Nearer and Nearer Comes the Cloud

A few years ago the cloud of European war seemed literally no bigger than a man's hand. It has been on the horizon for years. Even when war broke it seemed little inclined to drift westward.

Now as rumors thicken that closer relations with Canada, perhaps even a formal mutual assistance treaty, are in the making, the cloud is spreading. The sky is dark with the threat.

If Britain should fall before the blitzkrieg, the assurance of Premier Churchill has been given that the war will be continued against Germany even from the overseas territories of the empire. That means Canada.

There is nothing alarmist or hysterical about it. Britain's chances look better than they did a few weeks ago. But it could happen, and only the blindly infatuated can fail to look the possibility squarely in the eye.

Suppose the worst happens and Britain should be knocked out. It is almost inevitable that Canada would continue at war with Germany and Italy. The United States would certainly have no right to demand that Canada withdraw from such a war. Canada is an independent nation, and makes her own decisions.

Yet the United States cannot permit and will not permit any foreign power to seize a single inch of Canadian soil. That has nothing to do with sentiment, though it is certainly true that the people of the United States have old and deep friendship with the Canadians. It is simply a matter of national safety. By the relentless logic of geography and events, the United States would have to join forces to defend a country actively at war with European powers.

The United States must be ready to face any such situation which may develop without its having had a word to say about its development. The American people must be ready mentally to adjust themselves to a new situation. Military conferences should be held (perhaps they are already being held) to assure complete understanding, so that any steps the United States may be compelled to make to defend North America may be taken promptly and surely.

We may still hope that matters will not come to this desperate pass. But it would be folly to blink the fact that they might, or to neglect every possible measure that can be taken in advance to meet them.

Supreme Court Is Final Check On American System

WACO, Aug. 20.—During these critical times, according to Judge James P. Alexander of Waco, "It is necessary more than ever for the people to realize that the Supreme Court is the final check and balance in our American system of government."

"The importance of protecting our freedoms, liberties and the bill of rights," he said, "makes it necessary that the high court stand always as a bulwark against any subversive or other attempts to encroach upon the American way of life. To preserve the importance of the Supreme Court, the best qualified justices must be elected to the court."

Judge Alexander, an Associate Justice of the 10th Court of Civil Appeals at Waco for almost 10 years, is a candidate for Chief Justice of the Texas Supreme Court in the Aug. 24 primary. As for his qualifications for the position of Chief Justice, Judge Alexander's supporters cite the recommendations of the bar of his home county of McLennan, which in a resolution has endorsed him as "eminently qualified."

"We commend Judge Alexander as one thoroughly qualified from the standpoint of good character, outstanding intellect, legal education, and experience to serve as Chief Justice, and with full confidence to declare the law as he may find it to be," the resolution said.

Survey Shows An Increase In Wages

By United Press MINNEAPOLIS, Minn.—Wartime business has put approximately \$100,000,000 more a month into the pay envelopes of American families than was there a year ago, according to a survey of family purchasing power, made by the Northwestern National Life Insurance Company.

which are caused chiefly by higher food prices. The greater consumer buying power, according to the survey, is due almost entirely to the car industries. General manufacturing activity, which includes both war and non-war industries, has not yet reached the level it gained in 1937. The company's report says that still higher food prices to the consumer are probable, judging by the climb in wholesale prices and in farm prices during July. Using an average privately employed worker's family as a yardstick, the insurance company found the following comparisons:

In June, 1939, the monthly paycheck of such a worker was \$144.71. In June, 1940, it had risen to \$150.91—a rise of 86 cents. Expenses for the same standard of living, however, had increased from \$129.72 monthly to \$132.01—or slightly more than \$2. A month's supply of food for such a family, costing \$30 at 1933 index prices, cost \$34.47 in June, 1939. In June, 1940, the grocery bill for a month was \$36.15, with a further rise indicated. Clothing, rent, fuel, light and miscellaneous items all showed slight increases during the year.
