School Bus Driver Must Be 21 Under New License Law

AUSTIN, Tex.—Under the new Texas driver's license law, no person under the age of 21 may

drive a school bus or any vehicle operating as a public or common carrier of persons, it was pointed out today by Col. Homer Garrison Jr., State Police director. Many persons under the age of 21 operated school buses under the old law by having their legal disability removed in court, but this practice is forbidden under the new law.

A commercial or chauffeur's license may be obtained by a person between the ages of 16 and 18 only with the written consent of his father. If he has no father, consent of the following persons is accepted in the order named: his mother, guardian, employer, or the judge of the county in which he resides.

The person signing the application of a minor having a license may thereafter have the license cancelled by filing with the Department of Public Safety a written request under oath. The signer is thereby relieved from any liability by reason of having signed the application on account of any subsequent neglect or wilful misconduct of the minor in operating a motor vehicle.

If the signer dies before the license reaches 18 years of age, the license will be automatically cancelled.

Application for any license must be made under oath, which is administered without charge by agents of the Department of Public Safety. The applicant is required to reveal the details of any refusal, suspension or revocation of a previous license.

But the Struggle Goes On

Yugoslavia has been beaten to earth in less than two weeks by the Nazi juggernaut. A few shake sad heads and mutter, "This is the end!"

It is not the end. There is Turkey yet to conquer. There is the British navy and there is the invasion of England. There is the wide dominion of an Empire unsubdued. Disaster in Yugoslavia, Greece and even in Egypt and the whole Mediterranean would not end even the military phase of the war. Once again the Germans like the Japanese, have won the battle, but the end of the war is as far away as ever. It must be disheartening to win and win, and yet attain no victory.

Victory did not come to the Germans by the conquest of Yugoslavia.

Victory will not come though Greece is beaten, though the German panzer divisions park beside the Dardanelles.

Victory will not come if Turkey be beaten next. It will not come through Suez fall, and though the German hosts reach the long-dreamed-of Bagdad.

Victory will not come though Gibraltar fall, and Aden.

Victory will not come even though England should lie prostrate in a welter of its own blood. That might end the immediate military phase of the war, but the real war would go on.

The reason is that this war is more than a military campaign. It is a war of ideals, a war of the spirit, and it is here that the Germans cannot win; it is here that there is no victory. They can win battles, they can conquer countries, but they have nothing to put in the place of the spirit they have beaten down but not slain.

Charles Lindbergh, for example, doesn't understand this. He can speak brutally of "the long list of prostrate nations who . . . jumped into war hastily and unprepared." Excepting only Italy (the one country which could truly be said to have "jumped in") every one was successively presented with the awful alternative of the highwayman, "Stand and deliver—or fight." To Lindbergh, the decision to fight rather than surrender is nothing better than to "jump into war hastily."

Behind the Nazi war of arms, itself still far from war, is a war of the spirit, a war for the souls of men on ground chosen by the Nazis themselves. It is this war that the Nazis cannot win; it is this war that will rob them ultimately of the fruits of victory.

The will to freedom can not be crushed out of mankind by a thousand panzer divisions.

**Persons Under 14
Can't Legally Drive
An Auto In Texas**

AUSTIN, Tex.—No person under 14 years of age may legally drive any motor vehicle in Texas, it was pointed out today by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., State Police director.

In order for a person between the ages of 14 and 16 to obtain a license, he must receive a written recommendation from his county judge to the Department of Public Safety. No person under 16 may be licensed either as a commercial operator or chauffeur.

Licenses are forbidden to all persons habitually addicted to drink or narcotics, and to any person who has been adjudged insane, an idiot, imbecile, or feeble-minded, and whose recovery has not been certified by judicial decree by the superintendent of the institution from which he has been released.

Persons suffering from mental

or physical disability or disease which would prevent proper control of a motor vehicle may be refused a license. Nor will a license be granted to any person who fails to pass an examination, which includes a standard vision test, a written examination on safety laws and rules, and a practical driving demonstration. The law also forbids issuance of a license to any person who cannot read and understand highway signs in the English language.

The Department of Public Safety is charged with the responsibility of denying licenses to any person believed to be inimical to public safety. The word inimical is defined as being hostile, unfriendly, antagonistic, or opposed, and this clause is interpreted to mean that licenses should be denied any person whose attitude is one of antagonism to the laws and common sense rules of driving.

**Harvard To Stress
Posture Training**

By Various Years
CAMBRIDGE, Mass.—Harvard is conducting a campaign to have future graduates with "heads up, chins in, chests out," according to Norman W. Fradd, assistant physical education director.

Students undergo posture training to prevent the bulging curves common to many middle-aged men. Fradd says simple corrective exercises while young will insure better posture in later years since most body imbalance is fairly fixed at 25.

Rounded shoulders pull the chest in and throw the abdomen out, Fradd reports. This causes a "sway back curve" in the lower spine, a forward off-balance tipping of the pelvis and a consequent sag of internal organs.

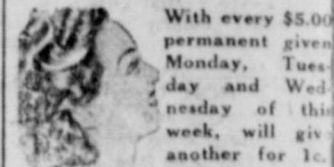

Although they haven't seen each other for years, they correspond regularly.

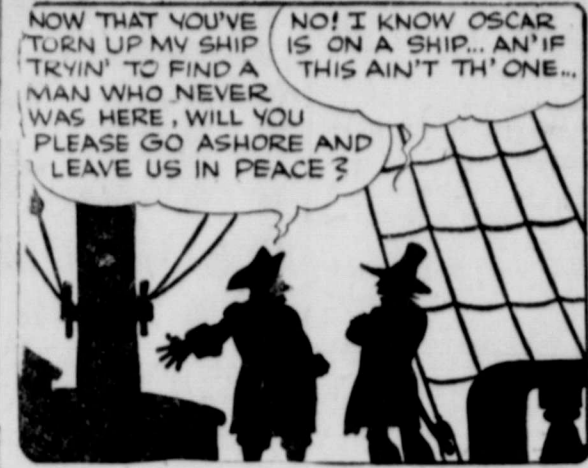
"Fame hasn't changed Cordell," George said. "A man in overalls means just as much to him as someone in a plug hat and spats."

Cost of Killing In War Has Soared In World War No. 2

TARENTUM, Pa.—The cost of killing a soldier has increased from \$50 in the time of Julius Caesar to between \$50,000 and \$75,000 in the present war, according to H. V. Churchill, an industrial chemist.

Churchill told a meeting here the expense of war-time killing has risen steadily through the centuries, with a tremendously great advance occurring between the World War and today.

By the time of Napoleon, the cost had become \$1,500 for each man killed, the chemist said, and during the World War the figure was about \$2,500. He added that Napoleon's advisers and allies thought the cost far too high in their time.

"The development of mechanical devices and improvement of machinery has lifted a great deal of hard physical labor from the men's shoulders but military men are turning this machinery to war purposes instead of using it for peaceful pursuits," he declared.

Block Signals To Spot Air Liners

ST. LOUIS—Airline passengers in the near future may ride in transports protected by a signal system of "automatic blocks."

Paul E. Richter, executive vice president of Transcontinental and Western Air, Inc., has announced that the signal system for planes in flight has been developed by TWA engineers after years of study.

The device is operated electrically and will permit flight dispatches to have a visual and automatic record of transports operating in any given area under their control. At present the dispatchers depend upon radio advices from pilots to record the positions of planes aloft.

Blocks Represent Planes
Under the new plan a panel with a series of tracks, each representing a directional airway, is set up before the dispatcher. Each track contains an electrically driven worm with speed regulated by a time to conform to the ground speed of the plane. A small brass block representing the plane operates on the track.

When the plane leaves the terminal the block is set on the track. The speed of the worm is regulated by the pilot's flight plan. Slots on the panel represent check points on the airway.

Each slot is set slightly behind the check point to allow the pilot a few moments to report. If he fails to report the block drops into the slot and an alarm bell rings. Then the dispatcher queries the plane as to location or difficulties.

Report Clear Way
If the plane reports on time at the check point positions, the dispatcher closes the slot, allowing the block to pass on to the next check point position.

When a plane passes the block, the block is closed for a certain time to any plane following.

Richter said the invention will enable the flight superintendent to keep a positive double check on the position of each plane—one from the dispatch board and one from the pilot. He said the device probably would be installed in operation offices in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco with a master board set up in the headquarters office in Kansas City.

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Theory Is Revised On Iron In Milk

BERKELEY, Cal.—University of California scientists have upset

long-lived theories concerning iron in the milk of cows. They reported iron begins to appear in the milk within five minutes after iron-containing food is eaten by the cow, thus refuting earlier theories that it takes considerable time for a cow to break down her food and make

iron available to the lactating cells. Dr. Lowell Erf, research fellow in the radiation laboratory, conducted experiments with the use of radioactive atoms of iron from the university's cyclotron. He discovered that enzymes, armies of tiny agents which break down foods and liberate iron for the body, apparently work at speeds heretofore unsuspected. Working with two cows, Dr. Erf discovered iron apparently is taken up by the lactating cells only when the level of iron in the blood plasma is high. The iron, after being eaten by the cow, is carried through the lining of the stomach to the plasma, the fatty part of the blood. The iron remains in the plasma only a short time and is then transferred into hemoglobin, an element of the red corpuscles. Only during the short time the

iron is in the plasma is it available to the lactating cells. For this reason, Dr. Erf explained, it is necessary the cow receive a diet rich in iron in order that the milk have a sufficient quantity of the mineral. If the average cow, producing four liters of milk a day, is fed a 10-gram oral dose of iron each 24 hours, Dr. Erf said, there will be enough iron in the milk for a growing child consuming a liter of milk a day.

U. S. Is Urged To Deepen James River

RICHMOND, Va.—The War Department has been asked to dredge the James River channel and maintain it at standard depth between Richmond and Hopewell, Va., after several boats had been grounded in the stream within a few weeks.

Gamble Bowers, Richmond public works director, also is asking the city council for \$30,000 to dredge the turning basin at the deepwater terminal here. Bowers said silt had been filling the river channel slowly and was hindering navigation of large vessels.

A Gloomy Cavern Keeps An Icy Chill

LETCWORTH PARK, N. Y.—An unnamed cave in Letcworth Park is a reminder of a \$250,000 engineering mistake of many years ago.

The cave was started a century ago by ambitious canal builders who sought to extend a waterway from Nunda to Olean, N. Y. The builders tried to tunnel through the mountain rather than have the canal skirt the mountain, and nature had won a battle. The canal builders had planned to extend the tunnel 1,082 feet, with a height of 27 feet and a width of 20 feet. After their ambitious dream faded, the cave served as a hiding place for fugitive slaves during the Civil War.

In 1882 when the Genesee Valley Railroad was replacing the canal, using the same right-of-way, railroad engineers also dreamed of a tunnel at the same spot. But they, too, gave up the idea.

Chilling gusts of air strike anyone approaching the entrance. Inside is a natural refrigerator large enough to hold a dozen carloads of meat, though the entrance is only a little higher than a man's head. In the dank, unwholesome darkness, even a flashlight with a 1,000-foot beam make little impression.

A person does not linger long unless he is sure-footed and adventurous, but if he likes to clamber along slippery ledges and over up-ended rocks through a deep gloom, he finally will reach the innermost recesses of the cavern. It extends in the size and shape of a subway several hundred feet both to the right and left of the entrance.

Beehive State Is Worried Over Honey Production Decrease

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah.—The "flight of the honeybee" is rapidly becoming a serious danger to Utah agriculture.

A meeting of the state's apiarists revealed that honey production has dropped from 4,000,000 pounds in 1936 to 1,800,000 pounds last year. Bee colonies in the "Beehive State" have been reduced from 72,000 to 51,000—largely because of market slumps and damage wrought by insect and plant poisons.

Although the apiarists themselves have suffered economically, the most serious effect of the drop is on agriculture of the states of Utah and Idaho, the bees having served well in an area where climate conditions prevent any chance of pollenization.
