production of cans of sardines, sardine oil and sardine meal was valued at \$4,804,374. The \$1,500,000 valuation of the fishing fleet and the \$3,000,000 invested in the

cannery plants are included to complete the picture of the \$12,000,000 industry.

Industry Started in 1911
The man who would be the last to scoff at those calling Monterey "a fishing village" is the father of Monterey sardine fishermen, Pietro Ferrante, who came here in 1911. He learned to fish while sailing the water of the Mediterranean. He cruised the Bay of Monterey once and knew that beneath the phosphorescent light on the surface there existed a treasure comparable to the Silver Horde of Alaska.

Detroit Library Is Going On A Tour



Indians Beat Whites In A Legal Battle

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah.—Neither tomahawk nor musket played a part in a victory of Purple and Ute Indians over the white man when a legal decision ended a 10-year battle over possession of 7,000 acres of grazing land in San Juan county, Utah.

The decision of Fred W. Johnson, commissioner of the general land office, Washington, ordered a local land officer to allot parcels of about 100 acres each to the Indians of the two tribes.

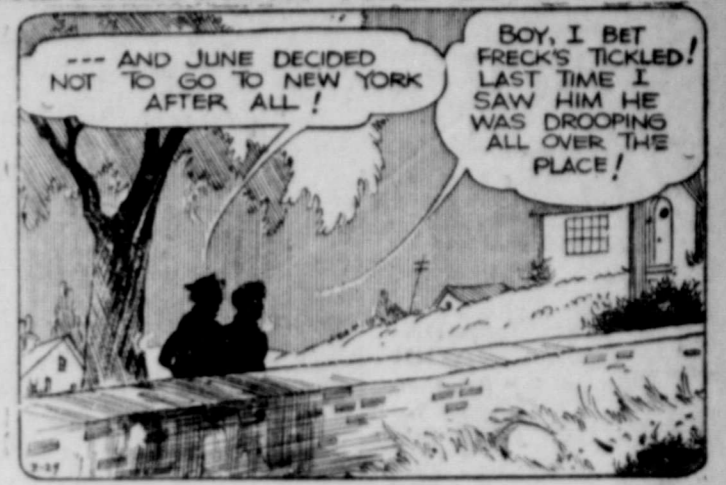

Spear Hurlers Are Ready For Seals

WASHINGTON — Uncle Sam apparently likes things primitive, at least as far as seals are concerned.

Some time this month or next—nobody knows exactly when because it depends on the seals—Indians, Aleuts and other aborigines of Washington, British Columbia and from the vicinity of Sitka, Alaska, will stalk the animals. The government expressly forbids them to use any sort of craft except open canoes, paddled by hand.

They can't use power-driven boats, they can't use firearms of any kind. Their only weapons are spears, bows and arrows, primitive weapons which they spend weeks sharpening before the seals first appear off the coast of Washington.

Such restrictive conditions "call forth all the primitive skill for which these people are noted," the bureau of fisheries said.

The two week season opens when the seals appear off the coast of Washington on their way to the Pribilof Islands, north of the Aleutian Islands, where they spend the summer.

Some of them, forming the vanguard of the herd, were sighted off Oregon early this month. In the short time the Indians have to hunt the seals, they usually manage to kill about 100.

Just to make sure no one "chisels" during the hunt, the bureau stations two patrol boats in the area and after the hunt agents and wardens inspect the hides to authenticate legality of capture. The Kittiwake, which sailed from Seattle on March 6, will be stationed at Sitka and the Scoter will patrol the region of Neah Bay.

The skins are used for a number of things, mostly around the homes, but some of the better business men sell the pelts to fur coat manufacturers.

War Adding Work For An Ice Patrol

BOSTON — The international ice patrol faces its severest test in 26 years of operation this year because of the European war. It is believed that belligerent ships, which already have abolished weather reports, will not send out data of icebergs—and it is on these reports that the patrol relies to maintain its spotless record.

After the Titanic sank in 1912, the British government invited other nations to confer on means of protecting shipping against such accidents in the future. The various powers agreed to share expenses of the ice patrol and since then no ship in the North Atlantic has struck a berg.

The United States supplies ships for the patrol. This year they will be the coast guard cutters Chelan, Cayuga and Pontchartrain. Because of the war they will be based at Boston instead of Halifax, N. S., which is several hundred miles nearer the scene of operations.

The Penney event is proving so popular the manager, Dave Cooper, decided to repeat the bargain for those who had no opportunity to shop on Monday and is repeating the event. Therefore the caption of the advertisement should have read:

"Here are 24 reasons why Penney's will be the busiest store in Ranger, starting Saturday, 8 a. m."

Special bargains which were originally listed for Monday or Tuesday are to be in effect on Saturday, also.

Unique Bids For A Meeting Mailed To Members of Church

Unique invitations to a Brotherhood meeting of the First Baptist Church of Ranger, to be held Monday, April 1 at 7:30, have been mailed out to members of the church.

The invitations consist of a wafer-thin section sawed from the limb of a tree and varnished. One side is a stamp and the address, on the other side the invitation reads:

"It would be too bad if you were not here to enjoy the food, fun, fellowship at the Brotherhood Meeting Monday, April 1st, 7:30 P. M."
