Fortune Is Fickle, LeBeau Is Now Just Ghost Town

MOBRIDGE, S. D .- Born as a frontier trading town, fostered by the booming cattle trade, and killed chiefly by the railroads that built elsewhere, the community that was LeBeau offers the typi

tal case history of a ghost town. Once faro wheels clicked in saloons where gamblers, gun-toting cow-punchers, Indians and land speculators "named their pizen" and drank it, each to his own health. Now, LeBeau remains a victim of the evolution of com-

In 1875 Antoine LeBeau, French fur trader, pushed up the muddy Missouri from St. Louis to Swan creek and established a trading post. In 1883, a Captain Strong and a pioneer merchant named Pudor bought land from LeBeau, plotted it into a townsite and christened it LeBeau.

The location, they believed, made the site ideal as the "future commercial, agricultural, railroad and mining metropolis of central Dakota." (Dakota was not divided and the halves admitted to the union until 1889.)

LeBeau was believed the logical gateway to the Black Hills. Two undred pioneer residents boasted to others of the surrounding "millions of acres of finest wheatland and rich timber stock," lauded its importance as a port of river traffic and prophesied railroads would


