BRITAIN MOVES TO STAMP OUT FOOD RACKETEERS

LONDON—Former detectives—some of them old Scotland Yard men—have been enrolled by the Ministry of Food to try to stop the racket of the food "black markets."

At the "black markets," it is possible to buy the rarest rationed food in almost any quantity providing the purchaser can pay the price.

The detectives—G-men of the Ministry of Food—want to know two things:

Where does the food at the "black markets" come from?

They are faced with difficulties because people who could tell won't. Detectives believe that intending witnesses have been bribed to keep silent.

Racket Country-Wide

Wholesalers and retailers all over Britain, but particularly in London, are being watched. Some of them are suspected of side-tracking legitimate supplies to the bootleg market where they can make more profit.

Thus far, detectives have uncovered some strange stories.

Farmers have complained to them of "rustling" from their stocks of poultry at night.

A multiple-store firm signed a contract to buy eggs from a dealer a few miles away at a standard price. They received the first consignment and paid the bill. Next day, another bill arrived from the dealer. It was for \$320—and did not specify for what goods or services. There was no attempt to account for it. The firm recognized the bill for what it was—a reminder that toll money should be paid—and curtly refused.

Toll Money Exacted

The food inspectors believe these eggs now may be going to the "black markets" whose vendors will pay toll money, charge it to their customers—and still be able to sell because eggs are so scarce.

The food racketeers are selling every kind of food. But they charge only one price—the highest they believe the traffic will bear.

At one London "black market," a ham was offered for \$8—and sold. Hams are rare in London.

Even rarer are onions and oranges. Detectives have traced people who have bought both of them in dozens but they cannot get any details of the transactions.

Butter is being bought at 60 and 70 cents a pound—as much butter can be bought as the housewife gets in two months of rations.

Eggs are 10 cents each, lemons 8 cents, oranges 6 cents.

And there are "black cafes," too. These places sell heavy weight chops and steaks and will serve meals containing three or four rationed foods—for a price.

OUTPUT SOARS FOR IRON PITS IN MINNESOTA

DULUTH, Minn.—Minnesota's iron ranges have taken on a new significance with the speeding up of the national defense effort.

From the yawning, open pit mines in northern Minnesota this summer workers will take more than a fourth of the ore which will be dug out in the United States.

Mining experts estimate that 55,000,000 tons of ore—a new record for the Minnesota mines—will be mined on the state's three iron ranges during the season. The ore will be shipped in Great Lakes' boats to the steel centers of the East.

The biggest previous total was the 49,161,964 tons mined in 1937.

Mesabi Largest Mine

The major iron ranges in Minnesota are the Mesabi, the Vermillion, and the Cuyuna. The largest of these is the Mesabi which contains the world's largest open pit mine.

This great Mahoning mine is 2½ miles long, from a half mile to a mile wide, and nearly 400 feet deep in places. It contains more than 60 railroad tracks and covers 1,100 acres. Since the mine was opened in 1895, miners have taken out more than 260,000,000 tons of ore.

Experts estimate that the Mesabi range has iron ore reserves of more than a 1,000,000,000 tons.

Kreat Docks at Allouez

From the mines the ore is carried in railroad cars to the docks at Duluth and Superior, Wis., and to the huge ore docks at Allouez, Wis.

The Allouez docks rise 82 feet above the waters of Lake Superior, and the longest pier there extends 2,244 feet into the bay. In the dock there are 1,352 ore pockets with a capacity of nearly 450,000 tons.

During the Great Lakes shipping season the docks are open 24 hours daily. Railroad officials expect to load an average of 13 boats daily with about 130,000 tons of ore during the season. This average time for loading a 10,000-ton load at the Allouez docks last year was 3 hours 13 minutes.

Five New Shops for NYA Being Built Throughout State

AUSTIN, Texas—Designated to provide 460 young men with work experience in the manual and mechanical skills when they are completed and equipped, NYA shop buildings are under construction by NYA youth in Cuero, Lufkin, Palestine, Georgetown, and East Bernard. J. C. Kellam, state NYA administrator, said today.

Largest of the shops is that at Cuero, nearly completed, which contains 14,000 square feet of floor space and features 11 laminated plywood trusses, each with a span of 63 feet. The clay tile structure is 492 feet long, and will house machine, sheet metal and woodworking shops for 100 youth to work in.

General sheet metal and welding shops will be housed in the concrete tile building at Lufkin, which will accommodate 100 youth when finished.

The native rock structure being built at Georgetown containing 8,000 square feet of floor space, will have room for sheet metal, radio and woodworking shops for 80 youth.

Most recent of the shops to be started is that at Palestine, where a woodworking and an automotive shop, each 50' x 71' in size, will accommodate 100 young men, and will be finished when finished.

The East Bernard concrete tile woodworking shop when finished will be sufficiently large enough to allow 80 boys to work monthly in two weeks' shifts.

New Texas Lakes Are Now Restocked; Old Lakes Get Quota

AUSTIN, Texas—New lakes, of which Texas is getting many, are being given special attention by the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission without the Game Department neglecting its usual stocking and work on the older bodies of water. The lakes are being stocked heavily with small fish and some of spawning size. Results to date have been excellent, but more comprehensive tests will be made this year due to a large number of lakes being given special attention.

It is admitted that the Texas regulations on the size and number of fish allowed each day are wrong. The size limits should be larger and the creel limit smaller. Wherever the Department has been able to get special regulations the fish population has been increased tremendously.

For example, Lake Austin, at Austin, was closed for slightly more than a year. The Game Department stocked the lake heavily and scientifically. More than 500,000 black bass fry were placed in the lake, but no large bass were used for stocking purposes because bass are very cannibalistic and large ones would have eaten many of the smaller fish. However, crappie, bream and white bass of spawning size were planted. As they grew their offspring were of approximately the same size as the bass fry planted and thus cannibalism was cut to a minimum. As a result Lake Austin is probably the heaviest populated lake in the state at the present time.

Among the large new lakes which are being treated similarly this year are Possum Kingdom in Palo Pinto county and Lake Travis in Travis and Burnet counties. Almost 1,000,000 bass, bream and crappie fry have already been placed in Possum Kingdom and it is likely the total will reach 1,500,000. More than 200,000 fry have been planted in Lake Travis and a million and a half is the total planned for it.

The Game Department, according to the executive secretary, is attempting to obtain special regulations for these bodies of water. If they are obtained and the Department is able to carry on sufficient improvement work both these lakes should be fishermen's paradises next year.

"Suicide" Case Is Solved By A Note

DALLAS, Texas—Accident investigator W. C. Hicks suspected suicide.

When two men stopped him on a viaduct and said they saw a man disappear over the railing, Hicks began to investigate.

He radioed for help, and then went to the river bottom to hunt for a body.

Noticing an abandoned car parked on the bridge, the officer climbed back and found the explanation.

A note attached to the windshield read: "Car out of order. Gone for water."

Hicks drove on, looking for something else to investigate.

CAPITOL HOLDS PAN AMERICAN FIESTA MAY 16

WASHINGTON—Ranking women of the 21 Western Hemisphere republics will join here on May 16 "in a colorful demonstration of the good neighbor policy in action," according to an announcement of the Women's National Democratic club, which is sponsoring the Pan American fete.

Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, Mrs. Henry A. Wallace, wife of the Vice President and unofficial "good will tourist" of the Latin Americas, and Mrs. Cordell Hull, wife of the Secretary of State, will receive women of the embassies and legations of the other 20 republics.

While the men are working on ships for the trade among the Americas, and machinery from the United States for the South and Central republics, and tin and leather and copper from the Latin American republics for the United States, the women will have a party to demonstrate "hemisphere solidarity" and hemisphere interchange in music, art, dances and fashions.

The fete will open in the afternoon at the Shoreham hotel with a flag ceremony in which girls from the Latin American diplomatic circle, dressed in national fiesta costumes, will represent their countries. During the flag ceremonies, the navy band orchestra will play the national anthems of the countries.

The Pan American Choral Society will sing songs of the various countries, in Spanish, under the direction of Mme. Fanny d'Aulby.

At this fiesta, Washington society will see some of "the most talented members of its Latin American diplomatic group in dances of Mexico, Peru, and other countries of the south."

The Pan American Union, which is cooperating in plans for the event, will show "a number of its finest exhibits," and various Latin American embassies and legations will lend masterpieces of arts and crafts for the exhibit, representative of the cultural heritage of Latin American republics in these fields.

A fashion show, in which a group of Washington girls will model gowns, is designed to demonstrate the increasing influence of these countries upon North American ways in the field of fashions.

Mrs. Roosevelt will serve as honorary hostess for the occasion, while eminent women from official and social life head the various committees.

Dietitian's Help Promised Army

DALLAS, Tex.—Home economists of the natural gas industry are ready for military service, in event of war, to help the American Army "march on its stomach."

The stomach is the only part of army anatomy that cannot be mechanized and "shows no promise of being mechanized," speakers at a convention of the American Gas Association said.

Economists would step into jobs as menu consultants for both the military and civilian population. Albertine Berry, Dallas, chairman of the association's home service committee, said proper diet would be an important factor in wartime morale.

The association, outlining its contributions to the national defense program, said it "long ago began warfare against inadequate diet and its accompanying ailments."

"This work is being accelerated to help sustain a proper health standard so vital to the welfare of the nation in an emergency," Miss Berry said.

"Armies still march on their stomachs. And it is just as important that our second line of defense—the men, women and children at home, at school and in industry—should be well-fed."

She noted that "25 per cent of the men conscripted in 1940 were not accepted because of poor health."

Miss Berry said war-time Britain provides an example of what home economists may be called upon to do.

"The British government is depending upon home service women to keep housewives informed about what foods are available and the best ways of preparing them," she explained. "The object is to keep national health at the highest possible level."

WTCC Urges West Texas Be Made a Big Defense Area

MINERAL WELLS, Tex., May 16.—West Texas taxpayers today heard a call for a "new deal" in state government and freight rate equality that would enable the vast area to become the cradle for national defense.

Rep. Joe Humphreys and Dean W. R. Woolrich of the University of Texas urged the assembly at the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention to "fight the our rights" of the great wheat, cotton, livestock and oil producing area.

NEW YORK, May 16.—Bob Montgomery will have a one and a half pound weight advantage over Lightweight Champion Lou Jenkins for tonight's non-title fight to be held in Madison Square Garden.

BRITISH TAKE SOLLUM AREA FROM GERMANS

British Imperial Forces smashed at the Axis armies in the Eastern Mediterranean today with a lightning land thrust through the Sollum Front to Libya and stabbed through the air at German and Italian air forces moving through French Syria to Iraq.

The British struck on two fronts protecting the Suez Canal and the Mosul oil fields when the Royal Air Force bombed, machine gunned and damaged Axis planes, including Nazi troop transport aircraft on the Syrian air bases.

The Army of the Nile captured Sollum and Hell Fire Pass, while the attack upon the Syrian air bases put Britain and France almost at a state of war in the Near East.

Britain's attitude toward the current negotiations between Vichy and Berlin resulted in military Syria a Nazi-occupied area.

The French are reported to have closed the Syrian frontiers with Turkey and Palestine and are re-enforcing the border garrison.

Former Students Of Polytechnic Will Have Homecoming

FORT WORTH—Over 5,000 former students of Polytechnic College and Texas Woman's College are expected to return to their alma mater in Fort Worth, May 24-26 for a golden jubilee homecoming celebrating the fiftieth birthday anniversary of the Methodist supported school now known as Texas Wesleyan College.

Founded as Polytechnic College by the former Methodist Episcopal Church South in 1891, the school became Texas Woman's College in the educational plan of the church in 1914 when Texas Methodists founded Southern Methodist University in Dallas as the center of their educational activities. In 1935 the Fort Worth institution again became co-educational and adopted the present name.

RECALLS U. S. FOUGHT TWICE FOR FREE SEA

Says It Is Up To Germany To Make Good Threats To Blockade Sea, And U. S. Will Send Vessels To Zone

WASHINGTON, May 16.—President Roosevelt, in effect, today defied Germany to make the Red Sea blockade effective, and recalled that twice before the United States had waged undeclared wars on similar issues.

The United States is preparing to send 27 cargo ships into the Red Sea with supplies for the British armies in the Middle East. Germany has declared the areas a combat zone and has stated that she will prey on all shipping entering the area, regardless of flag and nationality.

The president said that it was Germany's problem in this case to make the blockade effective. In addition he said that it involved the issue of freedom of the seas, a vital point on which the United States has fought two undeclared wars.

The president declined to discuss the United States-French relations, despite a strongly worded protest last night against the Franco-German negotiations.

He said that it was too early to speculate on the future course of the strained relations between Washington and Vichy, but left an impressionable appeal to the French people to prevent an alliance and that subsequent seizure of 13 French vessels might be a pressure move to try to swing France from cooperation with the Nazis.

The president said he did not know whether the United States may seize Martinique and other French possessions in this hemisphere or whether William D. Leahy, United States Ambassador to France, would be recalled.

Registrants Must Notify Board Of Changed Address

Warning to all registrants under the Selective Service Act that they must notify their local boards promptly of any change of address, or become liable to severe penalties, was given today by General J. Watt Page, State Selective Service Director.

It is the duty of every registrant to keep his local board advised at all times of the address at which mail will reach him without delay. General Page pointed out. Any registrant who fails to conform to the Selective Service Act and Regulations, he said, is liable to punishment "by imprisonment for not more than five years or a fine of not more than \$10,000 or by both such fine and imprisonment."

General Page stated that so far most cases of delinquency have been found to have been due to ignorance of the law or carelessness on the part of registrants. It is the policy of the Selective Service System, he said, and of the Department of Justice which is charged with the enforcement of the Act, to be lenient in cases where it is apparent there has been no willful intent to violate the law. Nevertheless, he stressed, investigation of such cases is taking up much valuable time of local boards and of the Department of Justice agents which should be devoted to urgent work for National Defense.

To relieve this situation, and also to protect registrants who do not willfully attempt to violate the law, General Page has asked all local boards to use every means of investigation at their disposal and to wait a reasonable length of time before reporting apparent cases of delinquency to the Department of Justice.

In this connection, General Page said that the voluntary assistance of local and State police officials may be used in finding a registrant who has failed to respond to notification. He said: "If, after a reasonable effort on the part of the local board, with the assistance of the local or State police, the whereabouts of the delinquent registrant cannot be ascertained, and nothing has been heard from him in response to notification, the local board then should report the delinquent to the United States Attorney."

Sun Followed By Bee Keepers To Keep Them Working

By United Press
SAN FRANCISCO—California has become the winter work land for the bees of the western states, according to George Emerson, honorary president of the California State Beekeepers' Association.

"Bees are brought into California," he said, "for the winter season from Idaho, Utah, Montana and other bee-raising states. They do not produce much honey during this season of the year, and if kept at home, where there is little source of honey, they have to be fed."

"It is also at this time the hives fill up with young bees, so that by the time it is best to take them back to their mountain clover in their home states, the hives are full, both of honey and big swarms."

According to Emerson, this seasonal migration of bee farms has produced a situation not unlike that of early cattlemen who disputed the use of the "open range."

Apiarists have developed a code of unwritten laws to relieve the tension. Brands are registered with the state upon entry and burned on each hive for easy identification. Stands are kept a mile and a half apart in the open country—about the maximum range of a honey-gathering bee.

The war, Emerson suggested, has closed virtually all honey export markets. As a result, farmers are realizing greater profit through the pollenization of fruit blossoms by the bees than the apiarists gets from this sale of honey.
