The Dead Are Not Even Counted

Life is a precious gift. Men cherish it, cling to it desperately long after all its juices would seem to have been sucked dry.

Yet it is cheap. It is so cheap that men pour it out with thoughtless lavishness when they turn to war.

How many men died in the snows of Finland? Nobody knows. Hefted the sacrifice to the war god was not even measured as it poured forth.

There were tales of the slaughter of Russian divisions, one after another, marched to the shambles like the dumb animals who marched patiently into the slaughter-pens.

Now the war is over, and Mars begins to total up his blood-smeared ledgers. How many died?

Molotoff, Russian premier, now says the Russian dead were 48,645, with 158,863 wounded. The Finns he says, lost 60,000 killed and 250,000 wounded.

Mannerheim, the Finn leader, told a different story, of 200,000 Russian dead, 600,000 wounded while the Finns were losing 15,000 dead. Swedish estimates doubled that loss for the Finns, guessed total Russian casualties at a half-million.

Nobody knows whose figures are correct. By averaging all these claims, however, one can make a guess that between 100,000 and 200,000 men are dead.

When spring comes to the lake country, when the northern tundras bloom shyly green again, those rows of dead will begin their return to the earth whence they came. Each was a man, each a living, breathing being, with fears and hopes like yours and mine, all merged now in a common oblivion.

But for the rest, for the governments which sent them to their deaths for a world which watched helplessly as they died—these didn't even bother to count them.

70,000 Soldiers To Gather For Games At Alexandria, La.

ALEXANDRIA, La.—When Uncle Sam's 70,000 boys arrive here for their gigantic Army maneuvers next month, they'll find themselves in for a lot of surprises.

Contrary to popular opinion, the area in central and western Louisiana in which the most concentrated maneuvers will take place is a far cry from the moss-draped

oaks and lazy bayous that the state is famed for. It is mostly cut-over pine lands, bisected by a beautiful range of hills from east to west.

Since the virgin timber was cut, this section has largely been neglected by the outside world. The major portion of three parishes is given over to the Kisatchie National Forest, which the Federal Government operates as a reforestation project.

And in southern Natchitoches Parish there is a rocky section known as "Louisiana's Colorado" because of its sunken hills. Here an area of 40 acres is sunk from 200 to 300 feet lower than the surrounding territory.

Texans To Gather At Safety Meeting In Austin April 16

AUSTIN, Texas.—Several thousand Texans will gather in Austin April 16-17th for the Texas Safety Conference to learn how its death toll of 1500 persons and economic loss of forty-five million dollars from traffic accidents can be reduced.

Ten of the nation's foremost traffic safety authorities will be on hand with state safety experts to conduct the safety clinic under the sponsorship of the Texas Safety Association. Representatives from almost every city and town are expected to attend the two-day meeting which will be held in the State capitol building.

Record Flights Of Wild Ducks Seen

NEW YORK.—The biggest migration of wild ducks and geese in six years is heading for Canadian breeding grounds this spring, according to a summary of reports from state game departments and private observers in a nationwide survey by Ducks Unlimited, Inc.

The survey, covering the 25 most important species found in the United States the past winter, brought 2709 reports of an increase as compared with a year ago, 1237 reports of decrease and 1912 no change. The bulk of decrease reports came from the central flyway between Montana and New Mexico where droughts prevailed.

Eighty per cent of state game departments co-operating in the survey stated that unseasonably mild weather last fall, which delayed the southward migration, reduced hays by hunters. Hunting season dates were too early to coincide with the main migration period, officials stated.

While estimates of the wild-owl increase range from 10 to 50 per cent, ducks now on nuptial flights face a critical situation in certain areas of the great prairie

breeding areas of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta. Winter snowfall, principal source of moisture, has been the lowest in a decade in these areas. Unless abnormal spring rains intervene, heavy brood losses from drought may be expected next summer, biologists of Ducks Unlimited's Canadian field staff predict.

The organization has appropriated \$225,000 during the past two years for establishment of over 650,000 acres of permanently-watered projects and other duck restoration work in the provinces. Canada has provided lands without cost, while wildfowling through out this country have raised funds required through membership contributions. Plans contemplate 3,000,000 acres of the duck cases.

"Grissom's left-handed, isn't he?" replied the manager of the world champions, as though that were something out of the ordinary. And it is, for good southpaws suddenly have become as scarce as capable catchers.

Clark Griffith cracked something about Washington having the finest porters in the business, which may well be true, for bow-legged Joe Kraskuskas and Kendall Chase have tremendous possibilities.

But right now Carl Hubbell would have to do a complete comeback to give the majors two really high-class left-handers. And the other is the 40-year-old Robert Moses Grove.

Johnny Vander Meer startled the baseball world with successive no-hit, no-run performances in 1938, but was a bust last trip. Vernon Gomez was below form.

MARIUS RUSSO of the Yankees is a remarkable prospect, but Larry French of the Cubs and Bob Weiland of the Cardinals will surprise if they do any better than they have in the past.

Al Milnar of the Indians may find himself one of these fine days, but Thornton Lee of the White Sox, Cliff Melton of the Giants, Howard Mills of the Browns, Fritz Ostermuller of the Red Sox, Mil-

"That's about all he has to do," remarked Graham.

Why the shortage of left-handers? That's hard to figure out. Perhaps it is because mothers are teaching the youngsters to throw as well as eat and do everything else right-handed.
