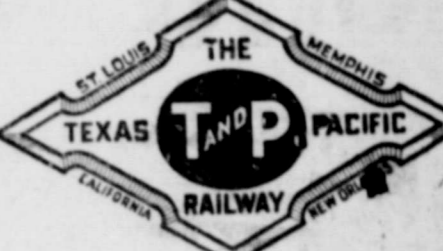

### France Lacks Cars For Hauling Wine

VICHY—French wines may not be on every table this winter. This is due not to a wine famine but to a shortage of tank cars. About half of the total stock is still in the army's possession and it is not known when they will be returned to their proprietors. They were used to transport gasoline for the army's needs and, upon their return, will have to undergo a thorough disinfection. This naturally will affect the whole French metropolitan and even colonial wine industry. Through this shortage of rolling stock, wine delivery will be seriously complicated.

At the beginning of the war last September, the army requisitioned all tank cars available to carry wine for soldiers and gasoline for the motorized units and French aviation. The lack of wine tank cars seriously hinders wine producers in France, especially in the Bordeaux region, which is one of the most important in France, and that of the Provence, where there also are

important vineyards. Algeria also will be hit by this shortage, as a great quantity of wine from North Africa is shipped to France to be used to "cut" or strengthen French wines. With half of France occupied, the situation is made more difficult for the return of the empty cars. Their absence threatens serious difficulties during the next few weeks with the grape harvests approaching. Growers insist that if they do not have tank cars soon most of the new wine will stay where it is and that will mean ruin for the vineyard country. Another problem arises from the army's requisition of tank cars. As they have not been used in the last two months they are slowly drying out and repairs will have to be made to prevent leakage. Many French departments have no vineyards, but all drink wine. If something is not done to return the tank cars to the wine growers most of these departments will not be able to get wine this winter. The Paris region also will be deprived of wine, while most of the new harvest will remain in the southern departments where there is already a serious oversupply.

What Shall It Profit a Nation?

The French saved Paris. In saving it, they lost something else—and time alone shall tell which was the more valuable.

The British have chosen the other course. They may sacrifice in fame and ashes the greatest city in the world, but they may save something else, too, that is very precious: self-respect, honor, something that for lack of a better term might be called a national soul.

The words of St. Mark were not written perhaps for quite these circumstances, but they come forcibly to mind as the bombs shriek down, the walls crumble, and the dust and smoke roll across the city on the Thames.

"For whosoever will save his life shall lose it. . . . "For what shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?"

The words were written, perhaps, of another kind of sacrifice than that which the ordinary people of Britain are making today. Perhaps soul is not quite the right word. But should the British win through after an ordeal of this kind, they may have lost London, but they may also have saved something more valuable to their future—their integrity as a people.

Milton's statue crashes down into the street from St. Giles' Cripplegate. But suppose the statue still stood, and the freedom for which Milton himself struggled were blotted out?

The little church beside the peaceful Avon where Shakespeare sleeps may tumble into ruin, but suppose his words were to survive only as a Teutonic translation of a figure at last by conquest "unser Shakespeare"?

The old monuments of London fall, the outcropping of Roman walls crumble at last after 2000 years, the Tower of William the Conqueror may topple, the Londons of Johnson and Dickens and Thackeray, of Limehouse and Soho and Whitehall may become dust.

The British are staking everything on the future rather than on the past. They have chosen to make bomb-fodder of the monuments of the past, hoping and believing that those very ruins will be recognized by the future as a monument to their courage and their integrity.

Even if the British lose London, they stake all on the hope of finding something infinitely more precious.

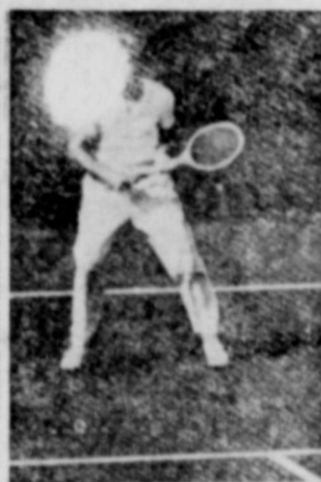

BRUCE CATTON IN WASHINGTON

NEW DEALERS HOPED JONES WOULD GIVE UP LOAN POSITION TO SOMEONE MORE LIBERAL

WASHINGTON—Don't expect the New Dealers to cheer just because Congress has voted that Jesse Jones may keep his old job as federal loan administrator when he takes his new post as secretary of commerce.

As a general thing, the New Dealers were sort of hoping Mr. Jones would have to give up the lending job. They were inclined to hail the commerce appointment as a gentle shove upstairs—just as they had earlier figured his appointment as loan administrator would cause him to let go of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, which he didn't do.

Concern right now is due to the fact that Congress has just made half a billion dollars available for loans to Latin America. New Dealers complain Jones doesn't like to make loans unless they're such as would appeal to a sound banker, and they're afraid the help-Latin-America program won't work unless a somewhat more liberal view of things is taken.

Peanut Growers Association, and is located in the Waples Platter building.

The government is guaranteeing a price that is to be paid for peanuts received at the warehouse, higher than that guaranteed in past years. The prices this year are 96 cents per bushel for No. 1 peanuts, 90 cents for No. 2 and 82 1/2 cents for No. 3 peanuts.

The warehouse will remain open six days each week, and growers may have their peanuts graded and stored at any time during the peanut season.
