SENATE REJECTS CIVIL SERVICE FOR EMPLOYES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27. The senate today rejected, 46 to 17, a proposal to require some 150,-000 federal employes to pass competitive examinations before they could be put in civil service. under the pending Ramspeck civil service bill.

The amendment was prope by Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D., La. It would have displaced a provision for these employes to take non-competitive examinations that is, the jobs would have been open for competition by outsiders as well as by the present jobholders.

Sen. Arthur H. Vandenburg. R., Mich., joined Ellender in urging the adoption of the competitive examination plan. Both charged that the non-competitive examination would grant the protection of civil service "to 150,000 political appointees."

Sen, James M. Mead, D., N. Y. in charge of the bill in the sen ate, stressed the expense and difficulty involved in holding co petitive examinations involving 150,000 jobs. Furthermore, he declared, many federal employes, who have given "long, faithful and efficient service" might lose their jobs to younger people "just out of school" under the competitive plan.

VICHY .- Ten thousand city families from Britany-the vanguard of a vast movement to regenerate France through a return to the soil-have migrated to the Dordogne valley to take possession of thousands of abandoned farms

Fifty thousand families eventucrowded industrial centers settled in the Correze, Cantal, Lot Aveyron, and Dordogne regions as part of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain's plan to revitalize France by restoring it to a predominantly agricultural state.

Marshal Petain holds the view that France declined when the people began to desert the land, destroying the historic bases of French social and eco-nomic life. The virtues which made France a great power thus present war, in his opinion. Petain feels that if he can re-

GERMANS LOSE 122 PLANES IN DAYLIGHT RAID

bombers, escorted by Messerschmitt fighter planes, made renewed attempts to bomb London today, in what London circles called a failure. The Air Ministry claimed that 122 German planes had been blasted out of the skies, chiefly by anti-aircraft fire, and admitted the loss of 31 British

planes and 16 pilots today. The German raids were apparently in retaliation for last nights gigantic air raids upon German invasion ports, in which heavy loss was inflicted by the Royal Air Force bombers. Today the raids against the German-held French ports was continued today, with eports of continued success in the raids. Great fires were reported to have followed these raids again today and the explosions neard across the channel in England indicated that vast powder

stores had been blown up. Britain planes also roamed far inside the German Reich again today, causing some damage.

In the attacks upon Britain German bomber planes were escorted by Messerschmitt fighter planes in waves of 16 planes to the squadron. It reported that in ne of the raids today three Royal Air Force Hurricane planes atacked the invaders. driving off the Messerschmitts, and that antiarcraft fire then brought down three of the Nazi bombers in

What Shall It Profit a Nation?

The French saved Paris. In saving it, they lost something else-and time alone shall tell which was the more valuabe.

The British have chosen the other course. They may sacrifice in fame and ashes the greatest city in the world, but they may save something else, too, that is very precious: self-respect, honor, something that for lack of a bet-ter term might be called a national soul.

The words of St. Mark were not written perhaps for quite these circumstances, but they come forcibly to mind as the bombs shriek down, the walls crumble, and the dust and smoke rol across the city on the Thames.

'For whosoever will save his life shall lose it. "For what shall it profit a man , if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?"

The words were written, perhaps, of another kind of sacrifice than that which the ordinary people of Britain are making today. Perhaps soul is not quite the right word. But should the British win through after an ordeal of this kind, they may have lost London, but they may also have saved something more valuable to their future-their integrity as a people.

Milton's statue crashes down into the street from St. Gies' Cripplegate. But suppose the statute still stood, and the freedom for which Milton himself struggled were blot-! ted out?

The little church beside the peaceful Avon where Shakespeare sleeps may tumble into ruin, but suppose his words were to survive only as a Teutonic translation of a figure at last by conquest "unser Shakespeare"?

The old monuments of London fall, the outcropping of Roman walls crumble at last after 2000 years, the Tower of William the Conqueror may topple, the Londons of Johnson and Dickens and Thackeray, of Limehouse and Soho and Whitehall may become dust-

The British are staking everything on the future rather than on the past. They have chosen to make bomb-fodder of the monuments of the past, hoping and believing that those very ruins will be recognized by the future as a monument to their courage and their integrity.



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
