requiring aldermen to be elected requiring aldermen to be elected
from single-member districts rather from single-m
Dimmitt aldermen have been elected at large ever since the city was incorporated, but Gonzales' suit claims that the at-large system
now unconstitutionally cancels now unconstitutionally cancels or
minimizes the votes of Mexican Americans.
The suit states that $40.7 \%$ of Dimmitt's population has Spanish surnames, but that no MexicanAmerican has ever successfully run for a city council seat.

Gonzales, who ran unsuccessfully for the Dimmitt Board of Aldermen twice, coming within 49 votes of being elected the second time,

Dimmitt native, was elected with 441.

Any money remaining should be

## Moisture Blocks

A common tool used to check soil moisture is the moisture block．It is used in conjunction with a conductance meter．The moisture blocks are installed conductance meter．The moisture blocks are installed after crop emergence and are buried in the root zone
soil profile．The wires from the buried blocks are then soil profile．The wires from the buried blocks are then
connected to a stake at the ground surface which is marked to indicate the depth at which the block is buried．These wires can then be connected to a small， hand－held resistance meter for readings．The meter measures electrical resistance and shows it as a percent of field capacity．The electrical resistance will vary with the amount of soil mositure with＂0＂being dry and＂10＂being wet．The key is to make frequent readings to indicate crop root development and soil moisture conditions at each foot of depth．The use of moisture blocks will enable a farmer to determine what is occuring in the root zone soil moisture profile and see what depth the crop is extracting moisture along with how much moisture is being used．Special care should also be taken to determine the effect of rainfall on soil moisture conditions．For additional information on the use of moisture blocks，contact the Soil Conservation Service in Dimmitt or the High Plains Underground Water District in Lubbock，Texas．

## Of Dimmitt's 91 seniors in the

 Class of $1989,83 \%$ plan to go on to some form of higher education,while another $7 \%$ plan to enter the military and $10 \%$ will enter employment or have other plans.
