

The first application should be made within 10 days after emergence if plants show severe deficiency. Another application should follow in about two weeks. Should yellowing continue or occur later in the season,

If zinc or other micronutrients are included in the treatment. slightly reduce the iron concentration to prevent leaf burn from too much salt. In applying micronutrients, Welch advises using only those that are lacking, and in amounts that will meet plant requirements.


