## Texas Wildlife Is Worth 94 Million Commisson Finds

AUSTIN, Tex.-Texas continres to lead the nation in the value of its wildlife resources, according to ifgures assembled after surveys vere made by the federal government and forwarded to the execuive secretary of the State Game ommission. Not only does Texas ead the nation, but its wildlife reources are worth approximately hree times as much as those of e second leading state.

Wildlife resources in Texas are alued at \$94,350,394 by federal experts. This takes into consideraion the value of insectivorous birds to the farmer, of game and the amount of money spent by hunters it brings the land owner, hotel owners, stores and tourist camps; the value of the fur crop n the state and a myriad of other ways in which game is of actual monetary value to the Lone Star

TOLEDO.—Star shotmakers here for the Inverness Invitational Four-Ball agree no one ever more richly deserved the United States Open crown than Lawson Little.

The handsome chap who came down in front at Cleveland's Canter-bury is the first leader of the nation's qualifiers to prevail in the

championship.

Little launched his title drive in Chicago, May 27, when despite rain and mud, he broke the No. 4 course record at Olympia Fields with a 65. He followed that with a 69 on the No. 1 course for a total of 134. Little played seven rounds for the Open title—two to qualify, four in the championship proper and another to dispose of stout-hearted Gene, Sarazen in the playoff. His total for those seven rounds was 491, strokes, an average of 70 1/7 and a total of 11 under the aggregate par, Between the qualifier and the championship itself, Little played, superbly in the Goodall Round Robin at Fresh Meadow, where he matched Ben Hogan's 66, which tied Gene Sarazen's course record.

INASMUCH as Little repelled Sarazen, 79-73, in the Open payoff, it is interesting to recall that Sarazen beat Little, 70-71, in their Goodall match

Little was ready for the Open and saw it through, and it is a pleas ure to see his striking figure in the Invitational Four-Ball at Inverness; a club entertwined completely with the great sport and its background; Inverness rocketed into world-wide fame with two of the more spec-





#### TVA Is Here to Stav

Many of the things that have been accomplished during our decade of depression are here today. It is a notable thing that in the current discussion of political platforms for 1940, almost nobody believes in a complete return 1929, even if that were possible.

A case in point is that of Wendell Willkie, sensational dark hourse in the Republican presidential race. Willkie, head of a giant utilities combine, has had his share of tangles with the Tennessee Valley Authority. No one fought it more straightforwardly, more openly, nor more effectively. He didn't like the way it was built or expanded. and he doesn't like the way it is run, but it is there. The dams are built. The distribution system has been built and acquired. No president, Willkie believes, can turn the clock back.

It should now be operated for a test period, say, of five years, Willkie suggests. Then, after close bookkeeping has shown that its real costs are as compared with the cost of privately produced electricity, the country can democratically decide whether to extend or control this field.

Memphis, for instance, became a year ago the first large city in the United States to own and operate all of its public utilities, gas, electricity, and water. The saving to the people of Memphis in that year has been enormous, at least \$2,500,000. A million kilowatts a month more in residential service alone is being consumed. Savings of from 25 to 40 per cent in utility bills have actually raised the standard of living of Memphians.

The only question is: Has this desirable result been achieved at the expense of the taxpayers of the rest of the country? The TVA idea has been based on the expectation that eventually the whole vast system will pay for itselfreimburse the taxpayers of the United States for an advance made largely for the benefit of a section.

Willkie is quite right in suggesting that the books of this enterprise should be kept in such a way that the American people will know exactly what TVA is costing

Who pays, and how much? Who gets the benefits, and what are they? Careful scrutiny should be kept of these factors, for on them will depend future policies that may well transform the country.




