



Creager. with the regulations of the State State Department of Education and is enforced for the protection of every child.

The Ranger board is asking the cooperation of parents whose chil dren have not been vaccinated and equests them to attend to this matter at once. If vaccination is postponed until after school open it might be necessary for some of the children to miss school and thus get behind with their instruction and it is hoped that each par-ent will avoid this possibility.
