## Eyes on the Conventions

The bird-and-snake fascination with which the American people are keeping their eyes glued on the terrible drama now stalking across Europe is causing a dangerous neglect of our own affairs.

Only about a week now remains before the Republican party meets in Philadelphia to choose its candidate for the presidency. Three weeks after that the Democratic party meets for the same purpose.

At the moment it is of course true that the present and future relations of the United States to the rest of the world are the most important concern of the people. Yet the President chosen this fall will be at the head of the government for four years. It is highly unlikely that the present war will continue that long. The incoming President will be faced with heavy responsibilities, not only to pilot the American ship through the present highly dangerous shoal waters of a world at war, but to chart a course in the new and undiscovered seas which will open before us when the war is over. Of these we know nothing and can guess little, except that whatever the results of war, they will almost certainly be different from anything we have known before.

Therefore the election of the President is not less important but more important than when only domestic issues are to the fore. There will be plenty of domestic issues in the post-war period, and the fact that they are temporarily obscured by the war does not mean that they will not come strongly to the fore by 1944.

Nobody can be elected President until he has first been nominated. So the current disregard of the nominating conventions is unfortunate.

Neither party can afford at this critical time to nominate any but the man it believes best-fitted to pilot the nation through troubled waters. Back-room compromises and strictly political jockeying will find little sympathy. All attention of political leaders in both parties should be concentrated on choosing the leader of highest possible quality and ability.

The conventions have become vitally important, because from one of the two meetings will emerge the man who is to lead a united America in the troubled days to come. This is democracy in action, and nothing will be more reassuring to the American people than a straightforward, serious, statesmanlike job at the two national conventions.

One can marvel at the traffic control effected by the Nazis to keep their mechanized columns rolling so fast, especially after a Sunday afternoon on a U. S. highway.

In its journey around the sun, the earth travels at the rate of 1112 miles a minute, about as fast as anything we can think of, unless it be a blitzkrieg.

Cheeks are coming back in suits this summer. This being just the return of a fad, not of prosperity, they will be seen only in the material and not in the pockets.

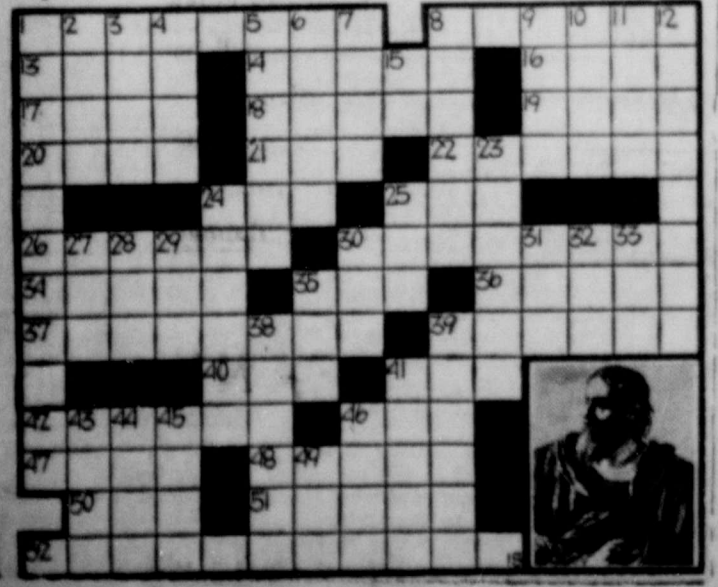

elsewhere in large quantities. Rubber imports alone total more than \$150,000,000 a year.

An effort will be made to reduce the dependence of South American farmers on the European market. North and South American farmers now compete on the world market in cotton, wheat, corn and meats. Both depend largely on Europe for their export market.

Officials recognize that this dependence of South American na-

tions, whose principal exports are agricultural products, on Europe would give a victorious totalitarian bloc of nations a tremendous advantage over the United States on that continent.

The only effective weapon against such an advantage, officials said, is for the United States to take more South American exports. This, it was said, may involve some considerable sacrifices on the part of North American farmers.

They hope, however, that most of the increase can be accomplished through increased growth of non-competitive crops in South and Central America to be ex-

## Many Highways In State Not Up To Modern Usage

AUSTIN, Texas.—Thousands of miles of Texas highways are still far below the modern standard dictated by the needs of present day traffic a four-page layout of "Unfinished Business on Texas Highways" in the June issue of Texas Parade reveals with startling emphasis.

"The state has spent millions of dollars on the highway system," the accompanying articles point out, "but highway construction has not kept pace with the unfilled of development in perfecting the motor vehicle. Texas has the quality—but lags far behind in the quantity necessary to serve so large a state and one with so many diversified interests. Original construction on roads on which no work has been done, rehabilitation and modernization of thousands of miles of roads that have been rendered obsolete by the swift transition of transportation, from the horse and buggy days and the era of the Tin Lizzie to modern mechanized units that now roll over our highways by the hundreds of thousands, constitutes a large piece of unfinished business for Texas. Unless the state can provide for and maintain a system of modern highways, it will not experience the growth and development that its geographic position, its vast stores of natural resources and the initiative of its people justify. If Texas is to have a place in the economic center of the Place de la Concorde and stand rigidly for exactly an hour while part of a German division passed by. The French may have been bitter toward the invaders of their beloved city but they remained polite.

Frenchmen told me wholesale bloodshed should be stopped to permit the farmers to return to land and the workers to their factories.

They are all unshaken in their faith in the destiny of France but highly critical of the leaders responsible for their lack of preparation. They seemed to hold no hate for the German soldiers who were polite and respectful.

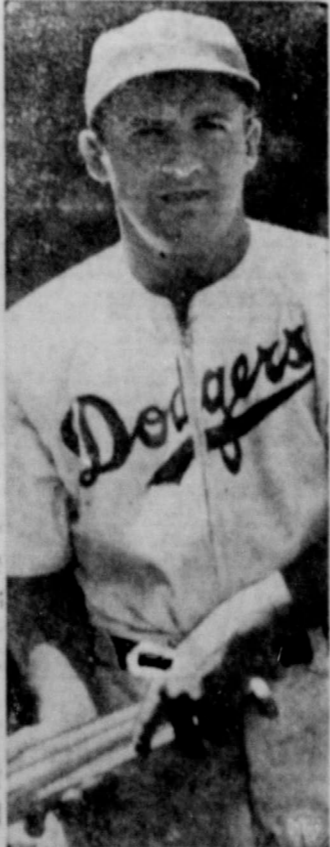



### Heading for the White House?



## The Landons of Kansas

This is the sixth of a series presenting the Republican families that may occupy the White House after next January. Democratic possibilities and their wives will be carried later.

Exactly four years ago Alfred Mossman Landon was singled out of millions of Americans and nominated for President because his open-minded common sense and straightforwardness typified virtues the country loves best.

As titular head of the Republican party, it has been Landon's job to prepare for a presidential comeback this year, and in that drive there is talk that the "careful Kansan" may become a candidate again. . . . He announced on Dec. 10, 1937, however, that he would not "accept the nomination in the remote contingency that the Republican national convention would offer it to me."

Landon, since his defeat in 1936, has been extremely active, attacking New Deal lend-lease policies, but co-operating at times with the administration, serving as delegate to the Pan American conference at Lima, supporting the President's new defense program and foreign policy generally.

As in his earlier days, politics and oil still are Landon's first loves. . . . Since he left the Kansas governorship he has had more time to devote to both. . . . With quiet, homey Mrs. Landon, the two little Landons, Nancy Josephine and John Cobb, and his older daughter, Peggy Anne, the former governor has moved back to his old home at Independence, each night his dish of two kinds of ice cream before retiring. . . . Here, he says, he can best serve his country and his party "as a private citizen," but a lot of Republicans aren't so sure about that.




Joe Louis, left, again defends world heavyweight championship against Arturo Godoy, right, in 15-round contest at Yankee Stadium, June 20.
