HEROISM ON SMALL BOATS HELPS ENGLAND

AT A SOUTHEAST ENGLAND PORT, July 27.—The admiralty announced yesterday, a paragraph in a long communique: "A convoy consisting of 21 small coastal vessels escorted by his majesty's trawlers was heavily attacked by successive waves each of about 30 German aircraft. Five small vessels were sunk. These had a total tonnage of 5,104. A further five small vessels totaling 5,133 tons received damages and one of these, a 544-ton coaster, had to be beached."

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 27.—Representatives of the chambers of commerce of leading cities in nine Mid-Western states met today to hold a "revolt congress" in Kansas City Aug. 30 to protest certain features of the present national defense program.

Relations With Rumania Cold In Great Britain

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 27.—Increased coldness in relations between Rumania and Great Britain were forecast today as the result of news that British authorities at Port Said had detained a 6,000-ton Rumanian merchant ship and two Rumanian tankers.

England Calls Up 300,000 Men; Air War Continues

LONDON, July 27.—German airplanes continued to batter at British defenses today as the government called up another 300,000 men to boost the fighting forces past the 4,000,000 mark.

Oil Production Shows Increase Over The Nation

HOUSTON, Tex., July 27.—Crude oil production in the United States for the week ending today increased 103,150 barrels daily to average 3,692,700, or 64,300 barrels above the U. S. Bureau of Mines estimate of July market demand, the Oil Weekly reported.

Carleton Leads In Constable's Race

H. M. Carleton held a lead of 184 votes over his opponent, W. (Pat) Couch, in the race for constable of Precinct 1. With one Eastland box still not reported early Sunday morning, Carleton had a total vote of 689 while Couch trailed with a total of 505.

John Barnes Wins Constable's Race

John Barnes, candidate for re-election as constable of precinct 2, defeated his opponent, E. Hill, by a vote of 788 to 433, in the election yesterday. Barnes has served this precinct for several years and his majority in yesterday's election again places the responsibilities of this office upon him.

These Childish Thieveries

Mona Lisa, thickly cased in a wooden crate, may soon
be on her way back to Italy.

There is a childish irrelevance about this performance
that freezes the blood. Are wars and the bloody death of
thousands for no better purpose than this?

More than 400 years ago a man named Leonardo lived
in Florence. He was a great man, one who was intensely
aware of all aspects of life, one whose talents ranged the
whole gamut of human capability. He was painter, engineer,
politician, writer, inventor, builder, poet—the sort
of all-round man which the world doesn't produce any
more.

Leonardo painted a picture of a nobleman's wife. It is a
small picture, not too impressive at first glance. But on the
lips of Mona Lisa and in her eyes there played the ghost
of a strange inscrutable half-smile which fascinated those
who looked.

King Francis I of France bought the painting from
Leonardo when the painter came to France to serve him.

Years passed, and ever the hold of this small painting
on its beholders grew and grew. Not only the Florentines,
not only the Parisians, but people of all the world grew to
know Leonardo's Mona Lisa.

Napoleon, flushed with his military triumphs, installed
her in a Parisian gallery at a time when his legions returned
from Italy and Egypt staggering under the weight of
stolen works of art.

Later, in the Louvre Gallery, Mona Lisa smiled down
from the wall. Artists copied her. Introspective men wrote
her love letters. One stole her, and for two years she was
in Italy. Then she was recovered and returned.

Now Mussolini is being urged to steal her back, and to
take her with her other works by Leonardo and Titian
stolen by that other conqueror, Napoleon.

It is all pretty childish. What does the world care
whether Mona Lisa hangs in a Paris gallery or an Italian
palace? Blind in the darkness of her crate, Mona Lisa's
mocking eyes will smile still at those who steal her away.

And Leonardo? He, too, would laugh at the strange
spectacle, and say, "Yes, it is true that I painted, and I
am glad that my work is still found good after 400 years.
But what are your artists painting today? Have you, picture-grabbers, managed to produce a climate in which man
is free to create as I was free to create?"

Second Baptist Church Formed By Congregation

The following facts, including the articles of organization, of the Second Baptist Church of Ranger, have been prepared by officials of the church and Rev. F. D. Rodgers, the pastor of the old Calvary Baptist Church:

A month ago today there was a man who came to our town by the name of F. G. Rodgers and preached to what was known as the Central Baptist Church and then as the Calvary Baptist Church. He conducted a revival meeting with us for three weeks, day and night. The church organization was seeking a leader and asking a way to go forward.

This man, Rodgers, preached straight from the sh sholder on the importance of cooperation and on the disadvantages of non-cooperation, and as a result people were saved. Many lives were dedicated to the service of the Lord. At the end of the third week there were 63 church letters gotten together, and the former members voted to disband all former organizations, which was heartily and unanimously carried out. Also, these 63 voted to organize a cooperative, missionary, Baptist church cooperating with the Cisco Association, the Texas Baptist General Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention. We were exceedingly happy to have in this organization the missionary of the Cisco Association and the pastors of the following churches:

Brother Phillips, pastor First Baptist Church, Ranger; Brother Ponder of First Baptist Church, Ranger; Brother Prince, pastor of First Baptist Church, Cisco; Brother Jones Weathers of the First Baptist Church, Eastland; Brother L. A. Thompson, pastor of three churches in the association. All of these are cooperative missionary Baptists. Brother Henry Littleton, our district missionary, was invited but could not come, and all the pastors of the association were invited, but several were obligated where they could not come—all of which we regret.

Brother Blate, the Missionary, moderated the first work of the new church was an appeal made for sinners to repent and trust Christ and the first results to bless this church five dear ones confessing Christ as their Savior.

and joined this new organization for baptism, and were baptized last Sunday afternoon at Colony creek.

The articles of faith that were written and read by F. G. Rodgers and adopted by the Second Baptist Church of Ranger are as follows: We accept the articles of Faith of Pendleton's Church Manual with these additional articles and the re-emphasizing of same.

Article 1: We accept Jesus Christ, the Virgin Born son of God as the Head of our Church. We also accept the Triune God: Father, Son and Holy Spirit as the one God.

Article 2: We believe the Holy Bible the verbally inspired Holy Word is the recorded will of God to man, and that it shall never pass away. Matthew 24:35: We accept all the Bible and all the teachings of the Bible and believe it all and reject none.

Article 3: We believe in the Holy Spirit the Third of the Trinity and that He convicts Sinners of Sin, Seals the Redeemed Soul for all Eternity, Unfolds the Bible to Christians and reveals the Father's will to them, comforts and guides all the way home.

Article 4: We believe that all people who come to the age of accountability are sinners by choice and in order to go to heaven must repent of their sins and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ for life and salvation.

Article 5: We believe in the eternal hell of punishment, and the damnation for all sinners who will not repent and believe on the Lord Jesus Christ for life and salvation.

Article 6: We believe in the eternal heaven of rest and that all who take Christ as their Saviour shall spend eternity there with Christ and the redeemed of all ages world without end.

Article 7: We accept the Bible plan for church financing. Which is plainly taught in the Bible. This plan is tithes and offerings brought on the first day of the week and we shall request that the pastor and church accept, practice and preach this plan of church financing which is tithes and offerings.

Article 8: We believe in world wide missions and in sending the gospel to the peoples of all the earth, and we also believe except a church do this they shall not be blessed of the Lord, and if they send the gospel to all the earth they shall have the blessings of the Lord upon them.

Article 9: We declare ourselves to be Cooperative Baptist on all

the work, and at all times in all days and under all conditions.

Article 10: We believe the Bible teaches that there are two church officers as follows: pastors and deacons. The pastor is the shepherd and the leader of the flock. The deacons are the servants of the church, the ones who serve the tables of the church and the pastor, and that these men are not overseers, but servants to carry out the commands of the church and to hold up the hands of the pastor, try to win souls to Christ, peacemakers, and to keep the peace, fellowship and harmony in the congregation.

We accept the scriptural number of seven active deacons, as was given by the Holy Spirit to the First Church at Jerusalem, and deacons coming from other churches will be recognized as spiritual requirements and be examined by pastor and active deacons before they can serve as active deacons.

Article 11: We believe in the leadership of the Holy Spirit in the calling of a pastor, and that He leads a church to a pastor and the pastor to the church, and that He leads a pastor away from a church and we will not run ahead of the Holy Spirit, and we will seek the leadership of the Holy Spirit and will pray as pastor and church until He causes us to see alike.

Article 12: We also accept the two church ordinances taught in the Bible as follows: Baptism and the Lord's Supper.

Article 13: We further desire to cooperate with the Cisco Baptist Association, Texas Baptist General Convention and Southern Baptist Convention to the best of our ability.

The next act of the church was to call a pastor. They extended a call to F. G. Rodgers and he accepted. They are expecting at least 50 additions to the church today, from all over the country. This church has as its aim to be a blessing to every church in the city and especially to its mother church, The First Baptist Church, not only do we expect to be a blessing to every church and Baptist but to every business that is honorable and to every person in the city of Ranger and around and a blessing to the end of the earth.

F. G. Rodgers is a cooperative Baptist preacher, has never had one minute in all his ministry or even one second when he wasn't a cooperative preacher, but has led five non-cooperative churches to become thoroughly, in every point, missionary and cooperative during his 26 years of ministry. He has been pastor of six churches. He is

a graduate of Burleson College, Baylor University and the Southwestern Seminary. He has conducted 243 revivals and God has blessed his ministry in saving 35,590 people. He has organized five churches and 15 Sunday schools.

You have a welcome at all times to come and be with us in every service. Pray for us and we shall do our best to be a blessing to you. May the best of our Heavenly Father be upon every one who lives in Ranger or around Ranger and may the God of all Grace cause His Face to shine upon you in the prayer of the Second Baptist today and all the days.

Our chief objective will be to have a part in carrying out the great commission to preach the gospel to every creature. To the end that lost men and women may be brought to a saving knowledge of the world's only Saviour, His people strengthened, and that we may in a small way glorify the name of Him who loved us so that He gave His life that we might live. We covet the prayers and cooperation of God's Redeemed everywhere.
