Are You a Successophile?

Right off the bat, we ought to explain that there isn't any such word.

But if a word were to be made up to describe the fellow who worships success, any kind of success, attained by any means at all, that might be it.

Right now we are in danger of developing too many people of this type. We've all heard the kind of person who looks at Europe with poyeyed wonder, and mutters to himself, "Gosh! You've really got to hand it to that fellow Hitler, don't you? He sure has put it over! He must have something!"

It is certainly true that the military accomplishments of Hitler's Germany, strictly as military accomplishments, are magnificent. He has developed a German army which no one has yet been able to resist.

Question: How worthy an object is that? How has that served the world and its people.

Question again: How was it done? At what cost, and by what means?

The answer is simple: By channeling an unheard-of percentage of the productive ability of the German people into building a military machine. By making every man a soldier and training him for periods of time and with a thoroughness which other nations were unwilling to adopt.

Suppose the United States had embarked in 1933 on a similar course. Suppose that instead of providing jobs and sustenance to an average of 2,500,000 people it had simply clapped them all into the army. Suppose that instead of building 457,000 miles of roads and 23,000 public buildings, we had built military highways and tanks and barracks? Suppose that instead of building Boulder Dam and Grand Coulee and Bonneville and Fort Peck, we had built planes and battleships?

Does anyone suppose that we could not by now have blitzkrieged Canada and Mexico and subjected the hemisphere to our will?

One can imagine, facing things squarely, there would be quite a lot of chinning going on at a meeting of President Roosevelt and Mussolini.

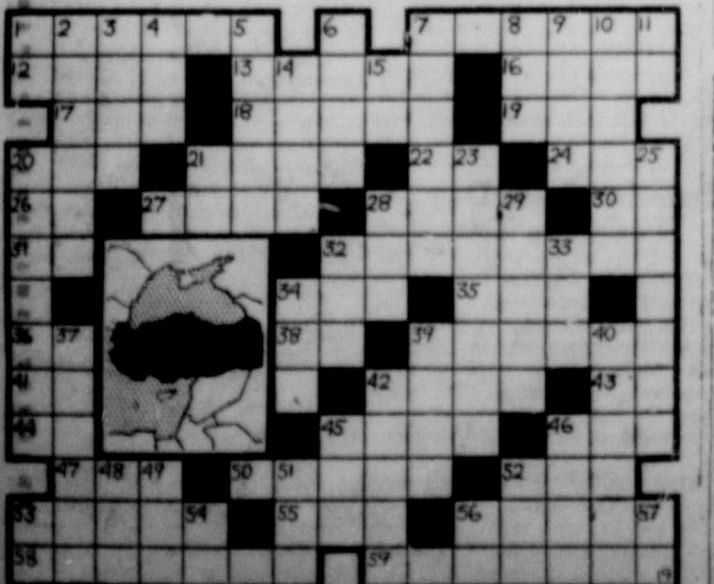

Side Show Freak Develops Into a King Midas of Tex.

NEW YORK.—In 1896 Barnum's circus plastered the countryside with advance posters telling about its clowns, ladies in pink tights and the "fabulous Duryea motorwagon."

The horseless carriage, crude as it was, aroused the curiosity of the nation, overshadowing an interest in the freaks and other attractions. Thousands of persons paid a dime to catch a glimpse of the strange "vehicle" that would move over the roads without a horse.

"Little did those crowds in the gay 90's suspect that the side-show freak in a few decades would develop into a fabulous King Midas of taxes," comments the American Petroleum Industry Committee.

"The motor vehicle has generated a flow of tax money to government far beyond that resulting from any other mechanical device. The annual tax revenue accruing to government from the operation of motor vehicles exceeds the total taxes collected by the federal, state and local governments in 1896, when the automobile was a side-show curiosity.

"In 1896 total tax revenue in the United States was approximately \$1,000,000,000. The highway users in this country are now paying that much in gasoline taxes alone. They also are paying annually more than \$400,000,000 in registration fees and several hundred millions of dollars in various other charges. Thus, the little side-show attraction has become a major performer in the nation's tax show."
