MODERN MENUS

SURPRISE for mother! A centerpiece Gibson Girl on the Mother's Day party table:

THE GIBSON GIRL

DOLL: For the head make a tube 5 inches deep and 3 inches in circumference out of double thickness of peach-colored crepe paper. Stuff tube with cotton and tie with spool wire 1 inch from top and bottom. Paint features on with water color paints or crayons. Tint cheeks with rouge.

HAIR: The hair is made by stretching and then crushing between the fingers a strip of yellow crepe paper. This is then pasted to the doll's head to form a pompadour hair-do.

BODY AND ARMS: To form the body cut four pieces of heavy No. 15 wire, each 9 inches long. Place these wires around the surplus neck crepe below the doll's head. Tie together with spool wire. Then wrap with a 1/2-inch strip of peach crepe paper cut across the grain. Wrap several times for about 4 inches to form the body. For the arms cut a piece of heavy No. 15 wire, 18 inches long. Bend back 1/2-inch at each end. Wrap several times with the narrow strip of peach crepe paper. Then place the center of the arm wire at right angles to the body of the doll and fasten all together with peach crepe paper. Criss-cross the wrapping over and under the arms to hold in place. Pad body with tissue as you wrap to obtain desired size. Then separate the wires below the doll's body and place over a mat of tissue 12 inches tall. Fasten wires in place with gummed paper tape.

SKIRT: For the underskirt cut a strip of white crepe 13 inches deep and 60 inches long. Gather along one long edge with needle and thread or on the sewing machine. Paste the gathered edge around the doll's waist and tie with spool wire. Repeat for outer skirt using coarse crepe paper.

SLEEVES: The top or puff of sleeves is a strip of white crepe

deep and 12 inches long. Decorate with polka dots cut out of blue violet crepe paper and pasted in place. Then paste the two short ends together forming a tube. Slip tube over doll's arm and tie in place at the shoulder. Push tube up to form a puff and then tie end above doll's elbow with spool wire. The lower section of the sleeve is a slender tube of double thickness of white crepe paper slipped over doll's arm and pasted in place. Cut rest of blouse out of white crepe paper and decorate with polka dots. Finish waistline with belt of coarse crepe paper.

HAT: The hat is a circle of white mat stock about 5 inches in diameter. Cut out center for doll's headsize. Stretch a narrow strip of coarse crepe paper around outer edge for binding. Slip hat brim over doll's head. Then paste circle of double thickness of coarse crepe paper on top of doll's head to form the hat crown. Trim with two crepe paper features. These are made by cutting two crepe paper ovals about 5 inches long. Fold in half, then shirr and paste folded edge over a 3-inch piece of No. 10 wire. Paste in place on hat.

PARASOL: The handle is a piece of heavy No. 15 wire, 9 inches long. Wrap with coarse crepe paper. Then cut strip of coarse crepe paper 16 inches long and 5 inches deep. Cut another strip 2 inches wide and gather along one long edge to form a ruffle. Stitch three rows of the ruffling to the plain strip. Gather the top of the strip around the wire handle and tie in place with spool wire. Decorate with ribbon

Peanut Growers Experiment With Fertilizer Use

The Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association is cooperating with three Eastland County farmers and the county agent in demonstrating how the cost of commercial fertilizers on peanuts can be lessened without lowering the yield. Willie E. Cooper, Rising Star; Lynn Trimble, Carbon, and Franklin Mearns, Gorman, are each fertilizing small acreages of peanuts with 0-12-4 fertilizer to compare the yields with adjoining acreages fertilized with 4-12-4 and 0-20-0 fertilizers. The seed planted on the plots fertilized with 0-12-4 and 0-20-0 will be inoculated while the 4-12-4 fertilized plots will not be inoculated. Accurate measurements of yields at the thresher are expected to show that it is not necessary to fertilize peanuts with nitrogen if the seed are inoculated. Since the nitrogen is the most expensive part of a fertilizer, farmers of the county could save several thousand dollars per year if they fertilize peanuts with nitrogen if instead, inoculated their seed.

Bumper Crop Seen For Oklahoma Area

ALVA, Okla.—Research investigators studying northwestern Oklahoma, a part of the great Middle Western wheat belt, believe the region will produce one of the greatest crops in history this year.

The prediction was based on observations made by H. M. Bainer, Amarillo, Tex., general agricultural agent of the Santa Fe railroad; C. W. Lane, special Santa Fe representative, and E. B. Linzee, state grain inspector of Oklahoma.

They described wheat conditions in the area as "excellent."

William McKinley made the Hawk his official yacht. After service in the World War the Hawk became the naval training ship of the third reserve area in Indiana, and was stationed at Michigan City on Lake Michigan.

When present orders for reconditioning the Hawk with Diesel power were sent through, the navy planned to store the unusual engine in the Naval Academy at Annapolis, but research disclosing its scientific importance designated it for a place in the Smithsonian Institution.

Rusty Russell Is Not Pleased With A 'Hot Seat' Role

tailed Dr. H. N. (Rusty) Russell, who doubles as coach and principal of Masonic Home's "Mighty Mites" spends half of his time these days trying to piece together a football team to open the season next fall.

Paradoxically, he spends the other half of his time trying to discourage fellow members of the coaching profession and fans who insist upon placing him on the "hot seat" as leading contender for next autumn's state high school football championship.

Seven of the "tireless thirteen" who went to the state semi-finals reported for spring practice, but even so Russell can't figure why he's been doped for such a powerful team.

"It's ridiculous," he said. "Here I am trying to get enough boys to fill up the holes left by graduation and they make me the leading contender. Why I'll bet Amarillo (state champions) have 30 boys to use."

Out of a male enrollment of only 70, Dr. Russell must find six boys—big or little—who can fill up the holes. A wizard with his talent, Russell yearly comes up with one of the strongest school-boy teams in the state.

Since he took over in 1927, the "Mighty Mites" have gone to the state finals once where they were beaten on penetrations, have won six district titles, been to the semi-finals four times, and twice went out in bi-district play.

Right now he's experimenting with his "poo-wees." To replace 200-pound, all-state end Ray Coulter, who graduated, Russell is trying 135-pound Tom Brady. At the other end he's got a "big boy" in J. L. Daniel who weighs in at 150.

At the offensive tackle positions will be Cecil Mosely, 150, a regular last year, and maybe Louis Pollock, an untried 135-pounder. Two newcomers, Jake Conner and Vester Williams, averaging about 145 pounds, will fill the guard posts.

At center Russell plans to use Walter (Sleepy) Finnegan. Finnegan was the line substitute last year and proudly boasted that he could—and did—play all positions. Russell seldom has more than two substitutes—one for the line and one for the backfield. Sleepy's grown up this year to 170.

Two linemen have been converted to start in the backfield this year. Along with them, Gordy Brown, one of the finest fullbacks in high school ball last year, again will cavort. He runs, kicks, and passes with a high degree of skill and probably will head the starting quartet.

Louis Burress, also a triple-threat and the backfield substitute last year, Billy Cagle and Dewitt Coulter, two fine converted tackles, complete the backfield. The group averages about 180-pounds.

The substitutes include Grant Finnegan, 140; Floppy Davidson, 150; Kester Belt, 130; Bobby Seay, 145; and George Stuart, 155.
