Keeping Americans 'Free and Equal'

More than 260 years ago, Thomas Jefferson decreed that "all men are created free and equal," and on those words a nation was launched.

The Jeffersonian conception of equality has been modified from time to time, but, above everything, the meaning that the Colonial patriot meant to convey was that the nation he helped found must be kept free of castes in the sense that they existed in the old world.

Today that tradition is being menaced, President James B. Conant of Harvard University recently told those participating in the 72nd birthday observance of the University of California at Los Angeles.

Do, Conant conceded that modern college youngsters are inclined to sneer at the phrase, "equality of opportunity." It is up to the universities to make some revolutionary changes in their methods of preparing young folks for adulthood the educator said.

But is it enough merely to preserve the ideal? Isn't American society as a whole largely responsible for preserving the equality tradition by giving the youngsters with their brand new diplomas a chance to use the things they learned in school?

Educators can do their part in renovating the school system to meet the needs of a new, technological America. It's up to those of us not in college to find a way to make use of this new talent. When we do, the idea of equality will become a living thing. It won't need to be pumped into anyone.

Amos Pleads for Justice; World of Today Should Heed

AMOS was not the first of the Hebrew prophets, but he was the first whose prophecies have come down to us in a book attached to his own name.

Amos was a herdsman who tended his flocks in Tekoa, a little village about 12 miles south of Jerusalem. He had something of the farmer's sense of values and clearness of vision; and, when he came into Jerusalem and observed what was happening in the towns and cities, he was shocked and was moved to protest, just as a plain, honest, hard-working man might be disturbed today with much that he sees in our modern city life.

It was not only that those who possessed were unwilling to share with those who had not, but society itself was full of materialism and corruption. The rich and powerful were exploiting their poor for their own ends and their own gain.

Amos describes what he saw in vivid words, as the poor were being trampled upon. He saw also corruption in political life, bribery and dishonesty. He said that the mad who is prudent would keep silence at such a time. But Amos himself was not prudent; he was above all things honest and fearless.

RELIGION itself was perverted from its true values and its emphasis upon holiness and righteousness. It had become very largely a matter of form. The people were observing their feasts and meeting in their solemn assemblies. They were bringing burnt offerings, but they were not offering their own lives as sacrifices unto God in holiness.

So Amos poured out his wrath on these things. He represents the Almighty as despising these things and taking no delight in these assemblies. And it is not only the voice of Amos, but it is the voice of God that one hears in the great passage of the final verse of our lesson: "Let justice roll down as waters and righteousness as a mighty stream."

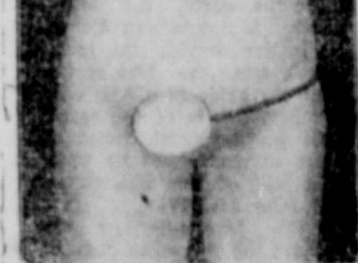
