### ENGLAND EXPECTS U.S. PLANES WILL ARRIVE IN TIME FOR SPRING DRIVE

Great Britain today declared her confidence that American fighting planes will cross the Atlantic in time, and in sufficient numbers, to meet the challenge of an Axis spring offensive, which appears to be gaining momentum already.

The British assertion was made by Air Minister Sir Archibald Sinclair, who said Britain's air strength is now greater in relation to Germany's than at the start of mass air attacks upon Britain last August.

Sinclair said German propagandists claimed that aid from the United States would arrive too late to help Britain in the coming battles.

"But," said Sinclair, "I tell the House of Commons these formidable aircraft will get here in time."

Meanwhile Berlin, Rome and Tokyo declared in a chorus today that an answer to United States passage of the lend-lease bill would be afforded by a visit to the Axis capitals of Japan's foreign minister, Matsuo.

Berlin talked frankly of military plans to be discussed by Matsuo, Hitler and Goering.

The Balkans were quieter today, but some observers believed that it might possibly be just the lull before the storm, which is expected to break out at any time.

### Young People Now Have Advantages Formerly Unknown

ABLENE, Texas—Youth gets a break. Young people have one more advantage over the youth of past generations. Specifically, they have advantage under the Federal old-age and survivors insurance system established by the Social Security Act. Young persons just entering covered employment are included in the system during their entire working life. From the beginning, they build toward a future income through the crediting of such wages to their old-age survivors insurance accounts, according to W. O. King, manager of the Abilene office of the Social Security Board.

"Many a parent who buys insurance for his child and who carefully preserves the premium receipts does not realize there is financial value in the child's social security account number," King continued. "Parents whose children were employed for the first time during the recent holiday season should see that their children keep their account numbers. Many of these same children will be employed again during the summer vacation and will need that same number."

All wages in employment covered by the law are reported by the employer who is required to indicate the account number. However, in computing benefit payments in old age, only the three from age 22 is counted. "That is how youth gets a break," King explained. For illustration, a 14-year-old boy works extra as a delivery boy while attending high school and college. At \$15 per month, upon graduation from college just as he reaches age 22, he will have received \$1,440. Should he die a year and a half later, leaving dependents, their benefits would be calculated on the basis of his average monthly wage, which, although counting only three months since age 22, will include all wages regardless of when earned.

Thus, the \$1,440 paid before the youth reached age 22 would be added to wages subsequently paid prior to death and divided by the 18 months elapsed after age 22 to find the average monthly wage on which all benefits are computed.

"When parents realize the substantial value of their children's social security account number," King added, "they will endeavor to press upon their children the importance of keeping them."

### Methodism's Cradle In Texas Will Be Rebuilt This Year

SAN AUGUSTINE, Tex.—Historic McMahan's Chapel, the cradle of Texas Methodism, is to be rebuilt.

Through the contributions of Methodists throughout the eastern part of the state, a church structure to serve "as a fitting memorial to pioneer Methodists" will be constructed soon at the site of the chapel, nine miles east of San Augustine.

In addition, a summer encampment ground adjoining the chapel is under consideration. Twenty acres of land for the purpose were donated by Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Noble of San Augustine.

The original log structure, one of the oldest Protestant churches in Texas, was founded in 1828 by the Rev. Littleton Fowler, presiding elder of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who also helped lay the foundation for free schools in the state.

The rebuilding program will not disturb one of the strangest tombs in Texas, a tall marble slab that rises through the floor of the old church. The body of the Rev. Fowler lies buried beneath. The slab will not be moved. The original log building was replaced in 1870 by a new wooden church structure, and the planned memorial will replace it.

The building of McMahan's Chapel in 1828 followed the organization of a religious society at the home of Col. Samuel B. McMahan in 1823. At that time Mexican authorities kept vigilant watch over the Texas colonists to keep them from organizing Protestant churches. But, there was little restriction, however, on camp meetings and religious societies were permitted to be organized.

The Rev. James P. Stevenson came to Texas in 1833 and was a guest of McMahan for several days. It was he who organized a small group of worshippers with McMahan as their class leader. It is believed that this was the first organized Methodist unit in the state. About five years later McMahan's Chapel, 30x40 feet in size, was built on land donated by Col. McMahan.

### West Texans Convince Legislators They Need More Consideration In State As Solons Make Junket

AUSTIN, Tex.—El Pasoans and citizens of Brewster County did a good job of convincing members of the House of Representatives that Far West Texas deserves greater consideration in state government.

Thirty legislators, most of them members of the house appropriations committee, took a three-day trip to El Paso, with a side trip into Big Bend Park.

One immediate reaction was passage in the house of a general bill to permit counties to use part of their ad valorem tax receipts for advertising. El Paso County had such a fund under a local bill, which the attorney general declared unconstitutional.

El Pasoans pointed out the value of the tourist trade to their area and entreated the legislators to help in the development of a swanky new dude ranch-hotel which is catering to the winter trade that now is centered in Arizona and California.

The visitors also were taken to the Texas College of Mines and to the El Paso Valley farming district, for which a farm experiment station has been authorized but no appropriation made.

At Alpine, the legislators were shown through Sul Ross College, supporters of that school asked for several improvements, including money for an animal husbandry building. Livestock for the department already has been donated by ranchers in the highland country around Alpine.

Sul Ross began as a teachers' college, and later was extended into a general liberal arts school. But the two departments with the most apparent future are animal husbandry and art. The Big Bend area and western country attracts artists from as far away as New York and Philadelphia, and legislators were surprised at the quality of the students' work, particularly that of a senior girl, Sarah Tennant, from Shafter, Texas.

Speaking for the animal husbandry building, one rancher told the committee: "Us fellows want to send our kids to Sul Ross, but a guy on a cow ranch don't want to make his boy be a school teacher."

Alpine citizens took the legislators by automobile on a 250-mile

trip through Big Bend Park. They stopped at beautiful Santa Helena Canyon where only a ribbon of the Rio Grande separates the 1,800-foot cliffs of Mexico from the cliffs of Texas. Luncheon was served at a CCC camp farther into the park; and Dr. Ross A. Maxwell of Santa Fe, N. M., regional geologist for the National Park Service, explained why the Big Bend area is a "geological island."

The strange upheaval of the earth that caused the mountains and the lowlands of the Big Bend is a result of cross-cutting the Appalachian mountain system with the Rocky mountain chain. Nowhere else in North America do the systems cross. The Rocky Mountains begin in Western Canada and the Appalachians in New England.

A bill to appropriate \$1,500,000 for buying additional land for Big Bend park has been introduced in the legislature. The park already has 225,000 acres and proposed purchases are to expand it to 887,000 acres. Most of the land to be included is valued at \$1 to \$2 an acre, and the proposed boundaries were drawn to exclude known mineral areas.

The U. S. Park Service has promised to develop and maintain the Big Bend Park as a national project as soon as the acreage is obtained and the Mexican government has offered 1,000,000 acres just across the Rio Grande to be included in an international park.

The greatest drawback to obtaining the land is the reluctance of owners to surrender their mineral rights. Quicksilver, coal, and silver have been found in the area, much of which still is unexplored.

The Federal government refuses to accept any land grants for National parks without complete title, and at least one Texas legislator thinks it would be worthwhile for the state to take its \$1,500,000 to improve the area, allow owners to keep their mineral rights and even to continue living on the land. That, he said, would provide a local color that could be obtained in no other way.

Frank Quinn of the State Parks Board estimated that the Big Bend Park, when completed, would repay the state's investment.

### O'DANIEL SEEKS ACTION AS HALF-WAY POINT IN LEGISLATURE REACHED

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel, who fled from the world of trade to twist the tails of professional politicians with such success that he became chief executive of the state—and entitled, perhaps, to a union card as a working politician—has thrown the fat shap-dab into the fire. It's a sort of halfway station this week in the 129 day life of the legislature and the governor chose the occasion to precipitate or pose at least a possible deadlock conflict between the legislative and executive branches of the government. The legislature can keep on keeping on after the elapse of 129 days if it chooses by vote so to do but at a salary per member reduced from \$10 to \$5 a day.

Governor O'Daniel wants immediate, responsive and favorable action in the legislature on his proposal of an appropriation of \$26,500,000 to pay the old folks and sundry others entitled under the Texas spirit of benevolence to grants from the state. He wants too a tax producing measure that will return to the state treasury something like \$50,000,000 a year.

He made all of this plain when he addressed the people of Texas over the radio Sunday morning in the curiously enchanting O'Daniel blending of God, mother and state.

The legislature, in which only the House of Representatives is empowered to initiate revenue producing legislation, until Sunday at least was bent on a course of applying the squeeze to a few natural resources and industries to supply around \$15,000,000 of new revenues. They believed that extended and economical government could be achieved by such a step. They were as of that moment determinedly opposed to a sales tax or a transaction tax such as has been proposed by Governor O'Daniel in both of his inaugural addresses.

For all of the fact that it has consumed nearly half of its allotted time, this Forty-seventh Legislature is still a young institution. It is a virile institution. There are some road signs that may indicate that some men with the government every year in gasoline taxes alone. An ordinary out-of-state tourist, he said, would travel 1,500 miles in Texas, buy 100 gallons of gasoline (state tax), and spend \$5 to \$10 a day for each member of his party.

El Paso's Sheriff Chris F. Fox provided one of the trip's humorous highlights when he served as master of ceremonies at a luncheon given in that city. Fox asked all visiting legislators to stand.

"All I can say is: God save America," Fox commented.

Ernest Boyett, house sergeant at arms, decided at one stop that he would improve his international relations by bidding farewell to his host in his native language. "Adios, amigos," said Boyett.

Replied the Latin-American: "So long, Buddy."

### New Test Is On Schedule For The Carbon Pool

### House Sends Tax Bill To Senate For Action There

AUSTIN, Mar. 11.—The Texas House of Representatives sent to the State Senate today an omnibus tax bill which is estimated will raise more than \$30,000,000 a year additional revenue, mostly from taxes on natural resources.

Spurred by Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel's criticism of the omnibus tax bill as reported from a house committee, the house rejected the governor's proposal to act first on social security appropriations. He has asked that \$26,000,000 in state assets be frozen for social security purposes.

The house then went to work on the omnibus tax bill, which almost tripled its revenue raising features.

### BOMBERS ARE POISED FOR A QUICK FLIGHT

Tanks and Machine Guns Are Expected To Be Included in Initial Shipment of Arms.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—Congressional action on the British lend-lease bill was completed today as the house finally passed the senate-approved measure. The senate had previously voted on the house version of the bill, adding some amendments, which the house quickly adopted.

President Roosevelt was prepared to ask for \$7,000,000,000 with which to carry out the initial phase of help for Great Britain, it was reported today.

The president is expected to sign the bill late today and to give clearance for an undetermined number of American bombers, now poised for flight across the Atlantic for delivery to the Royal Air Force.

Well informed sources said the administration is preparing to release a large number of American bombers within the next few days, though the number was not revealed. This was expected to be the first phase of the lend-lease program as advocated by President Roosevelt, and for which the lend-lease will now provides as soon as it is signed.

The immediate program of British aid is expected to involve also, transfer of a large number of light tanks and machine guns for use by the British forces.

## It Won't Happen Here

The fact that definite hemisphere defense measures are being taken jointly with Mexico is the best news for a long time.  
For two years, one country after another in Europe has been mowed down simply because it would not join with others for defense. If Norway, Sweden and Finland had stood firmly together—? If Czechoslovakia, Poland, Hungary, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Bulgaria and Greece could have formed a joint defense—? If France, England and Russia had stood firmly behind Czechoslovakia—?  
But no, Poland refused to help Czechoslovakia; picked pieces from her carcass instead. The Finns made their stand alone. France and England were not ready to support Czechoslovakia. Nobody cared when Albania was invaded. Belgium and Holland insisted on standing alone. Nowhere was there any of the coherence which small nations must have if they are to defend themselves in these blitz-days. One after another they went down; countries which, if united, might have made a stand, and might be free today.

This is not going to happen to America. Already Canada and the United States have joined in defense plans which redouble each country's defensive strength. Now Mexico indicates that it will also join in such plans.  
It is unlikely that there will be formal treaties. There is none in the case of Canada. But every mother's son and daughter in the United States knows that an attack on continental Canada is an attack on the United States, and that it will be resisted in precisely the same way. That is a more powerful force than any treaty. So it will be with Mexico.  
It is true that defense arrangements with Mexico may be harder to make than with Canada. The history of these relations in the past is not so happy. There is a greater distrust to be overcome. Nevertheless it can be overcome, and it is being overcome.  
The United States has given a clear demonstration in the past 10 years that it has no desire for Mexican soil. The remarkable forbearance shown by the United States in recent disputes is clear evidence of deed, not word, that this is so.

We have a better way, we believe. We believe that strong, free Canada, and a strong, free Mexico, are better defenses in war, better friends and neighbors in peace, than any "protectorate" or satrapy. This goes for all Western Hemisphere countries.  
Europe's free countries were divided—and one by one, they fell.  
The free countries of the Americas are uniting, and united, they can stand confident and unafraid.

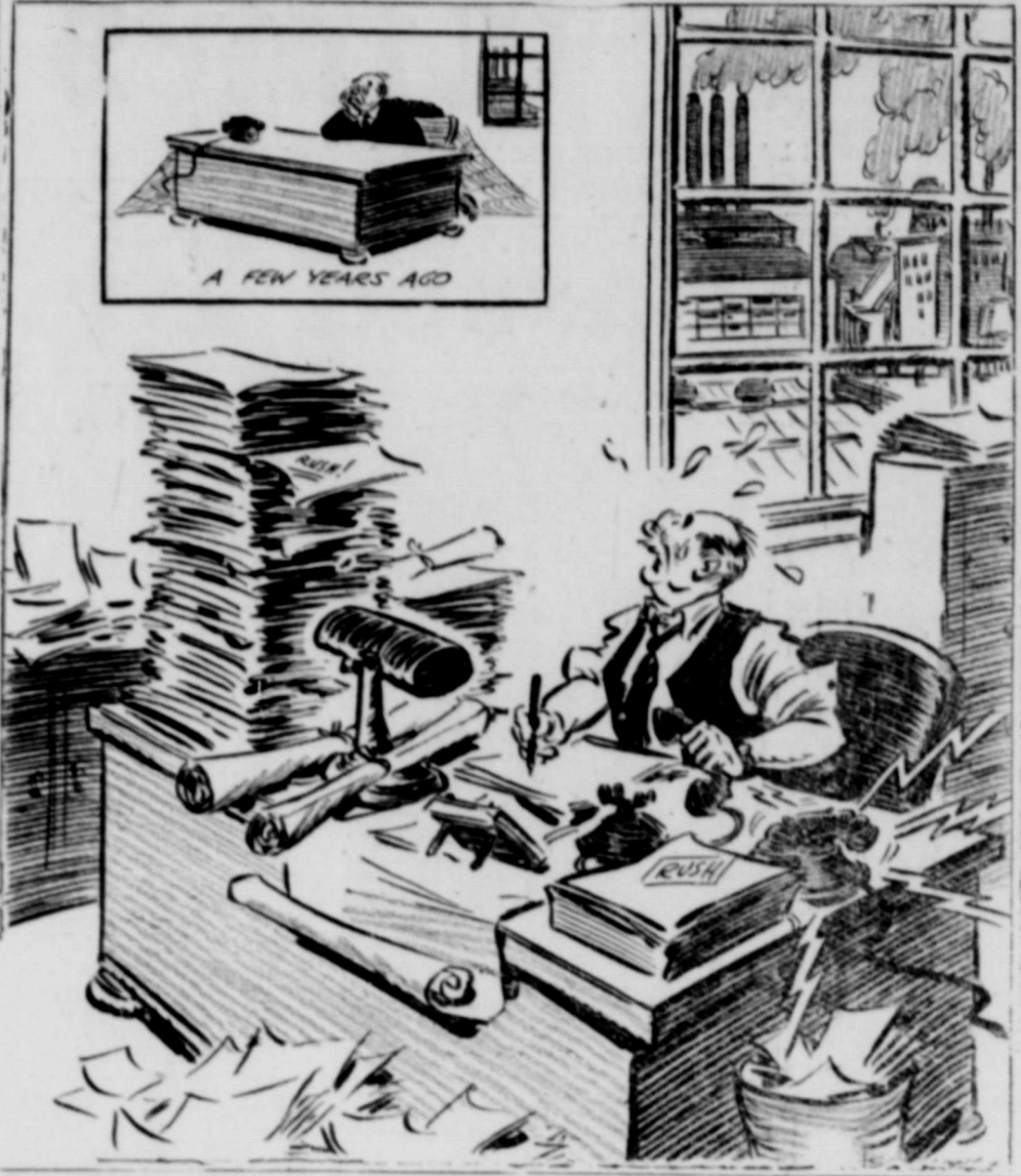



"Clarence," she said lightly at last. "It's the same old trouble. Tired business men have it with

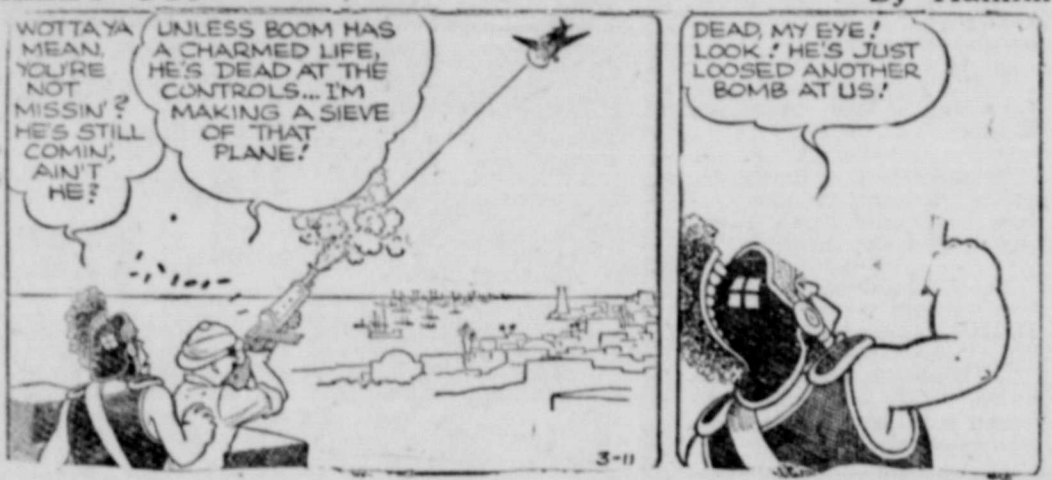



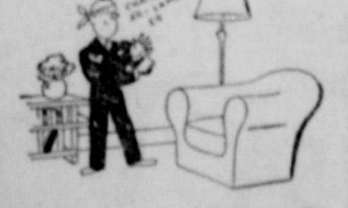

## "Holland-in-Asia" Isn't Napping



### Prepares Defense With That Typical Dutch Efficiency

By J. PERCIVAL, JR., NEA Service Correspondent  
BATAVIA, Java—If there is a "surprise invasion" of the Netherlands East Indies, it is the invaders who may be surprised—not the Dutch.

For the government and the peoples of Holland-in-Asia are firmly and proudly resolved not to suffer the fate of Holland-in-Europe. They have molded themselves into a strong military power, and their policy is one of extremely watchful waiting as the

Netherlands Indies officer cadets are trained to overcome obstacles in record time. Left, above, cadets practice passing through barbed wire; right, they practice scaling a high wall. These tactics are particularly valuable in jungle warfare.

Japanese prowled through southeastern Asiatic waters today. Hundreds of air raid listening posts equipped with wireless, telephone, "elephant ears" and powerful binoculars have been erected throughout the Netherlands Indies archipelago to warn the defense and A. R. P. centers of the approach of enemy aircraft.

An air attack on the necklaces of islands, it has been presumed, might come from newly established bases in Indo-China, Borneo or the Philippines.

The menace from ship-borne aircraft has not been overlooked. The Dutch have acquired Curtiss Hawk fighters and Lockheed and Glenn Martin bombers—outnumbering many times Australia's air strength, incidentally—to counter-act just such a move.

63,000 A. R. P. WORKERS  
The locations of the hundreds of listening posts is a national secret. In confidence I was shown a complete plan. All stations are numbered. They are arranged over Java in circles. Transparent maps showing fire fighting, decontamination, gasmask and ambulance centers are fitted on top of the key map.

There are 50,000 A. R. P. workers in Java alone. About 8000 have been enlisted in Batavia. A. R. P. education lectures are printed in Dutch and Malay.

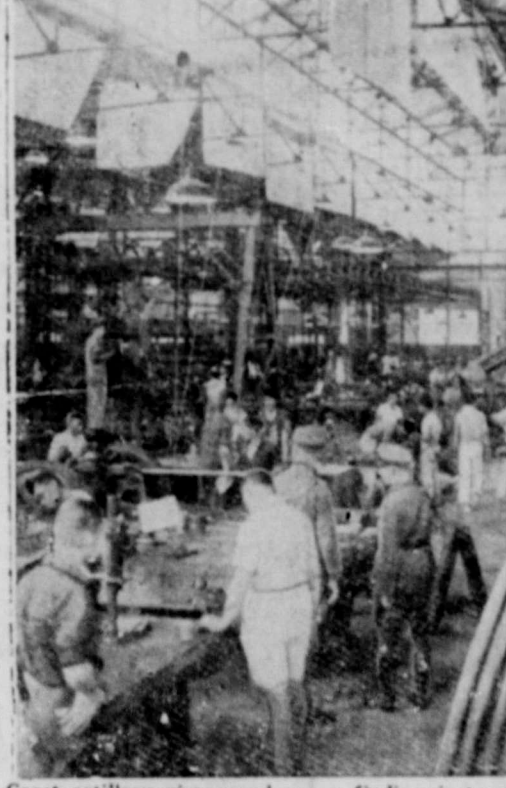
Special attention has been given by the Dutch to the protection of the native kampongs (groups of huts) in the rice fields, and desmas (series of groups of huts). The natives are warned by Malay gongs.

The Government has erected shelters for those caught by raiders in the streets or in the markets.

MAKE-BELIEVE 5TH COLUMN  
Local industry is making gasmasks, and these are available in thousands. Special coverings for electric lights in homes and business premises are being made locally. These can be manipulated for partial and complete black-outs.

Both Batavia and Sourabaya have regular black-outs in cooperation with Royal Netherlands Indies Air Force exercises. Those who do not comply are fined. The main danger so far has been to avoid "dark areas" surrounded by some lights, which would be a complete giveaway to a bombing squadron as something which is being suspiciously hidden.

"Fifth column practice drills" are staged with great frequency and realism in Batavia. On the night before a drill, selected groups of "make-believe" Fifth

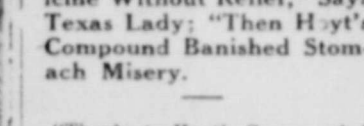

### Salesmanship Not Navy Need Except For the Recruiter

Salesmanship is not one of the professions advertised as taught in the U. S. Navy but Navy recruiters must now be good salesmen in order to fill their rapidly expanding monthly quotas of voluntary enlistments for six-year periods against competition with the one-year Selective Service Act and expanding industry, C. I. Wylie, in charge of the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station at Abilene said today.

Navy recruiting is now based on selling the prospective applicant a desire for a career which affords opportunity to learn a useful trade or profession with good pay and frequent promotions and retirement on half pay at an early age, Wylie said.

Resistance to the Navy's longer enlistment period is usually overcome by the recruiter with a sales talk something as follows: "You say that you would like to enlist in the Navy but you can't see yourself signing up for six years? "Suppose one of the larger corporations offered you a job for six years with a starting salary of \$21.00 per month while in training for the first four months, a guaranteed increase to \$36.00 when this training period of finished, further promotions just about as fast as you can qualify, living expenses, free medical and dental attention when needed, lots of free entertainment, travel and a guarantee of no lay offs due to illness, strikes and dull times? "Suppose that while you are still wondering if you are dreaming, you are told that if you stay with this job for 20 years you may then quit and draw pay, in most cases amounting to \$63.00 per month, for the next ten years while you are working for yourself or someone else, with an increase ten years later bringing your retirement pay up to a maximum of \$110.25 per month for the rest of your life? Would you take this job? I took one like it quite a few years ago. This is what the Navy offers you today if you can qualify.

"You say you want to marry and have a home before 20 years have passed. Fine. That is a normal desire. The Navy does not accept married men for first enlistment and discourages marriage of men in the lower pay ratings. However, a large percentage of Navy petty officers are married and have happy homes at the home port of their ship. When
