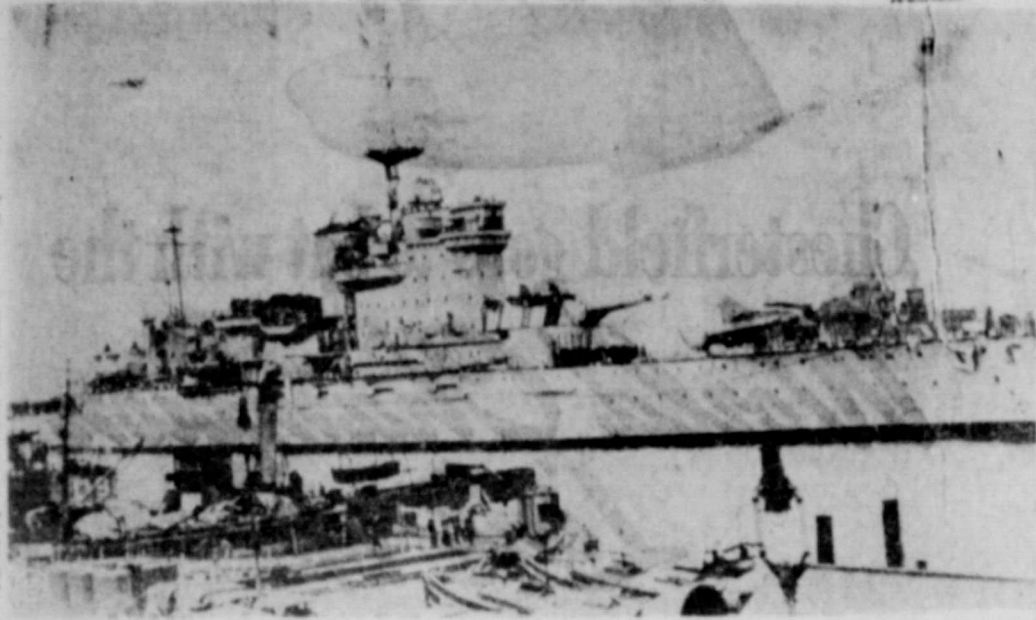

## 90-Day Oil Order Urged By Thompson

AUSTIN, April 15.—Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson today said that there was no good reason why 90-day oil production orders should not be issued by the commission, and that there were many good reasons why the orders should be issued at 90-day intervals.

Great Britain claimed, officially, today that her troops had landed at several points in Norway and Germany denied that any German held ports were involved. Extent of the occupation, or the places at which troops had been landed were kept secret in the brief announcement which stated only that "British forces have now been landed at several points in Norway." The announcement was made by Winston Churchill before the house of commons.

From Germany it was claimed that her troops in Norway were improving their positions everywhere, particularly around Oslo. A Stockholm newspaper declared that the British are now occupying Narvik on the far north, with the Germans fleeing from the city being surrounded by the Norwegian army and British warships. It was stated that in fleeing Narvik the Germans left 1,600 dead and wounded.

Germany's claim to have sunk 27 British warships, including seven submarines and the allies claim to have sunk more than half of the German navy. The British admiralty stated that Britain has sunk 54 of the German fleet units, including one third of her destroyers, one half her cruisers, half her battleships, and two-thirds of her submarines, and admitting loss of 30 British units.

## Voice of Peace Intrudes

British statesmen, charged with the conduct of the war, are beginning to hear distant rumblings that sound distressingly like peace pleas.

The British Labor party nominally behind the Chamberlain government's war policy, is beginning to have some qualms about the war. The party has under consideration 13 separate resolutions for withdrawal of support. The various proposals will be debated at the Labor Party's Whitsuntide conference May 13. War leaders obviously are disturbed. The hostility of the Labor party would seriously menace Britain's home front.

In the meantime, other pacifist groups, emboldened by the lengthy prelude to actual warfare, are becoming too articulate for the government to ignore. Chief among these groups is the Public Economy League, formed during the World War to promote sound economy. Its members argue that a long war might conceivably mean the defeat of Hitlerism and the prostration of an exhausted Germany, but that England, too, would be economically and morally bankrupt.

On top of all this, H. G. Wells, who still enjoys an appreciable British audience and who has been a constant critic of British war aims, has come to the conclusion that the government is "grossly incompetent." Wells said that a recent British government publication showed that "we are fighting for the British empire and imperialism."

"If this is the stuff we are fighting for," he said "then it is foolish to fight."

The trouble is not so much a conflict with the Chamberlain government as with the fundamental principle of war itself. While the military has been getting up steam for the big offensive, the populace of Britain has had time to wonder whether it's a smart idea to have a war at all.

The World War brought this cynicism and eventual disillusion, too—but not until it was all over. This time it is cropping up before the war has seriously begun. It looks hopeful for the peace crowd. The people don't need to go to war if they make it clear that they don't want to.

Import-Export Bank agrees to finance big Brazil railroad improvements. That's putting the steam into Pan Americanism.

Now they're linking Manhattan's murder ring with some Florida jewel robberies. Can it be this bunch is also responsible for the long puzzled death of Cock Robin?

There are tasks that could be more futile, but we can't think of any. Senator Ernest Lundeen heads the "Make Europe Pay War Debts Committee."

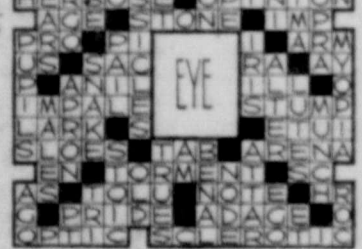

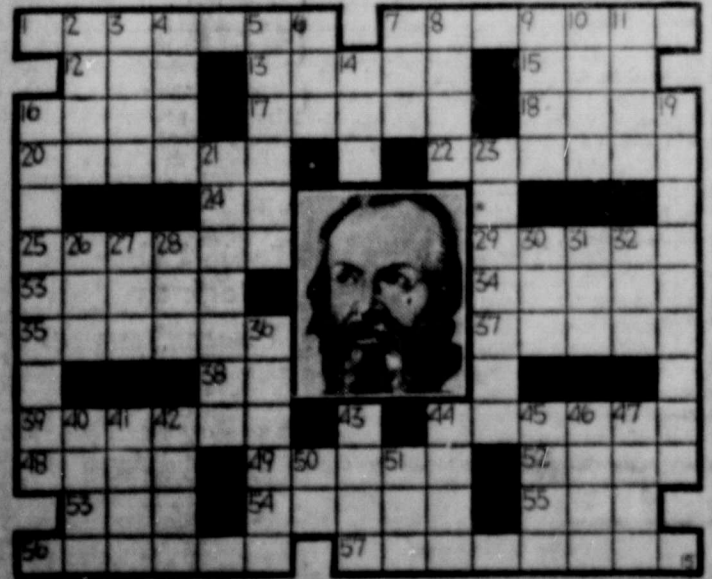

## Chemical Company Building Big Plant On the Texas Coast

FREEPORT, Tex.—Preliminary work to construction of a \$5,000,000 sea-water plant by the Dow Chemical Company on an 800-acre site here is "progressing satisfactorily," G. N. Hunting, general superintendent of building, said today.

Construction of the Dow plant was welcomed last week with a 24 page special edition of the Freeport Facts, the city's weekly newspaper.

During recent years, the city's citizens actively have sought to attract industries because of available water and rail transportation, cheap fuel, water supplies, power, salt, sulphur and commercial shell.

Harbor improvements have been made during the last several years and Freeport has become a deep-sea fishing resort.

In the nearby Gulf of Mexico are reefs which contain an estimated 300,000,000 tons of shell suitable for commercial chemical purposes. The city is connected by rail with Houston, Southwest rail and shipping center.

The Gulf area in this vicinity has more than 35 producing oil and gas fields and as many more prospective fields, making available huge quantities of cheap fuel. Huge salt and sulphur deposits are worked in this area.

Freeport is located four miles from the mouth of the Brazos River and is 28 years old. This area has been populated by white men since 1921.

Velasco, located across the river to the east, was founded in 1831, four miles from Id Velasco on the Gulf where the first white settlers landed on Dec. 28, 1821.

The battle of Velasco was fought at the site of the old city in 1832 and it was there that the Republic of Texas and representatives of Gen. Santa Anna of Mexico signed peace treaties in 1836.

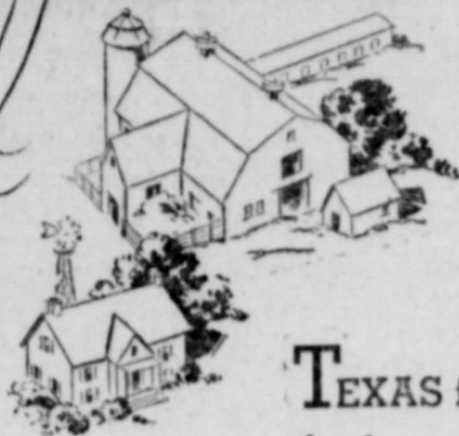

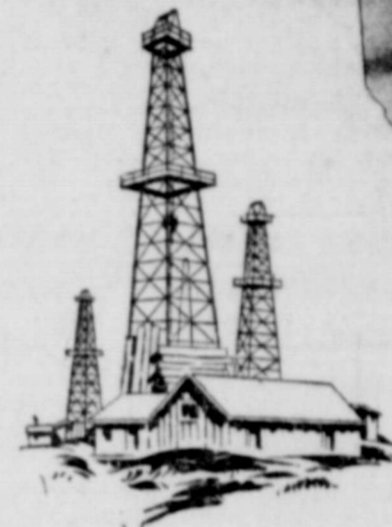

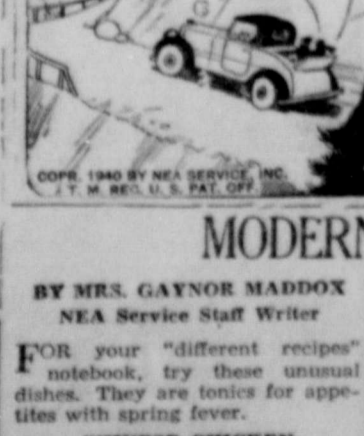

FOR your "different recipes" notebook, try these unusual dishes. They are tonics for appetites with spring fever.
CHINESE CHICKEN (Serves Six)
One cup diced celery, 1/2 cup diced onions, 4 tablespoons olive oil, 2 cups cooked rice, 3 tablespoons soy sauce, 1 cup water, dash of black pepper, 6-ounce jar boned chicken, diced; 1 pimiento, diced.
Sauté celery and onions in olive oil until slightly yellow. Add rice, soy sauce, water and pepper. Simmer 5 minutes, add chicken and pimiento and toss lightly with fork. Cover and simmer 10 minutes longer.
FRIED APPLES AND ONIONS
Two or 3 medium-sized onions, sliced; 3 tablespoons butter or other fat, 3 or 4 tart apples, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons sugar. Brown onions lightly in hot fat in skillet. Wash, core and slice apples; do not peel. Add to onions;
