his recently-resurrected cousin the foodlegger, he has been dormant—awaiting only a rise in oil prices and a favorable dark night. In the seven years since the Connally hot oil act became law, a few hardy oil racketeers have risen defiantly to sneak a thousand or so barrels of the black liquid gold out of East Texas—that is, a thousand or so barrels at a time. However, state and federal enforcement agencies have kept the Texas hot oil baron and his "petroleum-sonies" pretty much off the scene.

But, again like the wartime foodlegger who sees in the present national crisis an opportunity to run a get-rich-quick scheme, the petroleum bootlegger once more is emerging. He again is revising his dodges and trickery and polishing up his schemes in preparation for sneaking oil out of the vast East Texas oil domain without paying taxes to the state and federal governments.

The hot oil racket as practiced in East Texas has nearly as many angles as there are wells in the field—or, 25,000 plus. Nobody knows that better than earnest, soft-spoken Warren Moore, prosecutor on the staff of U. S. District Attorney Steve M. King, especially assigned to enforcement of the Connally act.

In seven years of ferreting out oil rackets, Moore and his colleagues and investigators have uncovered almost every type of subterfuge employed to evade government oil regulations.

For instance, there was the case of a company which brought in a good producing well with good pressure inside the field regulated by proration. But the well was near the edge of the field.

The well was allowed to produce, under Texas Railroad Commission orders, say, 20 barrels a day. Not satisfied with 20 barrels a day, the operator drilled six more wells—outside the field. The six new wells all were close together but each was given an allowable of, say, 120 barrels a day instead of 20.

"Had" is the correct word for the government unearthing the whole setup. With a string of pipe the operator was daily piping oil into the six new wells (which were not producing) from his original well. The six wells were nothing but dry holes cemented in and making perfect reservoirs.

A variation of this technique is a setup near a state line. Oil is piped underground to "cheater" wells over in the adjoining state and, hence, subject to different allowable regulations.

Hot oil refiners, many of them little more than piles of junk, pull "fast ones," too, Moore admits.

One highly questionable maneuver is for a small-time refiner

# German Youth Finds Wild West Tales Of Texas Exaggerated

SAN ANTONIO, Texas—Herbert Spiro was a little disappointed when he came to the United States from Germany. But he wasn't disappointed so much with the United States as a whole as he was at Texas.

"The first thing I expected to see in Texas was a whole flock of Wild West heroes and Indians," Spiro said. "I expected to see a good, new crude from a well of his own or somebody in collusion. He can make gasoline more cheaply that way, even though he has to evade the constituted rules of the oil game."

Sometimes evasion has consisted of bribing state inspectors to connive, generally, to ignore springs of "cheater" pipe attached almost in plain view at the mouth of the well.

Some of the cases have been cases of forged manifests—a paper granting the individual to whom it is issued authority to take so much oil from the field.

Some of the cases are so complicated that the prosecution almost despairs being able to reduce them to simple, understandable terms in front of a jury of lay citizens.

## War Chickens Come Home to Roost

The war for whose outbreak Russia flashed the green light by its pact with Germany Aug. 22, 1939, has now come to Russia itself.

This final collapse of the Stalin-Molotov policies of the past 21 months means that the whole world must back off and take a new look at the war.

Hitler's deliberate violation of his 10-year pact with Russia gives new proof—as if any new proof were needed—of his black-hearted perfidy. It now seems clear that he simply sucked the Russians into the pact of 1939 for his own purposes, never intending to keep the pact. Certainly all the objections he now makes to the Russians—that they are imperialistic, that they are training men to disintegrate the German government, and so forth, were true in 1939, are true now, and have always been and will always be true of Russian policy in Germany, in the United States, and wherever the Communist International operates.

The Communists have been calling this an imperialist war. So it is now in the sense that both Germany and Russia are imperialist, each having grabbed off all the territory it could grab ever since the war broke out.

We in the United States are naturally more interested in how all this affects us. Directly and immediately, it would seem, very little. We are committed to a policy of aid to Britain. We have not yet been able to provide anything like the aid to Britain which she requires.

So any question of aiding Russia is unrealistic. Thanks at least in part to the opposition and obstruction of Communists in America, arms production has not yet reached a point where there is any surplus for Russia. So any debate of direct help for Russia is meaningless.

More direct is the fact that China will now almost certainly be cut off from the Russian aid which has been valuable to her. That means that China will depend more heavily on help from the United States. She should have it. To this also we are committed.

Whatever is the upshot of the German-Russian war, it can scarcely fail to benefit Britain in her struggle. Win, lose, or draw, in Russia, Germany must lose hundreds of planes and pilots, hundreds of tanks, and thousands of trained men.

Britain gains precious time and breathing space, perhaps even a chance to regain Norway and North Africa.

The United States, too, gains precious time in which to perfect our own defenses and to make our program of aid to Britain really conclusive.

## Two Say Nothing But Get Results For USO In Texas

DALLAS, Tex.—The man who says nothing and does everything is a rarity, but state headquarters of the United Service Organization for National Defense has found two. John Kennedy of Kennedy County, down in the brush country, is the No. 1 man and Vester Hughes of Mertzon, Irion County, rates second.

F. B. Germany, regional chairman for four south-western states, Dallas, appointed these gentlemen chairmen for their respective counties. He heard nothing from Mr. Kennedy as to whether he would accept the appointment or not. One day a letter arrived with a check from the Kennedy County man. It was for \$701, or one dollar for every citizen in the county. Vester Hughes failed to notify the regional offices as to what he expected to do. Two weeks passed and this week a letter came from the Irion County man with a

check for \$150.00, the USO quota for his county.

Three congressional districts have completed organization of all counties. Several counties have reached their quota and Corpus Christi was the first city in the state to complete its share of the \$400,000 Texas fund. It took two days to raise the Corpus Christi quota of \$10,500. Congressional districts reporting complete organization are No. 2, T. C. Whitehurst, Beaumont, chairman; Third District, Murray C. Sells, Longview, chairman; and 13th Dis-

### Loan Association Dividends Will Be Paid Stockholders

LITTLE ROCK, Ark.—Dividends aggregating \$1,538,676 will be paid to 91,558 savers and investors in Texas on June 30th by the 119 insured savings and

loans associations in the state, according to estimates prepared by the Federal Home Bank of Little Rock. The payments will cover a distribution of the earnings of the association for the first half of the year, after substantial sums have been placed in the reserve and undivided profits accounts of the institutions.

Local savers and investors will share in this large distribution of earnings, for included in the totals compiled by the bank are the figures of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Ranger, by which this area is served.

The insured savings and loan associations in Texas have enjoyed a very satisfactory business during the past six months, according to officials of the Little Rock Bank. Savings and investment accounts have increased in an unprecedented volume and they now total \$39,049,420. Lending activities of the association show material gains in the period. Loans made to Texas home owners since the first of the year aggregate \$11,859,265, of which \$1,175,000 was used by the borrowers for the construction of new dwellings.

Bank officials predicted that even a greater amount of savings would flow into the insured associations during the first ten days of July, for, they said, that is a period when many persons shift their funds from one investment to another. Officials attributed the steady increases to the fact that the Federal government has, within recent years, through the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, provided insurance up to \$5,000 for every account in the associations.

### Allotment Plan For Defense Bonds Given Approval

AUSTIN, Tex.—When queried as to the reception by the people of Texas to the salary allotment plan for Defense Savings, State Administrator Frank Scofield stated:

"Many, many employers over the State have made it possible for their employees to invest regularly in Defense securities through the medium of allotting a fixed amount out of each pay check for this purpose. Also, thousands of their employees have started active participation in such a plan for regular saving and investment.

"In this connection," said Mr. Scofield, "I should like to mention that on the purchase of a 10-cent stamp you will be given a card on which you may mount 25 of these stamps, and exchange them for \$2.50 worth of the larger size. On the purchase of a 25-cent stamp you will be given an album on which you may mount 75 of these stamps. When so filled the album will have a total value of \$18.75, the purchase price of a savings bond that will

Odd Cent Coin Of 1787 Has A Very Blunt Inscription

PHILADELPHIA—Money is nothing more than a medium of exchange and the collection of monies of the world, recently an exhibition here, proves the old bromide.

Among the pecuniary curiosities displayed was something everyone is warned against taking—the wooden nickel. The wooden nickel came from Blaine, Wash. Exhibited also were a \$146,000 check payable to the Dodge Brothers, another one written by Henry Ford for 1 cent, and Charles A. Lindbergh's check of \$25,000 which he received as a prize for flying across the Atlantic.

A United States coin, called the Fugio Cent and circulated in 1787 bears the inscription "Mind Your Business." The collection had specimens of some of the unique forms of currency used in far-flung parts of the world, including brass wire money and carved Buddha trading beads from China; stone money of New Britain; cardboard money from Japan and woven grass currency belts from St. Matthias Island; American Indian wampum, and Eskimo money—a chunk of unpalatable candy.

The tetradrachm of Alexander the Great, a Spanish doubloon of 1797, and the earliest known check in existence—a two-piece instrument of 1675—were among the exhibits.

Tuba, Hopi Indian Chief Is Honored

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah—High officials of the L.D.S. church journeyed to Arizona to erect a monument to—a tuba!

But not the dance band variety. The monument honored Chief Tuba of the Hopi Indians, one of the early converts to the Mormon doctrine and a friend of L.D.S. colonists for many years. Elder George A. Smith of the delegation of twelve apostles led the dedication from Salt Lake City.

The girl's body was found next day wrapped in a tablecloth.

Youth Sentenced For Evading Draft

DALLAS, Tex.—Frederick Emerson Thorne, 36, cousin-in-law of President Manuel Avila Camacho of Mexico was sentenced to 18 months in a federal penitentiary on his plea of guilty to a charge of evading the selective service law.

City detectives testified Thorne was picked up for investigation after it was learned he had attempted to buy 1,000 pistols for shipment to Mexico. He then was held for federal officials as it was learned he failed to register under the draft act last October.

Thorne's attorney said his client had been busy with silver mine interests, with the purchase of mine equipment, and that he had been in jail part of the time and had not had too great an opportunity to register.
