HOUSE COMMITTEE REFUSES O'DANIEL'S DEMANDS FOR A \$26,000,000 PENSION FUND

ST. LOUIS, March 8.—If Govern-
or Lee O'Daniel had his pro-
posed appropriation of \$26,000,000 to pay up the state's so-
cial security obligations, he has
answered in kind by the
Committee on Revenue and
Finance. If he was playing a lit-
erary game, the committee
is playing a hand and the
game is pretty obvious.
O'Daniel asked for
\$26,000,000 broad based tax bill
to give preference to his
state transaction tax. The
committee has responded with a
modest increase in ex-
ports to yield an esti-
mated \$11,451,540—which sum
wouldn't result. The
committee left the door open for
enough big tax bill when in
reality it voted to report
O'Daniel's one cent a gallon
on processing tax. There
have been concealed smiles
on the committee pushed the

BRITISH NAVY STILL HOLDING BIG ADVANTAGE

Official announcement in Lon-
don today that British warship
construction for the year ending
April first will total 450 fighting
craft emphasizes the decisive
manner in which the British Navy
is holding its command of the
sea, and maintaining an unbrok-
en blockade of the whole Euro-
pean continent. From Northern
Norway southward through the
Atlantic and eastward into the
Mediterranean, approximately 5,
000 miles of coastline are prohib-
ited areas for enemy overseas
commerce.
It is customary to speak of the
British Isles as a fortress under
siege. In reality, however, the
continent of Europe is more ac-
curately described by that phrase
because it is open to shipping
from the Western World and the
Orient. The European continent,
however, is locked within itself,
unable to maintain commercial in-
tercourse with the rest of the
world because of the British
Navy's control of the ocean traf-
fic lanes.
The new additions to the British
fleet not only are tightening
the Atlantic and Mediterranean
blockade but also allow Great
Britain to add somewhat to the
strength of her fighting craft in
the Orient. This relentless pres-
sure of sea power, ever increas-
ing, is destined to play a vital
part in the eventual outcome of
the war.
First Lord of the Admiralty
Alexander told the House of
Commons on Wednesday that new
warships coming into service dur-
ing the present year make a for-
midable force, in themselves,
judged by naval standards of al-
most any other country. Today's
announcement of the number of
new craft constructed by April
first emphasizes the truth of Mr.
Alexander's claim.
Among the additions to the
British Navy are five super-bat-
tleships of the King George V
class, each of 35,000 tons, con-
stituting the most powerful fight-
ing squadron in the world. From
these monsters of offensive war-
fare, the new ships range through
different classes to small, armed
speedboats.
New destroyers, invaluable for
convoy work, are being added to
the British Navy this year, in in-
creasing numbers. Mr. Alexander
especially emphasized in his

Received and Filed Germans Claim British Vessels Have Been Sunk

BERLIN, Mar. 8.—The German
High Command claimed today
that Nazi sea and air forces have
sunk another 14 British ships, in-
cluding two destroyers, for a to-
tal tonnage destruction of 62,
600.
The high command claimed
that high-speed motor torpedo
boats launched a slashing attack
upon a "strongly protected" Brit-
ish convoy off Southeast Britain
yesterday.
When the attack had ended,
said the communique, eight Brit-
ish ships, including two destroy-
er escorts and two tankers, one
of 8,000 and one of 5,000 tons
had been sent to the bottom. To-
tal tonnage sunk in the attack
was given as 25,400.
At the same time the high com-
mand said another Nazi U-boat
had reported in, claiming it had
sunk five British ships of a total
of 33,000 tons.
The high command said that
German bombers on reconnaissance
flights over the North Sea
bombed and sank a merchant ship
of 1,200 tons and severely dam-
aged three others.
The high command said bomb-
ers and dive bombers yesterday
"repeatedly attacked" military
objectives at Malta, British Med-
iterranean Island fortress. The
communique said a torpedo dump
was set ablaze.
German pursuit planes shot
down one British bomber and one
British fighter and have set fire
to a Sunderland flying boat in a
low-level machine gun attack.
Individual planes were said to
have bombed airfields in South
England "with severe destruc-
tion of hangars and living quar-
ters." It was claimed that several
direct hits were scored on an
arms factory near Newark in
"bold, low-level attacks."
Another arms factory near
Bristol was said to have been hit.
The communique said that
there were no enemy raids yes-
terday or last night on Germany
or German-occupied territory.

GREEKS MUSTER ENTIRE POWER FOR A DEFENSE

ATHENS, Mar. 8.—Greece was
said in informed quarters today to
be mustering all her resources to
carry on the war in full compli-
ance with her treaty commitment
to Great Britain.
This word was spread as the
Greek military reported fresh
successes against the Italian legions
in Albania and a rumor
circulated here that Premier Ben-
ito Mussolini had withdrawn his
Albanian commander, Gen. Ugo
Cavaliere, because of failure to
improve the Fascist military posi-
tion.
According to sources with knowl-
edge of the Greek govern-
ment's position, Greece is not en-
gaged in any current negotia-
tions for an armistice with Italy
or for any form of pact which
would conflict with her present
commitments to Great Britain.
(The denial obviously was di-
rected at Balkan reports that
Germany is attempting to force
Greece to make peace with Italy
and that Jugoslavia has interven-
ed independently in an attempt to
end the Italo-Greek war.)
The important Athens news-
paper, Kathimeri, printed an open
letter to Adolf Hitler by George
Vlahos, most influential editorial
writer in Greece.
Vlahos asked Hitler why Ger-
many wants to attack Greece and
asserted that Greece had first ap-
pealed to Germany for support
when an Italian attack was
threatened.
"When Greece realized that
Mussolini's signature was value-
less," said the open letter, "she
did not appeal to Britain. She
appealed to you. I do not know
what your answer was but I do
know from Metaxas' (the late
Gen. John Metaxas, Greek strong
man) own lips that Germany said
we must not mobilize, we must
remain calm and not give any
pretext to the Italians."
"Not a British soldier has set
foot on Albania. You told us that
Germany would be a spectator
and would only intervene if a
British Army disembarked at Sa-
lonika."
Vlahos said that Greece fol-
lowed Germany's advice, remain-
ed calm and attempted to give
Italy no pretext for action.
"All this we did," he said, "but
Italy attacked. To whom were we
then to apply for help? To you?
You were that same day at Flo-
rence. We did not have the neces-
sary forces to remain alone there-
fore we turned to Britain who
rushed help to us though she had
her own troubles."
"Since then we alone have de-
feated Italy."

Mexican Arming Program Viewed As a Good Sign

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 8.—Dip-
lomats today regarded the an-
nouncement by Foreign Minister
Ezequiel Padilla, that Mexico was
selling her armaments and
aid any American nation
that "by any force foreign to
Mexico" as one of the most
significant statements of foreign
policy here in years.
Official of the United States
said Padilla's speech, in
the senate where he was
making defense conversations
with Mexico and the United
States, was "one of the most
sincere and patriotic ad-
resses he ever had heard."
United States Ambassador
D. Daniels, advised a few
minutes before that Padilla was
asked to make one of his rare
speeches to the senate to hear his
Venezuelan and Uruguayan
representatives also were present.
Daniels said the possibility of a
friendly alliance with the United
States, Padilla said, "Although
international situation is
not a moment for such a
move, I declare that if some
genius make it necessary to
use this method, we won't he-
sitate to do it."
Daniels said that the
speeches from the
Labor (Leftist) sector
will tend to settle him.
The columnist will continue
to discord aimed at destruc-
tion of the Pan-American doc-
trine, he said. "We must have
in the value of democracy,"
summarized Mexican policy
as follows: "If any force, for-
eign or our continent, should at-
tack any American nation, Mexi-
co would give her help, and for
reason the government of
Mexico has seen the necessity to
defend itself."
Daniels said that military, naval
and air bases would be augmented
with Mexican capital and
labor, and under Mexi-
can government control. He de-
clared that defenses would be
strengthened primarily for the
defense of the United States. He
said the base "will be put at the
disposal of all American coun-
tries."

Citizenship Will Be Discussed At Austin Meeting

AUSTIN, Tex.—Three Texas
civic leaders—a theater magnate,
humanitarian, a former state
executive and a prominent
women's representative—were
named today to the panel of
speakers for a school-and-citizen-
ship conference here March 14.
Co-sponsored by the University
of Texas and the Educational
Policies Commission, Washington,
D. C., the conference will stress
"How Can the Schools of Texas
Educate Youth for the Respon-
sibilities of American Citizenship."
Opening speaker will be Karl
Holtzelle of Dallas, president of
Interstate Theaters, civic prom-
oter, and former publisher, The Dal-
las Journal, who will lay the
foundation for the conference by
outlining "The Nation's Needs for
Trained Citizens."
Invited to speak as laymen ap-
proaching the question, "What I
Should Like to See the Schools Do
to Prepare Boys and Girls for the
Responsibilities of American Citi-
zenship," at the luncheon session
are Mrs. Jud Collier of Mumford
and Rev. M. E. Sadler of Austin.
Mrs. Collier is state legislative
chairman of the Texas Federa-
tion of Women's Clubs and heads
an organization of farm women.
Dr. Sadler, pastor of the Central
Christian Church, was formerly
chairman of the State Department
of Public Welfare.
The day-long deliberative ses-
sion will be limited to invited edu-
cators, religious leaders and rep-
resentatives of parental groups.
A. L. Brandon, University public
relations director and conference
chairman, said, but an evening
program will be open to the public.

Crude Production In U. S. Increases

HOUSTON, Tex., Mar. 8.—
Crude oil production in the United
States increased 19,975 bar-
rels daily for the week ending to-
day and averaged 3,622,450 bar-
rels daily, the Oil Weekly reported.
Daily average output was 33,
050 barrels below the U. S. Bu-
reau of Mines estimate of market
demand for March, the magazine
said.
This week's trend: Texas, 1-
347,700, up 4,650; California,
601,500, up 15,800; Oklahoma,
402,850, off 8,275; Illinois, 325,
600, up 5,700; Louisiana, 296,000
up 3,550; Kansas, 191,500, off
11,950; New Mexico, 107,100, up
3,400; Eastern States, 92,200, off
800; Mountain States, 102,800,
up 6,500; Michigan, 40,000, up
150; Indiana, 20,600, off 400;
Arkansas, 70,100, off 250; Miss-
issippi, 20,500, off 100; and Ne-
braska, 4,000, up 1,100.

ALAMEDA MAN IS KILLED IN AUTO MISHAP

J. U. Elrod of Alameda was in-
stantly killed and his two sons,
who were riding in the car with
him, were injured in a head-on
collision with a truck on Highway
80 about 200 yards south of the
Texas and Pacific Railway cross-
ing in Ranger Saturday afternoon
at 4 o'clock.
At the City-County hospital,
where the two sons were taken,
it was reported that Lloyd Elrod
had sustained head injuries, which
might prove serious, and that the
other son, Rex, was less seriously
injured.
Stories of witnesses of the col-
lision varied. One was that the
Elrod car attempted to pass another
car going in the same direction,
and met the truck, which was
passing the car in the other direc-
tion. The other version was that
the driver of the Elrod car ap-
parently became blinded by the
sun and pulled into the path of
the truck.
Highway patrolmen from East-
land arrived at the scene of the
accident within a few minutes af-
ter it happened, as they were pa-
trolling in the vicinity at the time.
They obtained statements from
witnesses, as Ranger police direct-
ed traffic around the wrecked car.
J. N. McFatter, Ranger justice
of the peace, held an inquest at
the scene of the fatal accident.
The three had apparently been
doing their weekly shopping in
Ranger, as there were sacks of
groceries in the wreckage of their
automobile. The truck was not
damaged.

ceived a gold medal as winner of
the Meat Animal Contest and
Billy Johnson, Eastland club boy,
was given a gold medal for win-
ning the REA Contest.
Curtis and Grady Redwine, Ala-
meda club boys were given gold
medals for placing first in the
county dairy demonstration con-
test, and silver medals went to
Raymond Beck and Alton What-
ley of Morton Valley, who took
second place in the county dairy
contest.
L. V. Mauney won the county
achievement award and a gold
medal awarded by the Extension
Service to one boy in each county.

British Purchasing Agent Hints Men May Be Needed

FORT WORTH, Mar. 8.—Sir
Louis Beale, greying, slender,
member of the British Purchasing
Mission, today left behind a hint
to Texans that England may need
American men—as well as ma-
chines—to successfully win the
war against Germany.
In an interview with reporters
here late yesterday he was asked:
"Does England expect men?"
"Perhaps I should not com-
ment..." he said, "but tools, at
least, are the immediate need."
"Eventually," he said, "Eng-
land will attack the enemy on his
own soil."
"For the time being, this war
must be won by American man-
ufacturing and engineering."
Scant applause greeted a reply
made by Judge Marvin Brown, Sr.,
of the Second Court of Appeals
when he said:
"If necessary, we should offer
(England) too, some American
blood."

mander of the Carl Barnes Post,
and W. T. Wilson, superintendent
of Ranger Public Schools, have
asked that this contest be held in
Ranger.
The national finals are sched-
uled to be held at Charleston, S.
C., on April 18. Gen. Charles P.
Summers, commandant of the
Citadel Military School, has ar-
ranged for a special dress review
to honor the contestants.
In many states, counties and
districts, contests are already un-
derway to determine state win-
ners. All state winners must be

TULSA, Okla.—Away with the "hash slinger," the "java moll" and the "dish slogger"—enter the "food salesperson" who can make the restaurant customer hungry with her description of the provender she can set before him.
 John B. O'Meara, who will conduct a restaurant and hotel employees training school here April 14 at the behest of the Oklahoma Restaurant Association, says the waitress and waiter business should be more dignified.
 "To begin with, he doesn't like the term 'waitress,' but prefers

"sales ladies" or maybe food merchandisers.
 He thinks the worst offense of waitresses is indifference.
 "Customers like to have their wants anticipated," he says. "When a food dispenser (that's the waitress) serves a cup of coffee, she should push the sugar bowl with a touch of her client (that's the customer) and give the impression she is not only anxious but even eager to serve him further."
 "She must guard against slovenly poise, frizzy hair, unnecessary conversation, a forbidding expression, and, of all things, gum chewing."
 "She should be able to describe the food in a manner to make the client drool with anticipation. That takes knowledge of food."

K. C. Two-Tone Cake To Be Featured In Cooking School



1/2 cup butter
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 4 egg yolks
 3 cups flour
 3 teaspoons K. C. Baking Powder
 Method: Sift together five times, the flour, baking powder and salt. Cream butter, add sugar slowly, add egg yolks carefully beaten, then milk and flour alternately. Divide in two parts.
 To part 1, add 2 egg whites, beaten stiff.
 To part 2, add chocolate (melt over hot water, not boiling). Let cool, then fold in the whites of two eggs beaten stiff.
 Bake in separate pans at 350 to 375 degrees, 20 to 30 minutes.

Michigan Expects a Record Iron Output

LANSING, Mich.—Michigan state geologists expect the national defense program to smash all production records which the state shares for iron and copper, during the next 12 months.
 Officials reported that Michigan iron production rose from 9,159,222 tons in 1935 to 12,671,000 tons last year, while the national output rose 43 per cent to a total of 73,806,000 tons.
 Michigan iron ore shipments in 1940 also showed an increase over those of the previous year as 13,446,000 tons worth \$40,769,000 were moved compared to 11,238,605 tons worth \$37,026,665 in 1939.
 Michigan copper production rose 3 per cent during the year, to total 45,100 tons with only a few upper peninsula mines operating. An anticipated boost of the price was expected to increase the 1941 copper mining activities even further.

U. S. Will Open a Mail Fraud Case In Detroit Soon

 DETROIT, March—Trial of the first of three mail fraud conspiracy cases prepared by the criminal division of the department of Justice against Michigan's wealthy Republican leader, Frank D. McKay, and others, is scheduled to begin in U. S. district court here March 26.
 McKay was named in three indictments returned by a special federal grand jury which has been in existence since last March. He was charged with defrauding Edsel B. Ford of the Ford Motor Company of nearly \$10,000, by presenting an allegedly faked campaign expense bill.
 McKay also was charged with participating in a \$500,000 liquor conspiracy by which 16 national known liquor wholesalers obtained favorable treatment from the state liquor commission and with attempting to defraud the city of Grand Rapids, McKay's home, of \$300,000 in a waterworks bond deal.
 Other defendants in the liquor conspiracy are William H. McKeighen, former Mayor of Flint and sometimes referred to as McKay's right hand in state Republican politics, Fred Ehrmann, secretary of the state liquor commission, and nine other persons. All Michigan liquor retailers get their stock from state warehouses which are kept filled by purchases directed by the liquor commission.
 The Grand Rapids waterworks case involved McKay, Stranahan Harris & Co., Toledo, O., bond house and two of the commission officials. The indictment described McKay as "an influential and well-known political figure in the state of Michigan who was secretly employed by Stranahan, Harris & Co., to use his political influence and control in promoting the business and interests" of the bond house in Michigan. It charged McKay had secretly received in excess of \$325,000 in fees for services from the company since 1931.

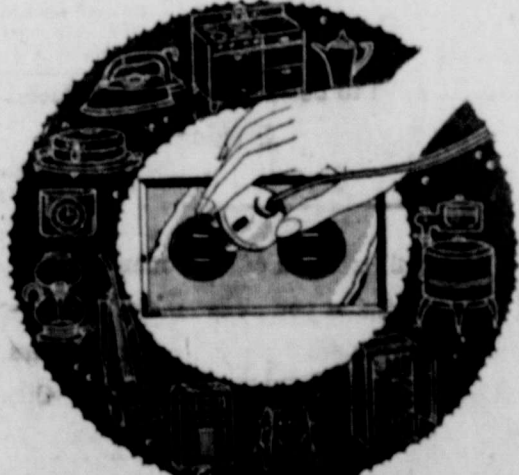

Is poison less deadly because it is chocolate-coated? Are chains and shackles less oppressive if gilded? Of course not. But those truths must be only now gradually dawning on many of the people of conquered Europe. No doubt there were millions of people in central Europe who believed that there were worse things than Nazi occupation; that life could go on, and that somehow, after the war was over, independence might be restored.

But there are increasing dark hints today that Germany plans never to restore independence to any of the countries it has conquered, even those occupied for reasons given out at the time as purely military. And one need not accept at face value the deported speech of Minister Walter Darre to envision a new Dark Continent in which subject peoples and "inferior races" shall labor hopelessly forever at menial work for whatever pay will barely sustain life, to provide raw materials and food for the "master race" whose Berlin would be a sort of capitol of the world.

Studies and reports by the Department of Commerce have now reinforced private information on the means taken to loot the conquered countries with velvet fingers. With military control over the banking and currency of conquered peoples, the Nazis simply debase their money in terms of German marks, thus enabling themselves to "buy" in conquered lands anything they want at any price they chose to set. That includes not only producer goods, but mines, factories and farms. Huge "army of occupation costs" are being assessed on all countries which have been given the "advantage" of German "protection." Exports are completely controlled from Germany. Banks and private safe-deposit boxes were simply looted.

The very people who probably hoped to save more of their property and position by yielding rather than fighting are now being despoiled.

Though they are being robbed by modern methods, yet it is robbery. Though they are being enslaved in gilded shackles, yet it is slavery. Even those still technically free have only the freedom of a lapdog on a leash.

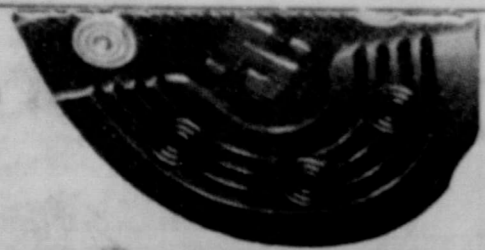

British Navy—

(Continued from page 1)

The British have more of this class of warship now than at the start of the war.

Claims by Germany that British control of the seas has been destroyed can have been made only to stimulate home morale. There is not the slightest room for believing the axis can break down the British blockade under any future condition now foreseeable.

Neither by submarine nor airplane attack has the Axis made any serious inroads on the power of British warships engaged in blockade duty. Four British cruisers have been lost but at least twenty-five new ones have been or are being completed since the start of the war.

The British have lost 36 destroyers, but the fifty American destroyers delivered to Great Britain have much more than made up the difference. In addition, about 25 destroyers and torpedo boats were under construction at the outbreak of the war and it is certain there have been additions since then.

The German assertion that British sea power has been broken cannot refer to destruction of mercantile shipping. Though that has been severe, Mr. Alexander said last Wednesday that more than two-thirds of the losses have been made up by new domestic construction, acquisitions abroad and six urees of enemy ships. Between eight hundred and one thousand ships are still using British ports weekly.

The coming spring and summer may see an intensified axis attack on British shipping but that is in the realm of speculation. Counter-measures are being prepared by the British Navy and air command, and it is known that during recent months, losses of merchantmen have dropped to little more than one-half of the war's average.

Certainly, as conditions exist today, the British Navy has command of the sea and the axis is held within the continent of Europe, unable to break through to the outer world. With a speed-up of American shipbuilding for British account, Herr Hitler must have small hope that he can crush the British mercantile fleet.

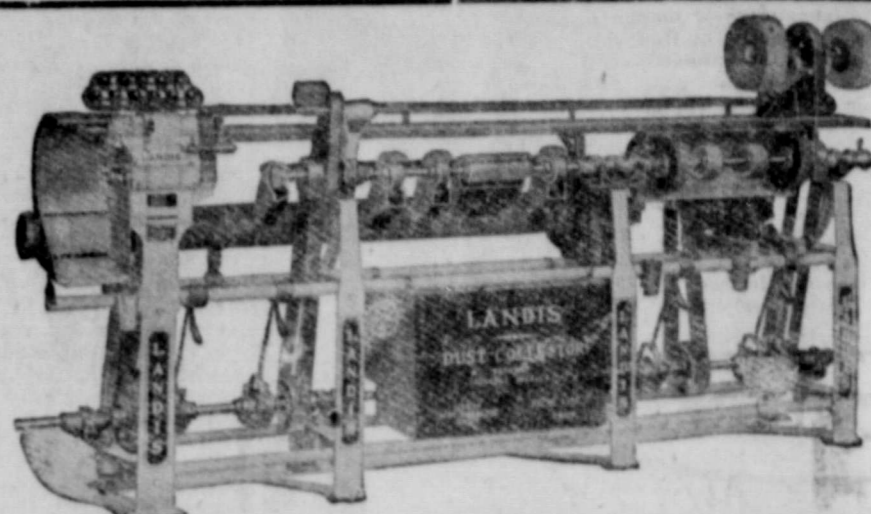

She prefaced her remarks with the statement, "It is a pity that with over 100,000 Sisters in these United States more do not know about

"Man, what a jolt!" he told the priest on his way to his car. "Say are all nuns like that? Why, she is a real woman."

In a Mid-Western town of about 2,000 inhabitants, the public and Catholic high schools were in a continuously antagonistic mood. The annual basketball championship game was to be played, and promised to be a grim affair. A few days before the event, Sister Erma of the Catholic high telephoned the principal of the public high, asking him if he would be kind enough to call on her. He did so at once.

The Sister said: "Mr. Edwards, I want to speak to you about that

basketball game. It seems to bid fair to become a religious battle instead of an athletic event. I've heard of some very unpleasant things that have been said to our students; but of course, I hear only one side. I'm sure they say enough in return. Now, if your school wins the game—and no doubt it will, I do not consider that the Catholic Church has received a blow; and if we should chance to win, it will be no victory for the Vatican. I can't see what religion has to do with it, except that the moral training we give ought to make our boys cleaner and better sportmen."

Mr. Edwards enthusiastically stretched out his hand. "Shake on that," said he. "I can't tell you what a relief it is to hear you talk that way! Why, say, you're not a bit as I expected, after all I've heard about you folks."

There you have a few stories that can be duplicated by thousands. There is no Catholic convent or monastery that anything to hide, no tunneling from the priesthouses to convents. Any visitor who comes in friendly spirit will always be welcome.

As to the dark and mysterious secret of these places, there is only one: These holy women have given up the world and all pleasures to devote themselves day and night, to prayer, meditation and penance, in order to help you and me to intercede for sinners and wayward children of God, that He may have mercy on us. They make up for our shortcomings and transgressions.

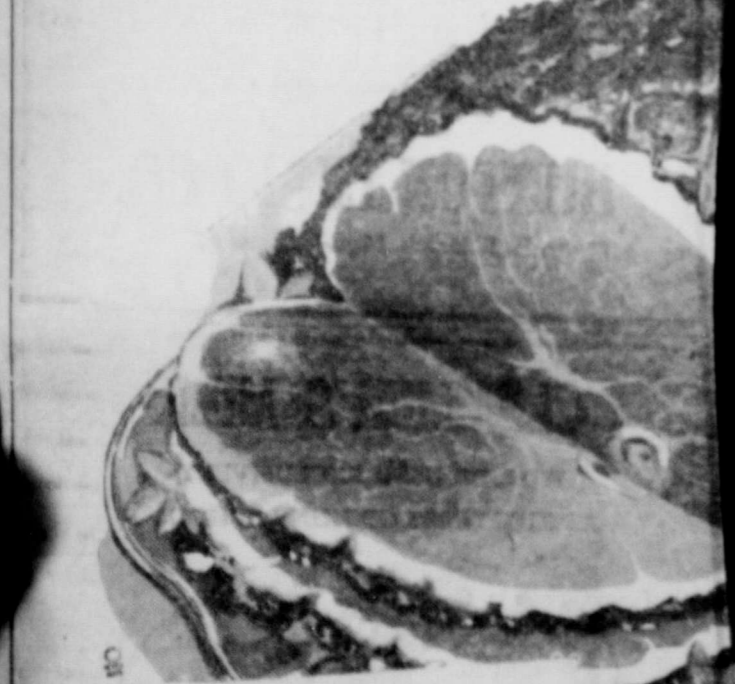
