### **Cotton Growers** To Meet Today

There's a double incentive for cotton producers to attend the South Plains Cotton Production Conference this year, according to Donald Johnson, executive vicepresident of Plains Cotton Grow-

ers, Inc. The conference, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be held today (Thursday) at the KoKo Palace, Lubbock, beginning at 9:30 a.m.

"IN ADDITION to top-notch information on the production of quality cotton," Johnson said, "two well-known and respected cotton economists will be on hand with information that can be a big help to producers in deciding whether to plant maximum or minimum acreage to cotton in 1968."

First speaker of the conference will be Dr. M. K. Horne, chief economist for the National Cotton Council of Memphis, Tenn. He will discuss the world cotton situation and the demand for quality

Horne will be followed by High Plains Area Farm Management Specialist John Seibert, who will discuss the 1968 cotton program and the various planting alter-

natives open to producers. SOME OF the factors that affect cotton quality and will be discussed by experts at the all-day conference include varieties, planting, in-season cultural practices (with emphasis on producing acceptable micronaire), harvesting and ginning.

Therefore, fall fertilization must be supplemented to produce grain. Usually from 30 to 60 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre should be considered, if prospects for grain yields are good. Under irrigation, higher rates

may be profitable. However, on clay soils with no grazing and where as much as 45 to 60 pounds of nitrogen was applied at plantng, additional topdressing may not be needed.

Since one of the benefits of nitrogen is to increase the number of seed heads, small grains should be topdressed before jointing takes
