The War After the War

No matter who wins the war now ravaging Europe, no matter what kind of a settlement emerges, one thing is certain. It will be followed by a war for trade scarcely less bitter than the military war itself.

Every nation in Europe is frantically expanding its productive facilities. The product of that frenzied activity is being shot away in war, to no one's benefit. But when the war ends and the survivors flock back home, jobs will be a necessity. The expanded factories will await them. The factories must run, for the men must work. They will produce goods for sale. They must be sold.

Sold they will be, by hook or crook, by subsidy or barter or political pressure. Every market in the world will be crowded with them. Into this competitive field, the United States will also be plunged.

How well we shall fare in that maelstrom depends much on what we do now. For instance, Britain is making heroic efforts to continue to export goods in the face of the war effort, in order to hold markets and to provide exchange to buy imports. Yet the United States has already replaced Britain as chief source of Argentina's import trade. Despite the blockade and the sea war, Germany up to February had been contriving to ship to Argentina about one-fourth of her usual export shipments. The war for trade in South America has not even been suspended during the military war.

But all this has distinct limits unless ways can be contrived to import more from South America. International trade must be roughly an exchange if it is to be built on a permanent foundation. The Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce is already hot on the track to discover non-competitive products which can be more liberally bought by the United States in the south and to encourage such trade.

All this has an importance beyond the purely commercial. Rivals for this trade do not hesitate to use methods of "economic compulsion" shrewdly devised to force great areas into political spheres of influence.

Every dollar's worth of trade the United States can secure thus has a benefit beyond the purely commercial. We do not want any such "political spheres of influence." But unless we hold our share of the trade, others have just that much greater opportunity to establish them.

Remember when mother used to tell us that if we were good boys and studied hard, we'd grow up to become president? Looking over the candidates' list, it seems a surprisingly large number are taking mother seriously.

nearly \$1,000,000, and employing 500 men the plant is one of the main reasons why plywood manufacturing has become a major factor in British Columbia's lumber industry. More than 80,000,000 square feet of plywood can be produced at the mill.

A comparatively recent development of the lumber industry, plywood manufacturing on Canada's west coast is growing rapidly. Demand for the product having increased steadily in past years. With European sources of supplies cut off, the British market is now more than ever open to British Columbia manufacturers.

Added to this is the fact that plywood can be easily shipped, occupying a much smaller space than an equivalent amount of rough lumber. With shipping space at a premium owing to the war, this is an important factor in British demand for plywood.

Rapidly growing in popularity, plywood is being used for numerous new purposes, including furniture, small boats, display signs, truck bodies, roofing, interior paneling, and general building purposes.

Increased production is forecast by lumber experts here, who say that plywood manufacture fits into British Columbia's forestry economy. Small trees can be utilized, and second growth timber can be used. While at present the province's ever decreasing stand of Douglas fir is the mainstay of the lumber business, hemlock is adaptable to plywood manufacture, that species having scarcely been touched here.

Pine, also barely touched in logging operations here, is another wood utilized in its manufacture.

Production of plywood, which consists of from three to five thin strips of wood glued together, their grains running in different

directions and affording remarkable tensile strength and freedom from warping, is done in spectacular fashion.

Peeled logs are placed in a huge lathe and slowly rotated, razor-like stationary blades slicing thin strips from them. Glued together, the sheets of plywood then are placed under pressure and heat, and finally cut into suitable sizes, according to statistics at Mount Holyoke only about 50 to 60 per cent of the alumnae have ever married.
