





Ask anyone what his most precious possession is, and he will almost invariably say, "My children." The desire for the welfare of our children enables us to "move mountains". We will do anything, give them anything, if we think it will help them.

he farm. I think our farmers must obtain

a stronger and more direct voice in the operation of the Department of Agriculture. High positions in that department should go to men with broad farm experience. Reorganization of the department is an absolute necessiity.

Farmers must have the opportunity to run their farms with minimum government interference. Our farm policy must be designed to meet the challenges of the 70's and must discard the antiquated philosophics of the

OUR FARM program must be developed to give the farmer freedom to manage his farm and an opportunity to carn a fair share of the national net income. Some people see the farm program as a likely place for heavy

budget-cutting this year. And, many well-intending, but misinformed persons have made a great issue of farm subsidies and of payments to cotton farmers. It is necessary to correct this misunderstanding

THE COTTON farmer's support payments are a vital part of his income. For the great majority of farmers these payments represent not only all their profits, but also a significant part of their cost in producing cotton. Any sudden denial of payments to larger farmers would put out of business our most efficient and productive people. To place a ceiling on the support a farmer could receive would destroy all semblance of efficiency in most American ag-



Everyone get some butter and syrup, and let's get busy and eat up this bread we produced in Castro County this year.

WE HAD an estimated 72,5000 acres of wheat that we think averaged 35 bushels per acre. One bushel of wheat will make 45.6 pounds of flour, or 5812 one-pound loaves of bread. That's 2,0471/2 lcaves of bread per acre.

If this bread sold for 27 cents per loaf, it would mean \$552.82 per acre. Of this amount, the farmer received \$43.75.

The wheat we produced in Castro County this year would make a grand total of 150,407,500 onepound loaves of bread, or threefourths of a loaf for each person in the US-or about enough bread for a two-day supply for the coun-


