Brass Medal for Hitler

If there is one quality in the exercise of which Adolf Hitler stands alone, it is brass, effrontery, sheer impudent presumptuousness. That, more than any other quality, has carried him the long way he has come.

It took brass to claim power in Germany; it took brass to stage events like the Reichstag fire, in the face of his own book's statement that the bigger the lie, the easier it is to make people believe it. It took brass to say at Munich-time, "This is my last territorial claim in Europe," while the maps for the Polish conquest lay on the table. It took brass to close 20 years of railing at Soviet Russia with a pact of non-aggression, friendship and close trade relations in 1939. It took brass to invade country after country, claiming only the wish to "protect them."

It took brass to reverse utterly the Russian policy after less than two years, and launch an unprovoked assault on one of the largest countries on earth. But for sheer impudent effrontery, this one wins the brass medal. It is now revealed that Franz von Papen, Hitler's ambassador to Turkey, approached British diplomats there with a suggestion that Germany and Britain just call the whole thing off and march together in a "holy crusade" on Russia.

Does Hitler imagine for one moment that the people of England, the plain ordinary people of England, who have lived in cellars, been torn by bombs, fought and died from Dunkirk to Crete, seen their homes and churches reduced to smoking ruin, would tolerate overnight a government which proposed "Let's forget all that now, and go crusading against Russia, arm in arm with the men who have brutally injured us, and who have proved so utterly faithless?"

The British people, the people of the Dominions, the remaining free people of all countries are not like that, to be played on like a great organ, and emit a tune at will in any change of key some tinpot master chooses overnight. He may be able to tell the German people on Monday, "This is the enemy; hate him, fight him!" and on Tuesday, "No, that is the enemy; hate him, fight him!" But he can't tell that sort of thing to free people anywhere in the world, much less to the grim British in their bomb shelters.

That such a monstrous manipulation should even be attempted is an insult to every man and woman in the world who still breathes the air of freedom.

Drunk Drivers To Face Hard Times In State Courts

AUSTIN, Tex.—Drunken drivers in Texas are due for rough times at the hands of Texas prosecutors if the district attorneys were earnest in their protests when Gov. W. Lee O'Daniel vetoed the new drunken driving bill.

At behest of prosecutors who wired that the old law was enforced with difficulty the legislators overrode the governor's objections and put into effect penalties that the prosecutors asked.

For first offense—imprisonment in county jail not less than 10 days nor more than two years; or—fine not less than \$50 nor more than \$500; or—both fine and imprisonment within the limits given.

For second or subsequent offense—imprisonment in the state penitentiary for not less than one year nor more than five years.

The penalties are incurred for operating a motor vehicle upon any public road, highway, street or alley while "intoxicated or under influence of intoxicating liquor."

Guards Will Total 400 At New Plant

BIRMINGHAM, Ala.—A new powder plant at Childersburg, Ala., 40 miles from here, will be staffed with nearly twice as many police as guard this city of 300,000.

Plants officials have asked the Birmingham police department to aid in hiring 400 men to guard the plant, now being constructed. The Birmingham force is composed of 245 men, including headquarters personnel and detectives.

Qualifications for the guard posts at the plant are: Each man must be at least 5 feet, 10 inches in height; weigh 150 pounds, and be under 35. They must also have records which will pass the scrutiny of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Governor O'Daniel said omission of that phrase weakened the law.

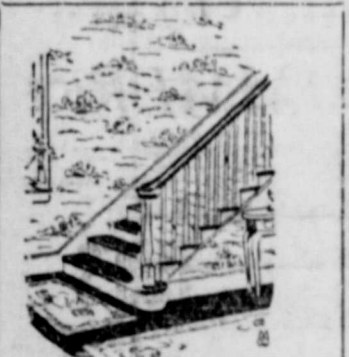

Unfilled Orders On Lumber Pile Up

AUSTIN, Tex.—Although production and shipment of Southern lumber last month held about even with April figures, unfilled orders continued to pile up in Southern yards.

The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported May weekly production of lumber at 332,779 board feet, virtually the same as that for the preceding month and 14 per cent above May a year ago. At 317,305 board feet, May lumber shipments were 5.7 per cent ahead of April, but 2.3 per cent down from May, 1940.

At 1,278,667 board feet, unfilled orders were 5 per cent above April this year, 113 per cent above May last year.

Railroads Translate Wage Demands Into Figures Which Show Size of Increases Employees Are Now Seeking

Big figures are common in running into millions, and even the news these days that sums up billions, of dollars no longer are startling. Many newspaper readers therefore may have missed the real import of announcement that the railway labor unions have made wage increase and other demands amounting, altogether, to approximately 900 million dollars a year increase in wage and payroll tax costs of the country's railways.

Translation of 900 million dollars into terms which may be readily comprehended should be helpful to more general understanding of the actual magnitude of these union demands.

How much is 900 million dollars? Well, it is above 30 per cent more than all the railroads collected last year in freight charges for transporting all the farm and ranch products in the United States that moved by rail. Railroad freight earnings on those

products last year were \$682,181,687. They were slightly less than that in 1930, and slightly more than that in 1938. As a matter of fact, railroad freight earnings on agricultural products are surprisingly little, from year to year.

What the railway union demands adds up to, then, is this: The increases asked amount, on an annual basis, to approximately 218 million dollars more than the railway from the transportation of all the country's products of agriculture, live stock and animal products. Included in these commodity classifications are all the wheat, corn and other grain moving by rail, all the cotton and apples and potatoes, all the citrus fruits and melons and other perishables moving from the west, south or elsewhere, and all the cattle, hogs, sheep and products of animals. The increases sought consequently amount to almost a third more than the yearly freight bill of the farmers on their products. These increases would be imposed on top of the present pay of railway employees, whose average weekly earnings now are 15 per cent higher than in 1929, and at the highest level in history.

Stating in this way how much 900 million dollars really is should be significant to all agricultural producers. It should be particularly so to those in Western territory. Western railroads last year derived 28 per cent of their total freight earnings from transportation of the products of farms and ranches. Adding 900 millions to the annual cost of furnishing railroad transportation inevitably would work back to the farmers, on whose production Western railroad depend for more than one-fourth of their freight earnings, in a way that would effect the farmer's earnings.

Farm income still falls short of parity with income in other industry. It is not 15 per cent above the 1929 level, as are the average weekly earnings of railway workers. Even a gross farm income as great as in 1929 would only produce average earnings, with no allowances for farm expenses, for the country's more than 6 million farmers about \$200 a year less than the average yearly earnings of railway workers.

Gross farm income last year, however, was over a billion and a half dollars below 1929. It will not reach the 1929 level this year. Railway employees consequently do not require wage increases of 41 per cent, or 30 per cent, or any other per cent, to put them on income parity with the farmers. The increases the unions are demanding would put railway employees, on the average, something over 50 per cent above income parity with the farmer.

How Ya Gonna Keep 'Em Down on the Farm With Defense Industry Wages Beckoning?

WASHINGTON—The Farm Security Administration of your government, whose function it is to get folks to go back to the farm, is now having some new troubles trying to keep them there. FSA, you'll recall, is the outfit which started out in life as Rex Tugwell's Resettlement Administration to build "five-dollar-a-day" towns here and there, was reorganized into the Department of Agriculture in 1936 and had its name changed in 1937 to bury its past and start all over again.

It's the defense program, of course, which is upsetting the even tenor of FSA ways. Let a defense project get started and what happens? The poorer farmers who had tough sledding, hear the call of those "five-dollar-a-day" towns to be made on government jobs. They simply pick up and leave home. Anything looks better to them than facing the unexpired portion of a 40-year mortgage on a little land which may give security but never wealth.

So they chase the pot of gold to the rainbow's end, and when they get there—to scratch a couple of metaphors—the equipment is heavy as always. The farmers swarmed in. Some of the first who could get by as carpenters got jobs. The unskilled rest had to trek back home. When the construction job was over, even the early comers were down on their luck and had to trudge back to their patch of land.

THAT situation woke up the Farm Security people as to what was going on and since then they have been doing a good bit of missionary work among their 800,000 or more client farm-families. The gist of the FSA argument to their people is this:

Some day this defense boom is going to be all over. When it is, the bottom may fall out worse than it did in 1932. You have here your house and your land, secured by a federal government loan at low interest on long time terms. Why not keep this as your reserve? If you have some sons or daughters who can fit into the defense picture, fine—let them get their jobs in the industrial centers. But keep some members of the family, Uncle Charlie or Brother Bill or even grandpappy, on the place to make sure it doesn't run down and you don't lose your grub stake.

FSA now has loans outstanding to some 400,000 families in this southeastern-Appalachian area alone. Perhaps 25,000 to 30,000 people from these 400,000 families have already left to take defense jobs. The industrial centers have again become the frontiers to which the pioneers want to flock and it's going to be a job to keep them put.

On top of this general resettlement problem is the old problem of migratory labor, which is another FSA baby that has to have a new nursing formula changed by the defense colic. The old pre-war harvest hand migration of the midwest has of course been killed by the combine tractor, but the citrus-fruit-truck farm migrations from Florida to Maine and back, and the citrus-cotton-truck-fruit harvesters' migrations from the Rio Grande to the Canadian border are essential to the harvesting of seasonal crops, and the labor supply for this must be maintained.

The big worry now is that there won't be enough Okies to go round. Some of these sons of Okies have been tinkering with model T Fords so long they've become pretty fair mechanics and the west coast aircraft factories are after 'em.

Times certainly have changed.

Other demands of the military are making further inroads into the industry. Intensive army maneuvers under its expansion program have brought requests for fireworks to make sham battles "more realistic, simulating actual warfare." An ordnance officer recently asked Clark for a supply of sky rockets to use, instead of practice shells, in trench mortars.

"From now on larger plants will manufacture fireworks in the little time left after defense contracts have been filled and smaller plants will have a hard time meeting demands," Clark said.

There is a national supply of fireworks, created before the defense program got into full swing, that will see the nation through this year's celebration, even though on a curtailed scale. But after that—

As an indication of what firecracker fiends can expect in the future, Clark estimated that his company this Fourth of July would sell about 300,000 pounds of firecrackers—and about 50 times as many American flags as usual.

This May Be the Last Fourth of July When Fireworks Can Be Bought Because of National Defense Need

DALLAS, Tex.—If you're mad about having to pay for six sparklers the same price for which you could get eight last year, don't worry. Chances are you're pretty lucky to get even six. And it may be the last Fourth of July fireworks you'll be able to buy "for the duration."

I. B. Clark, owner of the Southern Fireworks & Specialty Company of Dallas, said that army engineers are bringing the national defense program home to the kids, and explained that fireworks manufacturers are turning to making munitions and that after the present supply of wire crackers and Roman candles are exhausted, celebrators will be seen more than heard.

It all comes about from the army's need for ingredients used in making fireworks.

Magnesium, barium, strontium, perchlorates and potash—used to make pinwheels flash and fire fountains; change colors—are being requisitioned to supply munitions. There's a shortage of aluminum, too, and for that reason sparklers this year are being packed six in a box instead of eight, and sold for the same price.

"Fireworks makers are the 'reserve corps' of the munitions supply," Clark said. "They are the only large body of men in the country thoroughly trained in the handling of explosives."

As a result, he pointed out, when aid for Britain and the national preparedness program created a need for ammunition, the majority of fireworks manufacturers turned their plants into shell-loading factories. One large eastern plant, instead of making powder for those "five inch salutes" which Fourth of July patriots used to blow caps up into the air with, now is making mortar, an explosive used in the British "super bombs."

Snakebite Rumors At Camp Bowie Are Found To Be Untrue

AUSTIN, Tex.—An officer attached to the Medical Corps at Camp Bowie, where the 36th Division (Texas National Guard) is in training, gives vigorous denial to a rumor—which appeared almost simultaneously in several cities of the state—that six troopers had died of snakebite during recent maneuvers.

The officer said that the same report circulated inside the camp, but that a thorough check-up proved the rumor was baseless. One soldier did get a rattlesnake bite but he recovered.

Snakebite Rumors At Camp Bowie Are Found To Be Untrue

The rumor was heard in Austin almost as soon as the maneuvers began. A 36th Division man reportedly had written to local relatives that six soldiers, including one officer, had been fatally bitten by rattlesnakes during the mock war exercises. The officer, so the story went, was bitten in the neck and died within a few minutes.

A remarkably similar version of the story came from "relatives" in other towns of the state. But the medical officer declared that the story in its entirety is false. He added that the 2,500-bed Camp Bowie Hospital has had only one type of fatality during this "war"—persons fatally injured in motor accidents which could have happened to them at home.
